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## **Greetings!**

For so many of our families, the turn from July to August is "go time." It's time to go get the most out of the waning days of summer vacation. It's time to go shopping for the return to school. And for our college students, perhaps even time to go off to campus.

In ministry, I often think of August as "go time" as well. As our families send their kids back to school for their academic formation, so do opportunities for Christian formation come back into our parish life. We've got a busy schedule ahead of us, and I am excited to encourage greater activity and growth for our programs for all ages!

While Beka and I were away, the importance of robust and active Christian education came into focus in a new way for me. We have a habit of visiting churches wherever we go, and we came across a Vespers service being offered at a local English-speaking Eastern Orthodox congregation. Having only read about Eastern Orthodoxy history and practice in books, I was genuinely excited to participate in what is roughly analogous to that great tradition's Evensong. What we found in that service was absolutely beautiful, but also completely alien in terms of its rhythm and idiom. Many of the texts used by the officiants were familiar but deployed very differently than we would be used to as Western Christians. I could tell that the journey towards proficiency in this tradition would take time, effort, and discipline; a process that I remembered fondly in that moment as I recalled all the time it took for my mentors to walk me through the prayer book tradition.

But what I found genuinely moving was the care that parents had for showing their children how they could participate in the service, how the children could make their parents' practice their own. Watching a young girl reverently light a candle in the sandbox and say a prayer with her father was humbling and sweet. As a newcomer to this liturgical world, I dare say that for a brief moment, I longed for that same kind of mentorship as I stumbled awkwardly through the rest of the liturgy.

I am deeply grateful for the experience, even as it confirmed my deep love of the Book of Common Prayer and the familiar patterns of English spirituality present in our tradition. And I came away excited for backpack blessings, children's chapel, rector's forums, newcomer classes, and all the great formation offerings to come. Therefore, I pray that we would greet with zeal the program year to come, seeking after Christ to make him known within our walls, within our families, and to all peoples who would hear the Gospel anew or afresh. It's going to be great and I'm very much looking forward to it!

## Senior Warden's Message

Recently, I read an article entitled "There's a Specific Kind of Joy We've Been Missing," by Dr. Adam Grant, a professor at the Wharton School and well-known author. While most people view emotions as internal and personal, Dr. Grant



argues that they are inherently social, and that peak happiness lies mostly in collective activity. He points to something called "collective effervescence," a concept coined in the early twentieth century to describe the "sense of energy and harmony people feel when they come together in a group around a shared purpose." One passage particularly struck me: in cultures where people pursue happiness socially — "through connecting, caring and contributing — people appear to be more likely to gain well-being." Dr. Grant says that, as we emerge from the isolation of the pandemic, now is a perfect time to think of flourishing as a collective endeavor. In his words, "joy shared is joy sustained."

I have been having a lot of conversations lately about what is at the core of the Saint John's community — who we are, what we value most, and what we want the outside world to know about us as we move forward from the transitions of the past few years. Resoundingly, I hear that Saint John's builds and sustains relationships — our personal relationship with God through Christ, the fabric of our treasured relationships with one another in this beautiful place, and the relationship of our church with the larger Tulsa community.

As summer winds down and the new beginnings of fall are on the horizon, I invite you to renew your relationships here at Saint John's with fresh intention. Connecting and contributing with us can strengthen not only your own well-being, but that of all of us together.

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# Treasurer's Report

Planned Giving will be a primary focus for Saint John's Episcopal Church for 2021.

A beneficiary designation is one of the simplest ways to make a gift to Saint John's Church. It's



literally as easy as filling out a form. You can specify the individuals and charities you want to support and you can also specify the percentage of the assets you want each beneficiary to receive. Beneficiary designations are available when giving the following assets:

#### Retirement Assets

An alternative to a bequest gift is to designate Saint John's Church as the beneficiary of your retirement assets. This gift is simple because you can control the transfer of these assets at your death without changing your will or living trust. All you need to do is request (and complete) a new beneficiary designation form from your plan administrator. There is no need to modify your will or living trust.

A gift of retirement assets has the added advantage of being among the most tax-wise ways to make an estate gift. This is because your retirement assets, if left to individuals, will be subject to income tax when they receive distributions and, in the case of most non-spouses, those distributions must take place within ten years, potentially pushing designated beneficiaries into higher tax brackets. With a gift to a non-profit such as Saint John's Church, 10 percent of the funds are available for its charitable purposes. If you want to remember us in your estate plan, it is often better to leave other types of assets — cash, securities, real estate — to your heirs and give the more heavily taxed retirement asset to Saint John's Church.

