Dear Siblings in Christ,

We are a people of purpose, a people of sound reason, a people weaned on the scientific method and trained in critical thinking by our parents and our schooling. Logic is of high value in how we determine ways to live our lives, how to respond to the methods others use in their living around us, and how to teach our young folks to make their own determinations.

We embark on any given project seeking particular results. We set goals with the objective before us and only then consider the process by which we might get there. We judge success by outcomes, not by what may have been learned along the way. And so, how does this crucifixion/resurrection thing we're in the mist of celebrating make sense for us? What is "this end" of which St. Paul speaks in his letter to the church in Rome?

Each year, we worship. We make good choices. We do our darndest to follow Christ's lead. By God's grace we do good works. We genuinely love our neighbors in thoughts, words, and deeds. We shout the good news of the empty tomb to everyone who will listen to us. And yet, we celebrate a resurrection which seems to us to be mostly mystical despite our confession of faith wherein we say, "I believe in the resurrection of the **body**...." And yet, death occurs around us. So often it's death that changes our day-to-day lives, not resurrection.

Easter is hard sometimes because while we're shouting, "HE LIVES!," we remain surrounded by our broken reality; death is real. We're drawn to ask common and difficult faith questions about the resurrection — "So what?" "And Jesus rising brings my loved one back exactly how?" "What's the point of celebrating one man's (Jesus') rising from the dead when no one else has done it?" "What and where is Heaven and how does Jesus dying and rising promise we'll go there?"

For an answer we can cling to, we turn to what St. Paul further tells us,

"We do not live to ourselves, and we do not die to ourselves. If we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord; so then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's." (Romans 14:7-8)

WHETHER WE LIVE OR WHETHER WE DIE, WE ARE THE LORD'S, shaky faith and all. This is the ultimate consequence of God's abounding and abiding love; Christ's death and resurrection ensures that our God is Lord of all. We practically receive a map to Heaven, a plan for the trip, God's very own itinerary for our fate. If God oversees these two realms, living and dead, we don't need GPS to tell us that Jesus leads the way to the place where there is no separation between us and life and/or us and love – life eternal in the Lord's holy and loving presence.

Allow this good news to penetrate through the rest of this Easter season, our celebration of Pentecost, and right on into the summer! We are the Lord's – those alive now, those coming after, and those we remember with lilies and tears. God did that for you; and, you're worth it!

Electronic Ministry Task Force

At the April Council Meeting, a discussion was held to determine if livestreaming services/electronic ministry will continue to be an ongoing ministry for Trinity. Most agreed this ministry has reached others that we normally would not have reached but also recognized its limitations especially with those who cannot or will not use this ministerial format. If electronic ministry is to remain as an ongoing ministry, we must define how that ministry will be structured, operated, maintained, and be prepared to make a significant capital investment in professional grade A/V equipment. At present we are using Andie Guiher's personal equipment and resources for our livestreaming ministry which is not sustainable long term. We are looking for two members of our congregation who are willing to serve on this Task Force to work along with Pastor, Council (2 persons), Worship and Music (1 person) and Learning and Youth (1 person), to formally evaluate and develop and formalize a prototype for this ministry. Once the prototype is developed, we can then determine the resources, human and technological and financial, reguired for this ministry and present those requirements to Council and the Congregation. The April breakfast meeting was held April Will STRY 10 with following attending: Mac McMas-





- Senior Care Focus This is a new initiative suggested to check in on our elderly members and provide communication and other help they may need including food. Dona Lerew and Judy Burgard are coordinating this effort which will follow a similar pattern of our Adopt a Homebound.
- Sharing Shelf Deb King is coordinating a new community sharing shelf using the current shelf in the alcove by the back entrance to the church, the shelf we use to share summertime garden offerings. This new project will provide canned goods and other donated items for

anyone in the community to take as they need and to leave other food items they don't need.
