I figured that meant I'd shut my office door more than usual, which is, like... never. Then, the retreat was made to be in-person. Whew! (wipes perspiration from brow) That was a busy three weeks! I'm glad to be home and in the office again! Work is much more restful than vacation... (ok, not all agree)

While I'm very glad to be back, the time away, even if two of the weeks were sort of a surprise, was glorious in ways I didn't expect. I want to thank you all for your flexibility in allowing me the time to travel a bit, connect with friends, see different things (like the making of maple syrup and goat cheese), do honest spiritual work with colleagues, and simply be refreshed. The Claggett Center, just south of Frederick, MD, is an Episcopal retreat center and the location of the continuing education event I attended. The learning was outstanding! The fellowship was refreshing! The time away with a room to myself was delightful! Most impressive on the grounds was the repurposing of the silo into a chapel:





Sitting in here by myself for prayer and meditation was

soul-nourishing. I loved the way the light filters down from the skylight at the top of the silo through the glass ceiling and onto the altar at the center. The acoustics in the silo are outstanding! But alas... COVID did not permit us to sing. I was reminded here that God repurposes even us when we think we're finished with something, always leading us to a new life. Refreshing time away from the day-to-day work of ministry was a nice break. It also allowed me to sit and pray and read scripture and think and discern about our future: both the return to whatever normal is after the pandemic, and what ministry will look like for Trinity in the years to come. Where is the Lord calling us to make the biggest impact on the world Christ died for?

I hope you'll join me in conversation about and participation around two priorities I've discerned for right now, anchors to hold onto as we continue to navigate this strange world together:

1 – We, at Trinity, have been injured in our spirits, not only by another pastoral transition and the "regular" joys and heartbreaks of life, but by the philosophical and political divide in our country and the world. On top of that – COVID and the fear, anxiety, annoyance, suspicion and anger it brings – not to mention the loneliness and stress of the isolation while we're distancing ourselves. **We need to heal, allowing God to fill our spirits with the Holy Spirit.** It'll take time; let's hold hands and do it together, for at the heart of each of us is love for God and one another. We'll be focusing on spirituality and God's healing as we plan events, worship services, service projects, and meetings in the future. Stay tuned!

2 – We, at Trinity, are a congregation committed to our mission. The pandemic has scattered members and made prospective attendees leery about physically going into any public space, let alone Trinity. And yet, our online presence could be stronger, and we're challenged to meet the needs of **all** of our members as well as continue to serve our neighbors in a welcoming and accessible way. **God is leading us to find new and innovative ways of doing mission, being present, and loving those who are reluctant to come into the building and those who only know us online.** I invite you to join with me and several others from the congregation to attend an 8-month program (one meeting per month on a Saturday morning) program called "Hybrid Church Academy." We'll learn more about ourselves, the post-pandemic world, and how to get out of God's way and let God nourish us in a different expression of Church. Please let me know if you'd like to learn more. The global Church of Jesus Christ, in all its denominations, has tended throughout history to undergo a fairly strong reformation every 500 years give or take a decade or two. Church leaders have spoken for years about how "it's coming," and the pandemic has brought the opportunity for reform here. I'm not talking about changing the things at Trinity that we know and love about our tradition and our worship and our gathering. In fact, I'm banning the word "change" from our conversations. I'm talking about God breaking into the world in new and innovative ways, like God does. Let's all step back together and watch what God is about to do. Our Creator has got this wobbly world in this chaotic time in the palm of his hands. I bet what God does with this big blue ball that we call home and the life on it is nothing short of miraculous!

July Financial Report



We've hit the Summer Slump! For the second consecutive month our giving for current expenses has fallen short of budgeted receipts. July results reported "Current" income of \$12,352 against budgeted income of \$16,473 as a shortfall of \$4,121. Year to date "Current income is \$103,404 against budgeted income of \$115,311 for a deficit of \$11,907. Favora-

bly, expenses year to date have been lower than projected but at the end of July our current income against current expenses reflected a YTD shortfall of \$5,694. Synod Benevolence Income is exceeding budget by \$1,465. Cash on hand to meet "current" expenses at July 31 is \$23,061. With church activities ramping up we do expect expenses to return to budgeted levels for the remainder of the year. Meeting our monthly budgeted income requirements of \$16,473 for the last 7 months of the year is vitally important to the ministry of Trinity. If you are not currently doing so, please consider weekly, bi-weekly, semi-monthly or monthly contributions through Trinity's Simply Giving Program managed by Vanco.

