Context

Historical Context

- Daniel's name means "God is my judge"
- Ezekiel referred to Daniel as being "righteous and wise"
- Hebrews 11:32-33 refers to Daniel as one of, "the prophets who through faith stopped the mouths of lions."
- Book of Daniel spans the length of the entire Babylonian Exile
- Daniel taken captive to Babylon in 605 BC
- Babylonians later conquered by the Medes & Persians
- Chronology of the historical narrative: ch. 1-4, 7, 8, 5, 9, 6

Redemptive-Historical Context

- The people of God captured by the Gentiles
- The people of God persecuted and afflicted by the Gentiles
- Who sovereignly rules the earth?

Key Theme

The Most Hight, the God of Daniel, sovereignly reigns and rules supreme over all mankind. Therefore His people are brave in the face of persecution.

"The Most High rules the kingdom of men and gives it to whom he wills." Daniel 4:25

Message

- God is God over all peoples of the earth, not just the Jews.
- God has humbled even the great king Nebuchadnezzar, conqueror of Judah.

- Daniel's dream of four beasts and the Ancient of Days

Daniel 1 & 9 - Exile and Return

- Daniel and his friend stay faithful during the exile
- Yahweh is faithful to bring His people back from exile
- The true return from exile is accomplished by _____ alone

Daniel 10-12 - The Future of the People of God

- Predictive prophecies about the future of the people of God

How does Daniel speak to our life as exiles in this world?

- Chapters 4 & 5 People who set themselves up against the Most High will be humbled, to their everlasting benefit or regret.
- Chapters 3 & 6 Remain steadfast as servants of a sovereign Lord even when you suffer persecution and opposition for your faith.
- Chapters 2, 7 & 8 The earthly kingdoms/powers around us are passing away. Learn from Daniel's hope in God and thank God for the end of exile because of Christ.
- Chapters 10-12 Look to the eternal reward that is waiting for followers of the Most High when we arrive at our final home with God.
