Well excuuuuuuuuusssse me!

In Psalm 55, David cries out...

12 If an enemy were insulting me, I could endure it; if a foe were rising against me, I could hide. 13 But it is you, a man like myself, my companion, my close friend, 14 with whom I once enjoyed sweet fellowship at the house of God, as we walked about among the worshippers.

After 20 years of ministry, I could list to you just about every offense under the sun but, to be honest, you probably could too. I have found the problem with most offenses is not in the offense itself, but in our response to them. John Bevere wrote in his book, The Bait of Satan:

"OUR RESPONSE TO AN OFFENSE DETERMINES OUR FUTURE."

I believe this applies too the offended, as well as the offender. My problem has always been wrapped up in the response of the offended. I never take into consideration the irrational thought process of those who are offended by me ... (I say that tongue in cheek, mind you), but here is what I am discovering. We all have a part in the offense, whether we like it or not. Irrational or not. Intended or not. Our response is very much at play in all these situations.

Equally, my response can help define how this situation could play out in the future. I like to think that I have a firm grip on life and have lived through a lot of things, maybe, just maybe, I have a responsibility to think before I act. Just maybe, I should consider my neighbor, church member, and the people in my life first.

In 1st Corinthians 8, Paul addresses a big debate about whether it is ok for a Christian to eat certain types of meat. The Corinthians lived in a pagan society filled with pagan temples. People would take meat to the temple and sacrifice it to the pagan gods. Afterwards, the meat could be purchased in the temple restaurant for a good price.

Some Christians said, "It's a sin to eat meat that has been sacrificed to a pagan god." Other Christians said, "That's superstitious. We are not bound by that rule. We have freedom in Christ, and we can eat sacrificed meat if we want to." This was Paul's opinion on the matter. He said, in effect, "It's not a sin to eat meat sacrificed to idols but, before you do, you have to consider how your actions and attitudes affect other believers."

Paul says very definitively...(1 Corinthians 8:13) "Therefore, if what I eat causes my brother to fall into sin, I will never eat meat again, so that I will not cause him to fall." In the book of Romans, he said, "It is better not to eat meat or drink wine or do anything that will cause your brother to fall." (Romans 14:21)

Paul is saying that when someone else's spiritual health is at stake or, in the case of someone being offended, you must be willing to sacrifice your freedom for their benefit. In the

culture in which Paul lived, eating food sacrificed to idols was an issue. In our culture, it isn't. There are, however, other "freedoms" that we should approach with caution in order not to cause any of our brothers and sisters in Christ to stumble. My natural response would be to say to them, "suck it up" or "I can't help that you are offended that I breathed today." But, how much of this could be avoided if I took them into consideration first?

I love vinyl records. I have a pretty large collection and listen to them on a regular basis. My room is set up as both a bedroom and or a man cave. In my house this is my place of solace, my "man cave." It has everything that I could need to suffice for a little two-hour vacation from reality.

I have a gaming station for video games and for an episode or three of The Office. I have a jukebox box at my disposal at the foot of the bed. My record player is to the right of the bed with a leather lounge seat beside it that I can sink into and listen to my records. As I looked and saw the album covers the other day, I realized that some of them are let's just say less savory. Even though they are permissible and, in my opinion, not offensive, I still must ask, could they offend others? In all honesty, yes, they probably could. However, that was not my intent.

Twenty years ago, I probably would have chosen not to engage in friendship with people who were so easily offended. I would have chosen not to bother inviting them over, I mean, who needs them anyway? But is that the best response? How am I going to make disciples if all I do is keep those who get offended out of my life? Simply put, I won't make very many disciples, if any at all.

Now, there are ways to keep people from being offended by my "man cave." I can still have them in my home. I can still get together with them and do life with them. In the same way early Christians chose not to eat meat sacrificed to idols in front of the offended, I should maybe consider the man cave to be what it is. My place, my man cave. I don't care if people love my man cave, but I do care if they love the Lord. Now that is a common ground that I can work with anyone on.