SHARE THE HARVEST As an extension of the success of our Sharing Shelf, Trinity will continue the Share the Harvest program. Anyone wishing to offer produce, flowers, etc. is encouraged to bring those goods and place them in baskets in the Narthex upstairs. This produce will be offered to anyone in the congregation. Donations received for these goods will be used to continue funding the purchase of food for the Sharing Shelf. Any goods left after the worship service will be placed on the Sharing Shelf for those in need of food.

Electronic Giving is a great way to support our congregation and its many ministries throughout the year! Your offering comes through even when you cannot attend worship. The "Share the Harvest "program is also helping to fund this ministry. Some may have thought this ministry is funded by New Hope Ministries (Food Pantry). While New Hope has provided some food donations, this ministry is solely funded and operated by Trinity.

Donations of non-perishable food is always welcomed. We have received some requests from our guests to have toilet tissue and other paper products. These items for the shelf will be greatly appreciated! Thank you for your support of this wonderful ministry.



Actively Seeking a Mission in Motion Team Lead 8/20/21

First and foremost, anyone engaging in mission work should have a heart for service and a strong belief in Jesus Christ, our Savior. Armed with faith and fortitude, anything is possible.

Organization - it is helpful to have a method of documenting projects. The dynamic nature of mission work is dictated by need in the community and beyond, and quite often multiple projects are in play at one time. Multiple projects require organization and some documentation.

Delegation - it is not necessary to take on more than you can handle. The volunteers who are on your team have a heart for service, too, and they are always willing to step up and help out when you need them. Our volunteers have many gifts; we just need to give them a chance to share their gifts as we do this work. Sometimes, it will be necessary to encourage them.

Communication - keeping the volunteers, Pastor, and the church council informed is a critical component of this role. However, the pastor is quite often already a participant in the planning sessions, and the church council provides a liaison to Mission in Motion. So, simply sending a message to these groups to update and coordinate is essential to forward progress.

In addition, communication with folks who need help, and organizations who offer help, will be part of the role of the Team Lead. Calls into the church office with a service perspective may be referred to the Team Lead. While we respond to every call, we don't take on every project. Communicating with the Mission in Motion Team to discuss service opportunities is key.

Finally, be assured you are not alone in this work. Let the Holy Spirit guide you and the team. Pray about the opportunities and move forward knowing that the Holy Spirit is with you. Open your heart to possibilities. Open your ears to hear God's words. Service work can be life-changing - not just for those who receive our help, but for those who are moved to serve. **KNOTTY KNOTTERS:** The Knotty Knotters will continue



meeting the second and fourth Wednesdays of every month to make knotted quilts for folks in need. We will meet <u>September 8 and September 22 from</u> <u>2:00-4:00pm</u>. If you can tie a knot, we hope that you will consider joining this group. Due to circumstances from this

Church Council

Have you ever served or considered running for an elected position on Church Council? If not, why?

To say the last two years has been a challenge would be an understatement. In addition to having a pastoral vacancy, we have had to deal with all the uncertainties and decisions thrust upon us due to the pandemic. Following our last Congregational Meeting November 2020, there were two unfilled council positions. As a result of the pandemic and restricted church activities, Council temporarily consolidated certain functions and did not actively seek to fill those positions. Those positions remain open and unfilled. Now that we are resuming a more normal church life, the need to fill those positions has become evident. In addition, there will be a total of 4 Council seats to be filled/elected at our upcoming Congregational Meeting in November.

The purpose of this article is very simply to plant the seed for your consideration in serving on one of the available seats on Council. The church does not run by itself but through the service and guidance of our members and elected Council representatives. We ask each of you to prayerfully consider volunteering and serving a 3-year term on Council. Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church Council Meeting August 19, 2021

Present: Pastor Susan, Bob King, Bill Tritsch, Louise Haugh, Mark Boyer, Dona Lerew, Judy Burgard, Stephanie Haley, and Noah Rinehart, Sue Clauser, and Karen Sheaffer Absent: Lisa Miller, and Jake Sharrer

Bob called the meeting to order at 7 PM Pastor Susan asked that we do the Devotions before we review the agenda. She presented us with a Council Meeting Liturgy which we used. She explained that this heightens our awareness that "We are the Church" and that our whole meeting is done in prayer. Also, the prayer in this liturgy includes these words- remind us always that we are about His business and not our own.

