Hearing God's Word:

Today in church, the scriptures reminded us to focus on God, to be compassionate of others through prayer and action, and that God is always at work behind the scenes. Some of the scriptures we explored in church today included Esther 7:1-6, 9-10, and 20-22; Psalm 124; James 5:13-20; and Mark 9:38-50.

Esther's Request

So the king and Haman went in to eat with Queen Esther. They were drinking wine. And the king said to Esther on this second day also, "What are you asking for? I will give it to you. What is it you want? I will give you as much as half of my kingdom." Then Queen Esther answered, "My king, I hope you are pleased with me. If it pleases you, let me live. This is what I ask. And let my people live, too. This



is what I want. I ask this because my people and I have been sold to be destroyed. We are to be killed and completely wiped out. If we had been sold as slaves, I would have kept quiet. That would not be enough of a problem to bother the king." Then King Xerxes asked Queen Esther, "Who is he? Where is he? Who has done such a thing?" Esther said, "A man who is against us! Our enemy is this wicked Haman!" Then Haman was filled with terror before the king and queen. Harbona was one of the eunuchs there serving the king. He said, "Look, a platform for hanging people stands near Haman's house. It is 75 feet high. This is the one Haman had prepared for Mordecai, who gave the warning that saved the king." The king said, "Hang Haman on it!" So they hanged Haman on the platform he had prepared for Mordecai. Then the king was not so angry anymore. Mordecai wrote down everything that had happened. Then he sent letters to all the Jews in all the empire of King Xerxes. He sent letters to places far and near. Mordecai did this to have the Jews celebrate every year. They were to celebrate on the fourteenth and fifteenth days of the month of Adar. It was to celebrate a time when the Jews got rid of their

enemies. They were also to celebrate it as the month their sadness was turned to joy. It was the month when their crying for the dead was turned into celebration. Mordecai wrote letters to all the Jews. He wrote to tell them to celebrate those days as days of joyful feasting. It was to be a time of giving food to each other. And it was a time of giving presents to the poor.

Family Reflection: Women who Made a Difference


Let's talk about strong, wise women. You may have many strong, wise women in your life – your mother, grandmother, an aunt, neighbor, or friend. Let's remember some other strong, wise women from history and what they did to make a difference.

- Madam Curie was the woman who invented x-rays. Because of her we have a way to look inside our bodies and see our bones.
- Amelia Earhart was the first woman to fly by herself across the Atlantic Ocean. She loved flying and set many records.
- Pearl S. Buck, a woman who lived in China, wrote wonderful books, helped others, and adopted nine children. She was a wise woman.
- Rosa Parks was a woman who worked to make sure all people had certain rights, no matter what color their skin. This brave woman worked to make freedom possible for all.
- Helen Keller was a brave woman who was blind and deaf. She
 learned sign language and also read and wrote by using Braille.
 (Perhaps you have seen Braille on an elevator tiny bumps arranged
 so people who are blind can use their hands to read messages.) She
 worked very hard to help other people who had lost their sight.
- Pocahontas was a wise Indian woman who used friendship to make peace between the Native American people and the settlers.
- Antoinette Brown was the first woman since New Testament times ordained as a Christian minister, and perhaps the first woman in history elected to serve a Christian congregation as pastor.

Blessing of the Animals Family Activities



Play Animal Charades: One person acts out an animal (without making any noise!) as everyone else guess what creature is being portrayed.

Outside Together: Sit together outside your home and see how many animals you notice. Notice what the animals are doing. Are they searching for food? Are they playing together?

Family Adventure: Visit a petting zoo like the one at Catoctin Wildlife Preserve (https://catoctinwildlifepreserve.com) as a family for safe, direct interaction with animals that allows visitors to feed as well as touch the animals.

Waterfront Picnic: Pack a picnic basket and take a trip to a local pond or river. While there Talk about how wildlife is part of the environment that humans enjoy. Share your knowledge about how human actions affect wildlife, for example, share that feeding scraps of bread to waterfowl can actually harm them. Online, find information on encounters with animals in the wild, such as a Wildlife Safety section of the National Park Service website (www.nps.gov/kefj/planyourvisit/wildlife-safety.htm).

Make Vegan Dog Treats: Make vegan dog treats together as a family to give out as gifts or to treat your own furry companion. Consider donating some to the Zion Food Pantry and/or to a no-kill shelter, or for a fundraiser to benefit one (or both) of these places. In addition to the ingredients, you will need small resealable gift bags and stickers to list the ingredients and place any personalized message you desire. Don't forget to have fun decorating the bags together too! (*Recipe included on insert*)

 Joan Ruth Bader Ginsburg was the second woman to serve as an associate justice of the Supreme Court [Sandra Day O'Connor was the first]. She was an advocate for gender equality and womens' rights.


Thank you for brave people who spread your Word and thank you for all of the heroes of our faith. We thank you for the strong, wise women in our lives who are our very own superheroes.

Local Women Making a Difference:

Here are a few women from Washington County who made a difference in our world that could be considered modern-day super heroes.

- Ann Carroll Fitzhugh Smith was a civil rights figure. Born in Hagerstown, Ann Fitzhugh moved to NY state with her family where she married abolitionist and philantrophist Gerrit Smith. Together they were pioneers in the abolition and womens' rights movements. They conducted a station of the underground railroad from their home, purchased the freedom of slaves and helped to establish former slaves with new lives in the north and in Canada. She served as one of 174 delegates in 1837 for the first National Womens' Anti-Slavery Convention in NY city.
- Susan Cox was born in Hagerstown and after marrying moved to Illinois where she enlisted in the 83rd Illinois Infantry Nurse Corps. As a Civil War nurse she did much more than change bandages, tend wounds, and dispense medicine. Her responsibilities also included passing out supplies, writing letters for the injured soldiers, reading to them, cooking and serving meals, laundry and more often while being exposed to enemy fire.
- Gina Marie Groh, a native of Williamsport, MD helps ensure justice in the legal system as the Chief United States District Judge of the United States District Court for the Northern District of West Virginia located in Martinsburg, WV.
- Mayor Emily Keller, Hagerstown's current mayor is the first woman mayor of Hagerstown. She acts on behalf of the oppressed and marginalized people of Hagerstown giving them a voice in addition to representing all others. She also is the founder of Washington Goes Purple, an organization that brings awareness to the opioid crisis.



Family Activities:

Here are some activities you can do together as a family and discussion ideas to explore God's Word together.



Hero Masks: Cut out an eye mask and write JESUS IS MY HERO around the edge of the mask. Attach the masked eyes cut out with elastic to hold the mask on your head.

Create a Bag Puppet: Decorate a white or brown paper lunch bag as a woman HERO who serves Jesus or QUEEN ESTHER. Curly ribbon can be used for the hair as well as a crown drawn and colored and taped to the top of the bag puppet.



Decorate a Crown: Decorate a crown fit for Queen Esther. Different colors of tissue paper, sequins, and glitter can be used to decorate it with jewels. Use colorful paints or markers to write special words to remember from today's lesson.


Connect with God Together: In James 5:13 we are told that anyone who is having troubles [or is afraid] should pray. Create paper airplanes to write or draw your worries, fears or troubles that you want to take to God in prayer. Then as an act of prayer throw them to symbolize the release of those concerns to God. James 5:14 goes on to tell us that anyone who is happy should sing praises. After you have given your troubles and fears to God in prayer, put on some worship songs and spend time singing,

dancing, and praising God together.
