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Greetings!

I pray that your summer is going well! And by that I really mean I hope you have been able to get some rest and relaxation in. As I write this, I'm grateful that several of our staff have already begun their summer vacations. It's a little quieter around the parish without their company, but it is a very good thing that they, and you, can get some time for recreation.

The quieter days of summer always bring my mind back to the Sabbath, the seventh day of rest, pronounced by God at creation. The Sabbath is a rich topic for consideration and meditation, especially because it is such a unique idea in the ancient world. In the twenty-first century, many of us have a couple of days each week to do "not-work" stuff. Some of us get a single day for that. But throughout the ages, a day for "not-work" would have been unthinkable, a waste of a day's wages or labor, even seen as irresponsible for those with mouths to feed at home. And yet, throughout the Scriptures, God consistently calls his people to hold a particular day out of the week for rest, for "not-work."

History shows us that the idea of the Sabbath has caused much debate over the millennia, and we can even see that in the Gospels, Jesus was in regular conversations with his contemporaries about the nature of the Sabbath (Matthew 12 would be a good place to start looking if you're curious). Despite the many disputes around the Sabbath, the insight behind the command to "keep the Sabbath day holy" is that human beings need to rest so that we do not become exhausted; and human beings need a chance to recognize that God will provide for us. Thus, in taking a day for "notwork," the ancient Israelites were meant to have a day where they relied on God and His provision for them; placing all cares, occupations, and burdens on God. There's not enough space here to unpack how amazing this is, but for now, we can consider anew that Christ, as Lord of the Sabbath, means for us to find our truest peace and rest in him.

Which is to say, as the gathered people of God hard at work in the vineyard of our wonderful parish of Saint John's, it is very good for us to get the rest we need. And when we do so, let us rest not apart of Christ, but rejoice that by his blessings are we truly re-created. Thus even by our rest is Christ magnified because by true recreation, by our recognition of God's provision for us, and by His life in us, can we be ready for whatever is coming next.

A restful recreation in summer means an exciting fall ahead, beloved!

Treasurer's Report

I have summarized information below on the present financial status of Saint John's Church for May 31, 2021. Operating revenue and expense through May combined are:

- Total income of \$463,125.73 is <\$34,442.11> under budget for the year to date. Total pledges are under budget for the year by <\$9,938.85>. Contributions and plate of \$31,712.12 are <\$29,954.53> under budget for the year to date.
 Miscellaneous income and bequests of \$102,113.92 are \$5,451.27 over budget.
- Expenses of \$503,083.12 are \$52,523.46 under budget for the year to date.
- Net loss is <\$39,957.39> vs. budgeted loss of <\$58,038.74>.
- Operating Funds had a balance of \$81,584.40 as of May 31, 2021.

As you can see, we are not too far from budget. We are hopeful that in-person attendance will continue to improve along with our contributions and plate revenue. If there are additional items that are of interest to you, please feel free to contact me. My email is billchev@gmail.com.


Getting to Know... Bur Vestry