Secretary's Report

The minutes were reviewed. Judy made a motion to approved the minutes, Bill seconded, all agreed and the motion carried.

Treasurer's Report

The printed reports were reviewed. Bob noted that we did not meet budget for the months of June and July. Our expenses were heavy in July due to paying our semi-annual insurance bills.

Ministry Reports

Learning & Youth & Worship & Music

- The consensus of the committee is to plan to hold Sunday School in person, following the guidelines as presented by the COVID Task Force (recommending that all members who are not vaccinated wear a mask for the safety of themselves and others in the congregation) thus including the children who are under 12
- To allow for social distancing, the Sunday School classrooms will rearrange as needed to allow for more space based upon the number of children in each classroom. Nursery will remain, K-2 will utilize the parlor area, 3-6 will meet in the social hall, confirmation class will meet in the gathering space upstairs (narthex) Adult Sunday School will meet in the sanctuary. Karen will utilize the music/choir room to meet with the children for music with the exception of nursery as she will meet in their classroom.
- Sunday School will run 10:30-11:30 (while in person)
- To assist in the planning, Lisa will reach out to the families via phone to gauge their comfort level and considerations for the fall in terms of attendance. Considerations will be made by the committee based upon the feedback to determine the need for a virtual option. UPDATES on responses below:
- ⇒ Lisa contacted 15 Trinity families informing them of the committee's suggestion for in-person Sunday School, mask recommendation for all unvaccinated members, and social distancing efforts
- \Rightarrow 11/15 were live conversations or call back responses
- ⇒ Those who responded stated that they are in support of the efforts the committee is planning to put into place, 3 families specifically stated that they wish to avoid the zoom format if possible as it was difficult for them to manage/maintain focus of children, 1 family stated that they are waiting on updates regarding children's vaccination prior to making a final decision.
- The curriculum has been planned out and matched to the church

year calendar, two new Spark books have been purchased.

- Rally Day (September 19, 2021) will go on as planned as an inperson event and follow a ride, roll or stroll activity in which members are invited to bring their wheels (bicycles, skateboards, roller skates, scooters, strollers, wagons, fancy cars....) as we make our way down to the community park for fun, play and a (bagged) picnic lunch. Members young and old are encouraged to decorate their "wheels" as a fun extension to the celebration. (Decorations will be collected for those wanting to decorate) The pavilion must be reserved.
- Teen Time was discussed and how that could possibly look. It was suggested that an adult would be needed to initiate the sessions and facilitate as necessary. The committee views that this should be a time of fellowship with their peers and allow the teens to suggest what they wish to do and achieve during this time. A few suggested activities/ideas discussed: assist with younger classroom activities, play games, crafts (tie dye, tie blankets), service projects (health kits for share shelf, assist with Lions Club or cemetery activities, rake leaves, shovel snow), plan fun church events.
- Our next Learning and Youth meeting has been set for Tuesday, September 7, at 6 p.m.

The committee reviewed the financial results for July. July results reported "Current" income of

\$12, 352 against budgeted income of \$16,473 as shortfall of \$4,121. Year to date "Current income is \$103,404 against budgeted income of \$115,311 for a deficit of \$11,907. Favorably, expenses year to date have been lower than projected but we are at the end of July our current income against current expenses reflected a YTD shortfall of \$5,694. Synod Benevolence Income is exceeding budget by \$1,465.

With church activities ramping up we do expect expenses to return to budgeted levels for the remainder of the year so meeting budgeted income will be critical for the remainder of the year.

The Financial Audit report and worksheets prepared by Jack Crackett were reviewed and presented by the Audit Committee. A few minor text changes were made to the report and the report was then approved by the Finance Committee and signed by Charlie and Kim. Jack could not attend the meeting so Bob will get Jack's signature on the report in preparation to submit to Council for approval at the August 19 meeting.

