A Note from the Pastor

September 2021

Wow, August is over! It was a busy month for Gale and I. The first weekend, we left church, went to Brownsburg to celebrate our granddaughter's 11th birthday, then headed west on vacation. It's a two-day drive to our friend's cabin. Then we spent 6 days in the mountains of Montana before making the two-day trip home. While in the mountains we were away from phone and text service. The first time I experienced no service was about 12 years ago at the cabin. Initially, it was strange and somewhat discomforting. Now, I look forward to that experience each year. When we arrived home it was time to prepare the house for my daughter Jessica's wedding to Julius. It was long days trying to get ready and we pulled it off, well mostly "we" pulled it off. When we left for vacation, we thought we were going to have 30 people at the house. By the time we returned to civilization, the number had grown to 70. We can't say "THANK YOU" enough to those of you who donated food for Jessica and Julius' special day. Jessica wanted Dad to walk her down the aisle and to perform the ceremony which had us trying to figure out different options to accomplish both tasks. My brother Robin, who became a Baptist minister a few years ago, suggested he run the service until the blessing of the bride and then I could take over. It worked out great. (I hate to admit he is right so don't tell him I said so). The day after the wedding we were all in Brownsburg again to watch my granddaughter be baptized. A lot of great things packed in 31 days!!

As the first weekend in September arrives, we celebrate a special time. No, it is not just the Little Italy Festival. On Monday we will celebrate Labor Day. Labor Day came out of the Industrial Revolution. Labor Day was first celebrated in a parade in New York sponsored by the American Federation of Labor. In 1885, at their convention, it was suggested that a day be set aside to honor workers. There was a socialist backed suggestion of May 1 recognizing it on International Worker's Day. However, other union groups supported a march-and-picnic day in September. In 1887 Democratic President Grover Cleveland stated he favored the September date and in 1894 signed a bill into law making the first Monday in September Labor Day.

Labor, both union and non-union, is what has made this country the most productive nation in the world. We do have unions to thank for many things in this country. The main business of that 1885 convention mentioned above was to push for an 8-hour workday. Five-day work weeks, employer paid insurance, vacations, and many other benefits are attributed to Labor Unions.

As United Methodist, we have always had a drive to reach out to laborers. Even if it means going to where they work. Not as advocates, but as evangelists. John Wesley spent many early Sunday mornings at the coal mines. During Wesley's day miners worked 7 days per week and 12 hours per day. The mines had a day shift and a night shift (an old saying is that you can't tell the difference in the mine).

Wesley knew the miners had no time to get to church. Church services in those days ran for about 4 hours. The miners needed to go home, eat, sleep, and get ready to work again. Since shift change was very early in the mornings but that was not a hindrance to Wesley. John would go to the mines on Sunday mornings and meet with the day shift workers for church and communion before they headed into the mine. He then waited for the night shift to come out of the mine and he would minister to them as well. Wesley was often criticized for holding worship services, especially communion, outside of a church building. Eventually Wesley was banned from serving in a church because he served workers and others outside of the church buildings. Wesley believed, practiced, and taught the Biblical Doctrine that all people are of equal worth. Laborers and Management. Those who work with their hands and those who work in other ways.

The other big celebration coming up on September 12th is the kick-off to our 200th year celebration. It will be a church dinner at 12:00 noon and I am planning to see you there. We are the "First" United Methodist church because we are the "First" Methodist Congregation in Rockville. According to our history accounts, Rockville was founded in 1821 and the "First" Methodist congregation began in 1822 on the southeast corner of what is now the Courthouse lawn. We are in at least, our 4th location. The building we are in now has been expanded 4 times, 5 if you count the addition of the balcony. We are proud to be carrying on the legacy of the Methodists who started and continued the work of Christ in our community.

I am also excited to say you will be seeing improvements being made to the church building. The removal of the chimney, tuck pointing, and brick repair of the church will start this month. Roofing will follow when schedules allow. The stained-glass windows will soon follow. On behalf of the Administrative Council and myself, I promised you all that we would get these things done. By the Grace of God, your generosity, and the hard work of several in the congregation our church home is about to be made even more glorious. With the brick work we have plans to add a handicap ramp to access the front of the church. We have the money to proceed, but we will need more donations to keep moving forward.

We have many things that need to be done. There is a volunteer list of the items needed at the church. We ask that you select something you, or a group of you, can complete and help us to improve even more without running up more costs.

As a way to make the church safer for you and to protect the structure we have added a security system. It will also have smoke detection soon. We are installing emergency lights so if something happens, and the building is in the dark, you will have lights to illuminate the way out.

We are still doing things to make the church more energy efficient and reduce energy costs.

God is blessing us. Christ's light is shining strong. Our ministries are thriving. More ministries are being added. Our online viewership is increasing. Attendance is coming back up. The Holy Spirit is moving among us in many ways. I am so glad and honored to be a part of this church with all of you!!
