Turning to My Neighbor

As summer begins, according to the Christian calendar, we are in Ordinary time. This is 'ordinary' in the sense of counting the time from Pentecost to Advent. These are no ordinary times! Remembering we are empowered by the Holy Spirit, this is time for active ministry with focused efforts of cultivation for a fruitful harvest in God's eyes. This is not only a time for outward efforts but also for continuous inner cultivation of our faith.

We are living in extraordinary times which require different efforts from all of us. Roman historian, Tacitus, wrote: "The desire for safety stands against every great and noble enterprise." Tacitus' "safety" referred to accepting the normative, even if corrupt. The transformation needed in antiquity is similar to the transformation facing us today. In the poignant wisdom of Ecclesiastes 1:9, "there is nothing new under the sun"!

Where am I headed with this? In these continuing extraordinary times, I want each of us to stretch inner and outer boundaries- real and perceived. Rather than asking who is my neighbor with cursory or distant acknowledgment, I exhort everyone to deeply consider what it means to "turn to my neighbor".

As Jesus taught, the second greatest commandment is, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Mark 12:31). Of course, your neighbor is not limited to the literal person living in the vicinity of your home or sitting nearby but anyone and everyone you encounter. To love someone as yourself, you must desire and strive to understand the person. Yes, even and especially the difficult ones.

In order to love your neighbor as yourself, you must first understand what it means to love yourself. We must do our inner work. Start local, then go global. We must do the transformative--challenging and comforting--inner work of excavating, truthfacing, loving, forgiving, and understanding ourselves in the fullness of our humanity and greater capacities. We must deal with the plank in our own eye (Luke 6:42), the corruption, confusion, or closedness in our own minds, and hardness of our own hearts, before we may see and truly perceive and receive our neighbor in the fullness of their humanity and greater capacities.

Tacitus also stated, "It is human nature to hate the one whom you have hurt." What if this applies to the self? Are you harboring hurtful actions/behaviors in your personal past? Are you held hostage to some history because punitive social realities have precluded public disclosure? Some personal questions are what/whether you have learned and grown from your experiences; have you earnestly repented and asked God's forgiveness; and have you forgiven yourself? This is some of the tough and tender loving inner work that ultimately will show in your outer life with others. If accountable grace is not active in your inner life, it cannot reach its fullness in your outer life. You must tend to the neighbor within to fully turn to an external neighbor. You are not alone for this work.

For people of the Christian faith, the Holy Spirit is with and within us to provide counsel-challenge and comfort. As we seek understanding, the Spirit aligns us with surprising messengers who help along our journey. It is the person who showed a 'random' kindness, who surprisingly spoke to us in the language of our heart, who gave of themselves seeking nothing but our benefit. When we pause to ponder such experiences, we realize we may or may not know their names. While the world indoctrinates us to suspiciously ask why these people would behave so graciously, the Spirit encourages us to question why not. Those messengers are our neighbors and model behavior God desires from all.

When we make a practice of turning to our neighbor, we strive to understand more than to be understood. We strive to love as we are loved by God. We strive to be curious companions and nurturing neighbors respecting the nuances of differing lived experiences. We become accountability partners calling one another in to courageous conversations for greater community rather than the blame-casting calling out common to the divisive world. Instead of seeking comfort and control, our Christian faith requires our active courage and challenge to affect change as the Spirit leads according to God's will.

The world and its ways are quite a piece of convoluted work, corrupted and estranged from our Creator. But know this: The world is polarized and seductively powerful, but a pitiful, pittance of its promise! God has granted within each of us a greater power to transform the world. That God-given power must be embraced, cultivated, proclaimed and practiced by those who profess to be followers of Christ.

As a priesthood of believers, we are entrusted to love our neighbors as ourselves, to strive by active learning and turning, all bearing responsibility for outreach. There is no need to wait for a special conference-wide or church-wide initiative, event, book study, etc. Pointing fingers at who has not done what is not becoming of followers of Christ, nor is it helpful. Instead, we are all prompted and empowered to strive for what we can do to make life-

MISSIONS

Crossroads Urban Center

The mission statement of the Crossroads Urban Center states that it is a nonprofit grassroots organization that assists and organizes Utahns with low incomes, those with disabilities, and people of color to meet basic survival needs and to address essential issues affecting quality of life. Crossroads was established on February 8, 1966 as a multi-faith, community based project that is in a covenant relationship with the United Methodist Women National Office. The United Methodist Women own the building that is the main office for Crossroads and it is maintained by the Board of Directors of Crossroads Urban Center.

Crossroad Urban Center has developed a community organization to provide services that are not available from other organizations in the Salt Lake City area. This organization is supported by many religious communities, businesses, individuals and foundations. Crossroads has started many individual groups that work within the community such as Coalition of Religious Communities (CORC), Powerful Moms Who Care, Poplar Neighborhood Alliance, and many more. The staff at Crossroads lobbies at the Utah Capital for low-income housing and to end homelessness and housing instability by creating safe, affordable, homes. They lobby for medical care for everyone and ending child homelessness.

Crossroads has the busiest Emergency Food Pantry in Utah, a Thrift Store that has





been open since 1996 and the West Side Pantry that opened in 2017 and provides food for low income families. The Crossroads office connects low-income people with state and Federal service agencies. In November, 2020, Crossroads Urban Center gave 3,483 frozen turkeys to families for their Thanksgiving Dinner. At Christmas 2020, this organization put together 526 food baskets plus a turkey for the holidays.

Hilltop United Methodist Church supports Crossroads Urban Center by collecting food on the first Sunday of each month and donates it to the Food Pantry. The Mission Committee and United Methodist Women donate money each year to help support Crossroad Urban Center and the services they provide in our community.


This Month's Book: Peppe the Lamplighter Story by Elisa Bartone, Pictures by Ted Lewin

Available in the Salt Lake County and Salt Lake City Library systems

This month's featured story is a work of historical fiction loosely based on a story the author heard about her own grandfather. Peppe's family emigrated from Italy to New York City, where they lived in a tenement house on Mulberry Street in Little Italy. He wants to help support his family, as his father is sick and his mother is dead. He diligently looks for work, and after many rejections, he finds a job as a lamplighter, lighting the gas streetlamps each evening. He is proud of his accomplishment, but his father is angry, perhaps wishing that Peppe was able to go to school and learn instead of work. One evening when a discouraged Peppe delays lighting the lamps, he learns the importance of a lamplighter's job. His entire family, even his father, comes to realize the value of Peppe's work and his meaningful contribution to the community. The pictures bring Peppe's world to life and include thoughtful use of lamplight to draw the reader's attention. We enjoyed this visit to a bygone era in New York City, and I hope you will, too!

Clark- I liked when Peppe's father told him to light the lamps even though he didn't want to.

Questions for Reflection and Discussion

- 1. What would it feel like to immigrate to a foreign country? How would you find work, housing, a school, a church, or friends? What would make you feel welcome?
- 2. What if you had a job instead of going to school? How would you feel if you had to earn money to support your family? How did Peppe feel about his work as a lamplighter?
