What is Stewardship?

Stewardship refers to the sharing of our time, talent, and treasure. It is a means by which we can strengthen and deepen our faith. As Christians, we believe that all that we have and all that we are comes from God. So, it makes sense that we are stewards of these precious gifts. Being good stewards brings us closer to God.

Sounds easy enough, but how do we do it?

By giving of ourselves. At Saint John's Church, we have a long history of being an active and generous congregation. Each of us contributes to the life of the parish by attending services. But we contribute in many other ways that feed our souls while helping our parish to thrive, from singing in the choir or ushering to serving at coffee hour or teaching Sunday School.

We have also committed to more outreach, from assisting Edison High School to contributing volunteer hours to Iron Gate, to supporting mission programs and churches.

Making a financial commitment to the church in the form of a pledge rounds out our stewardship obligation by giving back to God and providing the financial foundation for all that Saint John's does.



By making a pledge. A pledge is an annual commitment made in good faith to give an amount of money to the church in regular installments (weekly, monthly, quarterly, or annually), chosen by you. Each year in the fall, we have our annual campaign to invite pledges from parishioners. Pledges are typically made then or at any time during the year as you wish.

By making our pledges a spiritual practice. As Jesus said in the Sermon on the Mount, "Where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." Pledging enforces our connection to God through our support of God's house. It is our duty to support our church; this is how we live out good stewardship.

On a practical level, there is no "membership fee" at church. Instead, we are asked to join in the voluntary practice of pledging. Our pledges help Saint John's to organize and fund its mission and ministries for the coming year when preparing the budget.

Comprised of many committed parish choral members, the choir and program will be led by Joseph Arndt, conductor, and feature: Adam Pajan, organ soloist, Meray Boustani, soprano soloist, Nicholas Garza, countertenor soloist, Steven Soph, tenor soloist, and Jason Awbrey, baritone soloist.

On November 5, Saint John's will host an event in memory of composer Marcel Dupré, presented by the Tulsa Chapter of the American Guild of Organists.



A 6:30 p.m. lecture features Dr. Jesse Eschbach, Professor of Organ at the University of North Texas. At 7:30 p.m. Adam Pajan and Joseph Arndt will offer an organ recital featuring two Dupré works: Deuxième Symphonie, Opus 26, and Trois Préludes et Fugues, Opus 7.

The lecture and recital are free and open to the public.

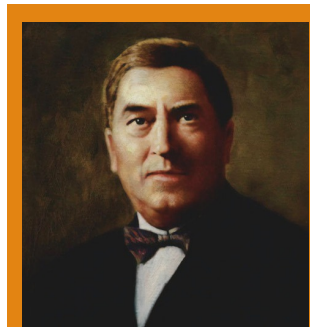
2021 marks the 50th anniversary of the death of Dupré (1886-1971), the most influential French organist-composer of the 20th century.

Musikalische Exequien by Heinrich Schütz

On Friday, October 22 at 7 p.m, Saint John's will offer a concert featuring music by Heinrich Schütz, the most significant German composer before Bach. Admission is free.

Schütz spent most of his career in Dresden and his musical life was greatly impacted by the Thirty Years War. His work *Musikalische Exequien* was composed for the funeral services of Count Henry II of Reuss-Gera. It is thought to be the first requiem in the German language, set in three parts. There will be an educational forum offered in advance of the concert – details will be announced.

Get to Know Our...Singers

Singer Rob Duran makes a special effort to contribute to and grow from participation in our Saint John's music ministries. A resident of Edmond, Rob drives to Tulsa once and sometimes twice a week to sing. He started as a substitute tenor in fall of 2020 and has become a familiar face and voice. We thought you'd enjoy getting to know him more.



Q: Were you raised Episcopalian? A: No. I was raised in the Southern Baptist denomination but I attend St. Paul's Episcopal Cathedral in Oklahoma City. I was born into a long line of Southern Baptists on both sides of my family. I was active in that church growing up and attended college at Oklahoma Baptist University, where my mother was a music professor. Starting in law school, however, I left the Southern Baptist church in search of more progressive and high-church options. That began with a stint in the United Methodist Church and ultimately landed me in the Episcopal church, where I should have been all along.

Q: How did you end up singing at Saint John's Church? A: I was invited by Joseph Arndt to fill in as a tenor for an Evensong service. I've always loved Evensongs – it is my favorite liturgical service and is often the highlight of my week. When I experienced how Joseph and Adam handle Evensongs – including, but not limited to, the bonhomie of the group, the fidelity to the Anglican choral tradition, and the high standard of the musical offerings – I fell in love with the group and have worked hard to sing there as often as I can.

Q: We understand you are a professional singer, what are the types of musical performances you are most involved/active with? A: I have sung with a number of choral ensembles over the years, and, in addition to the Saint John's Evensong choir, I currently sing with the Windsong Chamber Choir, the St. Paul's Cathedral Schola Cantorum, the St. Paul's Cathedral Evensong choir, and the St. Paul's choir – all of which are based in Oklahoma City.

Q: Tell us a little about your family. A: My wife, Kellie, and I have two children – Kaitlyn (16) and Will (13). Kaitlyn is a junior at Edmond Santa Fe High School. Will is a seventh grader at Heartland Middle School (part of Edmond Public Schools).

Q: What is your profession? A: I am an independent consultant, primarily serving clients in the energy industry. My work takes me all over the country, which includes several clients in Tulsa. While my roles and responsibilities are varied, I often assist clients in determining mineral and leasehold ownership, preparing and obtaining curative instruments, and advising on acquisitions and divestitures.

Q: Do you have any hobbies? A: I enjoy travelling and reading. I am an avid Oklahoma Sooners football fan and I play the occasional game of golf. I also have a healthy (or unhealthy) dose of OCD, so I've somehow made yard-work into a hobby with exacting standards. I also love to visit Colorado and travel for new experiences and to see new places.

Q: What does a perfect weekend look like to you? A: It would involve eating at interesting (some would say "fancy") restaurants, attending a home OU football game with my son in Norman, singing for Sunday services with my daughter at St. Paul's Cathedral, and singing for an Evensong at Saint John's.

Q: If you could describe Saint John's Church with only 3 words, what would they be? A: Excellent. Faithful. Magical.

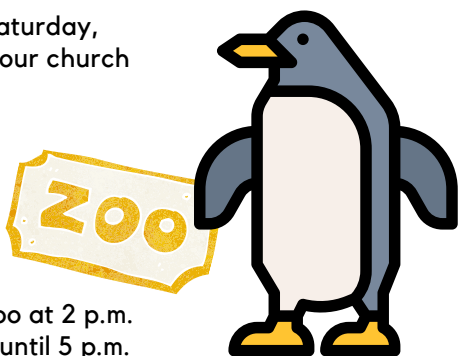
Family & Youth - Josh Corsaro

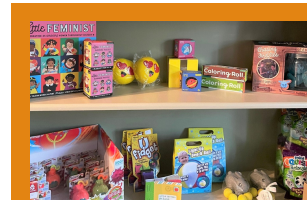
The Bookstore is Back!