#### Life Insurance

Life Insurance policies can also be used to make a gift to our church. Complete and return to the insurance company a form designating that the Saint John's Church receives all or a portion of the death benefit associated with your life insurance policy. As an alternative to naming the church as the beneficiary, you can transfer ownership of the policy. Transferring ownership results in an immediate income tax charitable deduction and potential income tax savings in the year of the gift.

#### Other Assets

Commercial Annuity Contracts — a commercial annuity will sometimes have a remaining value at the end of the annuitant's lifetime. You can name Saint John's Church to receive all or part of this amount by designating it as a beneficiary (sole or partial) on the appropriate form from the insurance company.

Bank Accounts — you can instruct your bank to pay Saint John's Church all or a portion of what remains in a checking or savings account. Your bank can provide you with the appropriate beneficiary designation form.

Investment Accounts — you can instruct your investment company to transfer to Saint John's Church some or all investments held in the account at the time of your passing. Your broker or agent can let you know the process for doing this — it may be as simple as adding "T.O.D. to Saint John's Church" (which means transfer on death), after your name on the account.

# Getting to Know... Bur Vestry

This month we asked another of our newer Vestry members, Trent Shores, to share a little about himself and his family. We hope you enjoy reading this Q&A as much as we enjoyed learning about Trent.

Q: Tell us about your journey to Tulsa. A: I was born in Texas and raised in Oklahoma. I feel like a longtime Tulsan because I grew up here since 1983. But I've also lived in Houston, Edmond, Nashville, Norman, OKC, Washington, DC, and Muskogee. I returned to Tulsa from DC in in 2007 to serve as a federal prosecutor at the United States Attorney's Office.

Q: Where did you go for collegiate studies and what were your favorite classes? A: I graduated from Vanderbilt University with a degree in political science. Then I attended the University of Oklahoma where my favorite classes were Constitutional Law, Criminal Procedure and Federal Indian Law.

Q: Did you grow up in the Episcopal tradition? A: Yes, at Trinity Episcopal Church in Tulsa. My wife, Caitlin, and I joined the Saint John's family six years ago. We love the liturgy, music and people. And we are most excited about the future of Family and Children's Ministry here in the church.

Q: You recently changed work roles. Tell us more. A: I spent nearly eighteen years in public service at the United States Department of Justice, most recently as the Presidentially appointed and Senate confirmed United States Attorney for the Northern District of Oklahoma. Because the U.S. Attorney serves at the pleasure of the President, when the administration changed I moved into private practice at GableGotwals. I now advise clients regarding complex litigation, Native American law and policy, cybersecurity, and high stakes government and corporate investigations.

Q: You shared that Caitlin also has a career outside of the home. Tell us a little about her. A: Everything about Caitlin amazes me. She is an incredible wife, mother and business owner. She is the co-founder of W/S Commercial, a full-service, independent retail real estate firm specializing in landlord and tenant representation.

# Music News - Joseph arndt

Choral Evensong for the Feast of St. Mary the Virgin Sunday, August 15 at 5:30 p.m.

The Virgin Mary, Jesus' mother, is honored with a feast day of August 15 on the liturgical calendar. When August 15 falls on a Sunday (as it does this year), the feast is moved to Monday the 16th. We will celebrate St. Mary the Virgin with a special Evensong on Sunday evening at 5:30 p.m. on the eve of the "moved" feast.

# Concert: Musikalische Exequien by Heinrich Schütz Friday, October 22 at 7 p.m.

Heinrich Schütz (1585-1672) was the most significant German composer before Bach. He spent most of his career in Dresden, his musical life greatly impacted by the Thirty Years War. His work Musikalische Exequien was composed for the funeral services of Count Henry II of Reuss-Gera. It is thought to be the first Requiem in the German language, set in three parts. There will be an educational forum offered in advance of the concert details will be announced.



The concert will be performed by Adam Pajan, conductor; Sherezade Panthaki, soprano; Alissa Ruth Suver, soprano; Nicholas Garza, countertenor; Jeanise Wynn, alto; Steven Soph, tenor; Keith Lathrom, tenor; David Grogan, bass; Jason Awbrey, bass; Joseph Arndt, organ; Eric Smith, cello; and Michael Leopold, theorbo.

#### Meet Noah Smith, Our New Organ Scholar




# Getting to Know...Our Readers
