

Reflections on Today's Readings

In today's Gospel reading, Jesus gives the summary of the Law. Jesus may have been the first rabbi to combine the two laws in this summary fashion. He is saying something radical. Our love of God is not real if it does not produce love of our neighbor, and our love of others is meaningless if it does not proceed from our love of God.

In the second reading we continue to read through Hebrews, the letter written for Jewish Christians to help them relate Jesus to their Jewish background. This passage is a central one for the writer, since it explains the superiority of Jesus' priesthood to that of the old priesthood.

In the first reading, Moses enunciates the Shema Israel—"Hear, O Israel: the LORD is our God; the LORD is One"—which is the creed of Judaism. The first of the two laws that Jesus combined is stated here. In Hebrew thought, "heart, soul, and strength" refer to the whole human being. We are to love God, then, with all of our being.

We gather as a people who in Baptism were made sharers in the priesthood of Christ. In our Eucharistic celebration we join him in exercising that priestly ministry. And in our ministry to others, which flows out of our love for God, the sacrificial priesthood of Christ is revealed in us.



Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all. He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

Instructions for Receiving Communion

You are invited to receive Holy Communion.

Those seated in the side sections please come forward for communion beginning with the front pews using the diagonal aisles and returning by the outside of those sections. Those seated in the center sections please come forward beginning with the back pews using the center aisle and returning to their seats using the diagonal aisles.

Communion is received standing. The bread is received in the open palm. (Gluten-free wafers are available). Please take the wafer back to your pew and consume it then. (We thus avoid multiple persons removing their masks in the same location). If you are using a cane or walker, you may consume the bread as you receive it, so as not to impair walking back to your seat.

Those who do not wish to receive Communion are invited to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.

Communion can also be brought to you in the pews. Please communicate this request to an usher or the clergy.

Granite State Organizing Project: Following the visit of the Rev. Deacon Chris Potter on Sept. 26, Christ Church's relationship with Granite State Organizing Project continues to deepen. We now have the opportunity to join other Seacoast faith communities that have expressed interest in interfaith organizing as a way of leveraging our members' active interest in addressing social issues and putting faith into action. This winter, several faith communities will join together for a four-part training on the basics of faith-based community organizing. The series is an opportunity for us to build relationships with each other and develop skills to create a powerful advocacy network.

The series will kick off on November 13 with a hybrid event to meet each other and look ahead to the training series and beyond. In person attendees should arrive at Community Church of Durham for a potluck dinner at 5:00 while Zoom attendees can register here and login at 6:00.

Sessions will continue on the first Thursday of each month from December through March and include opportunities for relationship building and spiritual reflection. Topics to be covered include power and self-interest; the identification of problems and their translation into issues; how interfaith organizations take action on issues; and how organizing relates to the larger life of participating congregations.

Seussical Jr! Tickets go on sale November 1: Christ Church Exeter's Youth theatre program, *The Pine Street Players* will present Seussical Jr!, a whimsical, fast-paced extravaganza of a musical, November 12-14 (Jr Cast) and 19-21 (Sr Cast).