Updates to the Endowment Fund status were provided. This included the following:

- Details of the principal of \$190,000
- Statement dated June 30 reflecting a balance of \$314,723
- Confirmation of the contribution of \$15,000 received in the Endowment Fund July 12

- Submission of our request to withdraw \$10,000 to fund the Endowment Holding Account for Benevolence requests
- Details of 2020 Benevolence payments.

All documents referenced have been placed in the Endowment Fund File.

2022 Budget preparation was discussed. As soon as August has been closed, Sue will provide a download of YTD 2021 and 2020 YTD Budget vs. Actual data. That data along with detail spending information will be provided to the Council Reps on or before September 10 to provide time to meet with their respective Committees for their input for 2022 budget requirements. Budget recommendations will be due back to the Finance Committee on or before September 24. Finance committee will meet September 30 to review that information.

Worship & Music Committee:

1. Reviewed recent worship services.

2. Discussed what worship practices we may want to modify as we move into NEW NORMAL:

- a. Pastor will begin changing communion distribution this Sunday: 7/4. The kits will still be used for safety, but congregation will be invited to come forward via the center aisle to get their elements (in the form of a kit) from the pastor, and return to their seat via the side aisle, then partake in the elements. This will emphasize the "community" dimension of the sacrament. Ushers will need to be watchful for folks who don't come up for the elements and offer the kits to them in their seats.
- b. No change in offering
- c. Acolytes will resume in Sept
- d. Choir will resume in Sept

3. Property Committee is looking into the installation of a railing up to the pulpit, per our request. Info on that pending.

4. We'd like to do a special appeal to members of the congregation to return in-person on Sept 12 (Sunday after Labor Day), as Rally Day. Choir has resumed. Sunday School has resumed. We want to bring everybody back who has not been attending in-person. Details on how we do this pending.

5. We are looking at replacements for the White Paraments.

6. We will include the increased cost for the Sunday's & Seasons tool in the 2022 budget.

Pastor's Report

Pastor Susan gave us her September 2021 calendar, noting that is subject to change as other needs arise.

Old Business

1) Covid Task Team- no change for now. They met and discussed next steps to take if needed.

2) Live Stream/AV strategy-the two meetings were held and something new called Hybrid Church may affect the way we continue with the equipment needs. More information to come later.

3) New Website Development-The new site went live on August 14. The next meeting is Tuesday, August 24 to work on more content.

4)Policy/Covenant relating to Convicted Sex Offenders-Mark is working on this and will have information for Bob soon.

5)Pastor Susan's installation service-will be held on September 26 at 2:30. The service will be held followed by a light meal of sandwiches, etc. A sign up sheet is needed to plan for the meal.

6) Office furniture - Pastor would like to have comfortable seating in her office. Mark offered to help her plan what is needed.

New Business

1) Finance-Council discussed the 2022 budget timeline and reviewed the audit report. A motion was made by Pastor Susan for accept the Audit Report dated July 30, Stephanie seconded, all were in agreement and the motion passed. Bob noted that he can continue to be the committee representative that reports to council.

2)Mutual Ministry-committee members include Anita Madsen, Charlie Hoffman, Karen Sheaffer, Bill Tritsch. A motion to ratify those members was made by Judy, Louise seconded, all were in agreement and the motion passed.

3)Hybrid Church-Pastor Susan reported that there is an eight session, online, interactive training program for leaders beginning October 2 and running through June 11, 2022. It is held Saturday mornings 9-11 AM. Four people are needed, and Kay Hinkle, Dona Lerew, Noah Rinehart, and Pastor Susan have agreed to this.

4)Council terms-Bob reported on upcoming terms expiring and asked those ending their third year to consider staying on another three years and report to him.

5)Benevolence-Bob gave a written chart of the categories ie local, regional/ worldwide, disaster relief, and special needs. He asked us to consider these and make suggestions where funds can be distributed.

6)Constitution Amendment-Bill presented a recommendation to council that the wording "at least one of whom may be a youth or a young adult" in Chapter 12..01 of Congregation Council be stricken in order to rid the reader from confusion with Chapter 12.02.02. Bill made the motion to approve the change, Dona seconded, all were in agreement and the motion passed.

7)September's Council Meeting will be held on September 16 due to the preparing of Fall Fest on September 11.

Council Meeting was adjourned with a sending prayer and the Lord's Prayer.
