I've Been Meaning to Ask...

How easy is it for us to get derailed by our own preconceived notions? The world is proliferated with signs, symbols, and imagery. The idiom: "a picture paints a thousand words" has merit but what if the picture painted isn't the full picture. We see signs or flags on lawns, vehicles, or buildings that may have a different meaning than what we perceive. The intent of the sign or symbol may be different from the interpretation depending on the lens through which we see. Similarly, we may get only partial impressions of people without understanding the true layers or nuances of their personalities, experiences, or perspectives.

In 1 Corinthians 13:12, Paul teaches, "For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known." (NRSV).

Presently, we may not see ourselves as clearly as we will, let alone our neighbors. We do not know what we do not know across a spectrum of topics and concerns in the world. Rather than jumping to conclusions while 'we see in a mirror dimly', we must take the opportunity to dig deeper and engage differently for compassionate understanding. If we will do the work of striving for truth and listening deeply for clarity (even if we disagree), time will surely come when we will fully and clearly know and understand as we have been known and understood by God. That's fantastically thorough knowing and understanding! We can start with a simple inquiry.

In August, we will engage a sermon series entitled, "I've been meaning to ask…"--a series for curiosity, courage, and connection. Along with sermons, there will be supporting resources for interactions beyond Sunday and beyond August. It is my hope to stir hearts and minds toward courageous conversations that expand understanding, encourage openness, and that deepen our connections with God and one another. The phrase, "I've been meaning to ask," expresses interest and willingness to listen. It makes way for active hospitality, healing, help, and hope that expresses the heart of Christ. It is an opening to draw our individual and collective circles wider. It is an opportunity to not only invite more people to the table but to listen for their unique voices in the dialog and receive their stories.

I've Been Meaning to Ask...How Can We Keep From Singing?

I am curious about what lies deep inside people.

Making music is all about communicating. Yes, there are things to master like pitch, rhythm, dynamics, tone, blend, diction, word stress, shaping a phrase, etc. But it all boils down to communication.

Music is not a piece of paper with little black dots all over it. Rather, music is an impossible-to-define feeling. Music exists only in time; when it is done, it is done, and can never be reproduced in the same way.

In the words of John Coltrane: *My music is the spiritual expression of what I am - my faith, my knowledge, my being ... When you begin to see the possibilities of music, your desire to do something really good for people, to help humanity free itself from its hangups ... I want to speak to their souls.*

Music communicates emotion. It is said that music communicates that which words cannot; it goes in the ear and straight to the heart. If two choirs sing the exact same piece and one choir is technically perfect but devoid of emotion, and the other choir may have a few technical mistakes but is singing from the soul, which choir will be judged to be better? Which choir will have actually communicated, touched hearts? Music is meant not to portray emotion, but to *evoke* emotion, and there is a big difference between the two. One focuses the self inward and the other focuses the self outward, to others. Music is an incredible force and a great uniter.

To sing from the soul, a singer must become totally vulnerable and be willing to lay bare his/her soul. This can be uncomfortable and difficult for some, requiring courage and trust. But it is a level of musicmaking that, once discovered, opens a whole new world of beauty and intimacy with our fellow human beings.

Connecting with others in this way is deeply rewarding, developing community, and knowing that we actually can effect change in transformative ways.

A Mission from Home

Last year, Cheryl Gentle and Shirley Primeau asked the Montoya-Scarborough family to consider being in mission (as a sponsor) to Tomasa Natividad Morales Saquic, a junior in high school in Guatemala, Central America. Hilltop and our Missions Team have been providing a scholarship to Tomasa for several years now and so we said yes.

Through letter writing and sharing of pictures we introduced Tomasa to the Montoya-Scarborough's, that's correct, all of us-Maria Scarborough Montoya, Mike, Talia Scarborough, Gabriella, Autumn Scarborough, and Ann and me.... Whoops, almost forgot Johnny the black lab!

This mission from our home only requires a family write 2-3 letters a year and the church's commitment to an annual scholarship pledge for each current school year.

Pura Vida is the non-profit organization in Colorado that our church and many organizations across the country interact with and they make it all possible. So easy, as they do the language translations and it's all on line in an easy to use portal. All letters and pictures are simply uploaded prior to the due dates required in making this commitment as a sponsor.

Tomasa is in her 2nd year of studies to become a preschool bilingual teacher. During 2020 and 2021 she has been doing a combination of at home and in school learning. She says on-line is a little complicated because at times it is too slow and affects her work. She is a hard worker and has made a commitment to finish well this year with good grades.



Several of our family members have been to Guatemala and spent time in her beautiful country seeing Guatemala City, Antigua, and a highland village in Totonicapán. Ann and our sister-in-law Jacque traveled there during their country's civil war to finalize the adoption of Maria. Then, after her high school graduation Maria and dad (Bob) spent nearly 4 weeks working on a short term mission with Habitat for Humanity International helping Guatemalan's prep and build homes outside the small mountain village of Totonicapán (Toto).

When we asked Tomasa what some of her interests and goals, she said; I like to study, sing, and read and to see a variety of films. Her big goal someday is to see our mountains and our snow!

Remember, all things are possible and blessed when we are in mission to serve others with our time, talents and treasure. In Cheryl's Sunday, July 25th message about her "Passion for Missions", think about the list of opportunities that we at Hilltop have to serve! This is just one example of being on a "mission from home".

Perceptions are our reality and we often want to have the last word before truly understanding the other person's point of view and he/she gets an opportunity to explain their feelings and notions.

Earlier this week, I posted on Linked In an article on Leadership. Three things to consider, as we work together in our commitment to be in service and mission to all our communities' needs at Hilltop UMC (and beyond, of course) and to become "True Servant Leaders" in listening to what God is calling us to do and to be. We do not need to be right; we just need to be clear when we communicate.

We do not need to have the last word in any discussion, debate, or dialogue.

We know longer have to try to show that it was our idea. We are able to empower other people to own the idea or action(s).

I think #2 is the hardest one for me. When I really, really use my effective listening skills with another person, I try very hard to understand his or her point of view and notion that is underlying the nuances or feelings of why they feel the way they do. It seems to me that when I ask open ended questions that help me to understand and to build a better relationship with the person. (Think, I've been meaning to ask.....).

As we all know, God empowers us to do and be servants and leaders. This empowerment "packs our parachute or backpack" with all the tools we need, when we need them. Use your curiosity and courage when asked the question, where do you want to serve? I can think of mentors and people who I have learned from and continue to learn from. Can you? Now think about God, those people and mentors as a force that you can use to do anything you/ we put our minds to do.
