Listening to Heal Our Children

All across our nation this October, places of worship from every religious tradition are joining in the National Observance of Children's Sabbaths. Together we are asking our children and youths "Where Does It Hurt?" and listening as the first step in working together to heal hurts, prevent further harm, and join in action and advocacy so that all children may thrive. We are called to listen deeply and attentively to the voices of our children and youths as they share their experiences, their struggles and success, their hopes and hurts, their pain and persistence in this year of pandemic, poverty, racial reckoning, and more.

As you read the following excerpts from *The State of America's Children 2021*, you are invited to reflect:

- How does what we hear in the voices and experience of our children relate to this broader picture?
- How can we respond to those closest to us and to the challenges facing children and youths more broadly?
- How do I feel called to respond in light of my faith, moral understanding, or the teaching and traditions of my religious community?
- What can I do as one person and how might I join with others?
- How might I hear more from the voices of children, youths, and families that are impacted by what is being described?

The high cost of child care and lack of early childhood investments leaves many children without **quality care during critical years of brain development.** Center-based child care for an infant cost more than public college tuition in 28 states and the District of Columbia in 2019. More than 80 percent of two-child families were paying more for child care than for rent.

Millions of children live in food-insecure households, lacking reliable access to safe, sufficient, and nutritious food. More than 1 in 7 children—10.7 million—were food insecure. Black and Hispanic children were twice as likely to live in food-insecure households as white children. The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) helped feed 17 million children in 2018—nearly a quarter of all children in America. Half of all families that received SNAP in 2019 were not able to get enough healthy food, however, because SNAP benefits were too low. Among households with children, monthly SNAP benefits averaged just \$118 a person—or less than \$4 a day.

The lack of affordable housing and federal rental assistance leaves millions of children homeless or at risk of homelessness. More than 1 in 3 children live in households burdened by housing costs, meaning more than 30 percent of their family income goes toward housing. More than 1.5 million children enrolled in public schools experienced homelessness during the 2017-2018 school year.

Child and teen gun deaths hit a 19-year high in 2017 and have remained elevated since. Gun violence was the leading cause of death for children and teens ages 1-19 in 2018, surpassing motor vehicle accidents for the first time. In 2019, 3,371 children and teens were killed with guns—one every 2 hours and 36 minutes.

Family separation and anti-immigrant policies are dangerous to children's health,

development, and well-being. Nearly 1 in 4, approximately 18 million, U.S. children lived with at least one immigrant parent in 2018. An estimated 6.9 million children lived with undocumented parents. Chronic uncertainty and distress about the threat of enforcement activity destroy children's sense of safety and their mental health.

The State of America's Children[®] in MARYLAND 2021 Factsheet



Child Population

- 1,334,687 children lived in Maryland in 2019.
- **59 percent** were children of color: 31 percent were Black; 16 percent were Hispanic; 6 percent were Asian/Native Hawaiian/Other Pacific Islander; and <1 percent were American Indian/Alaska Native.

Child Poverty

- **12 percent** of Maryland's children were poor in 2019–a total of **156,992** children–and children of color were disproportionately poor.
- 19 percent of Black, 15 percent of Hispanic and 6 percent of white children were poor.
- **6 percent** of children were extremely poor (their family had income below half the poverty level).
- **12 percent** of children under 6 were poor.

Income and Wealth Inequality

 \$130,500 was the median income for white families with children compared with \$71,700 for Black and \$68,700 for Hispanic families in 2019.

Housing and Homelessness

- **17,601** unhoused children were enrolled in public schools during 2017-2018.
- **2.6 full-time jobs** at minimum wage were needed for a family to afford a two-bedroom rental unit at fair market rent in FY2020.

Child Hunger and Nutrition

- **16 percent** of children lived in food-insecure households in 2018.
- **19 percent** of children relied on the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) in FY2018.
- **79 percent** of children receiving free or reducedprice lunch during the 2018-2019 school year did not participate in Summer Nutrition Programs in 2019.

Child Health

- **47,782** children ages 0-18 (**3 percent**) were uninsured in 2019.
- **622,786** children ages 0-18 were enrolled in Maryland Children's Health Program (combined Medicaid and Children's Health Insurance Program) in 2019.

Early Childhood

- **\$15,680** was the average annual cost for an infant in center-based child care in 2019.
- **38 percent** of 4-year-olds were enrolled in statefunded preschool during 2018-2019.

Education

- 78 percent of Black, 78 percent of Hispanic and 52 percent of white 4th grade public school students were not proficient in reading in 2019.
- 80 percent of Black, 79 percent of Hispanic and 50 percent of white 8th grade public school students were not proficient in reading in 2019.
- **85 percent** of Black, **72 percent** of Hispanic and **93 percent** of white students graduated high school on time during 2017-2018.
- **7 percent** of Black, **2 percent** of Hispanic and **2 percent** of white public secondary students had at least one out-of-school suspension in 2015-2016.

Child Welfare

- **7,661** children were abused or neglected in 2019.
- **3,840** children were in foster care on the last day of FY2019.


Youth Justice

- 549 children were in residential placement in 2017. 77 percent were Black; 8 percent were Hispanic; and 15 percent were white.
- **16** children were in adult jails or prisons in 2019.

Gun Violence

• **58** children and teens were killed with guns in 2019.

Note: All numbers in this factsheet are included in the Children's Defense Fund's *The State of America's Children*® 2021 report, and most have been rounded to the nearest whole number. Facts for states and the District of Columbia were omitted when data were not available. Citations for all data may be found in *The State of America's Children*® 2021.

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