What do we need to consider then, Church? I leave you with this thought today. How will you respond to those that you might offend? How will you embrace building up what Satan tries to tear down? And before you answer, consider this...

(Philippians 2:3) 3 Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility, value others above yourselves...

We have a responsibility to God's word. Our response should be out of our love for Christ. Our response should be to build up the Kingdom of God. Our response should be to work it out with those we have offended so as to define a healthy future with them. Our response should look like Jesus.

Where are you, God?

"You intended to harm me, but God intended it for good to accomplish what is now being done, the saving of many lives." ~ Genesis 50:20

When we have been destroyed by those who not only hurt us physically but also try to destroy our minds and soul, we start to wonder if our God is a do-nothing God. We fall into a pit of fear that we must fight to stay out of. Feelings of not being worthy of love, fear of being used, and fear of worst-case scenarios can tend to bog us down. We feel like we are the only ones living this way and ask, "Why, God? Why me?"

How do you react when God responds by asking you to do the unthinkable? What do you do when He asks you to FORGIVE? Forgiving can seem impossible when others have deeply hurt us, and this hurt can affect us for years to come. This hurt can cause us to cautiously hold our breathe in every situation for fear it might happen again. Who can I trust? How much worse can it get? What would life be like not assuming all the worst-case scenarios? Something unchangeable can absolutely feel unforgivable.

We tend to dream in reverse. We grieve over what happened to us, over lost friendships and over the loss of what we thought our life would look like instead of hoping for what will one day be. We may long for a more innocent time when we lived unaware of tragedy. Often we wish we could go back in time, but we can't. The only thing we can do is move forward, trust God, and learn to forgive. Every other choice just adds more hurt, upon hurt, upon hurt, which can lead to us hurting those we love the most.

Here are a few truths I have found during my study of "Forgiving What I can't Forgive" by Lysa Terkeurst.

Forgiveness is more satisfying than revenge. We may think getting back or getting even will make us feel better. In some cases it can, for a short time. But long term it will always cost us more, emotionally and spiritually. It only adds to your burdens,

instead of taking them away.

Our God is not a Do-Nothing God. When we are hurting and can't see an end, it's easy to ask, "Where are you God?". But God is always working. He is <u>always</u> doing something. A perfect example is Joseph and the way his brothers treated him. (Gen. 37-41). Joseph trusted God and honored Him through his struggles, even as the plan God set before him in a dream took 13 years to come true. Throughout it all, he did the right thing next, and later forgave his brothers. He could have wallowed in sorrow and given up, but he didn't. We must

The Sovereignty of God continued...

Last month I wrote about how I have seen the sovereignty of God in my life and I defined what it means to say He is sovereign. But honestly, despite all that I wrote, I was only able to give a small glimpse into His complete sovereignty. He is so unlimited it can be very hard to comprehend all that is His sovereignty. I don't know about you, but sometimes when I can't fully comprehend something about God, it can get in the way of me truly believing and trusting that it is true. Does not being able to understand it make it hard for you to believe, as well?

I've spent the past month asking God why it is so hard for me to understand all of His sovereignty. And you know what? God revealed that it isn't my lack of understanding that is causing the issue, but more a lack of trust in Him. He showed me how my pride is getting in the way of not believing in His sovereignty. My pride is what is preventing me from being able to believe that He is in control and that He knows best. I have found myself thinking - I can make the best decision on my own. I have it all under control. This problem or decision is too small to bother God about. All of these thoughts are lies, and they reveal my prideful side. Pride really is the opposite of trusting in God's sovereignty. Having pride is me saying to God, "No, you do not know what is best for my life. I can, and will, make the best decision." I can either choose to trust in myself to make the best decision or trust that God will show me the best decision...I can't do both.

Fear is another thing that prohibits me from trusting in God's sovereignty. I don't know about you, but I can definitely be a bit of a control freak. My desire to be in control is caused by the fear and anxiety for what could happen if someone else is in control. I desire to know what the outcome will be and I desire to get to choose what I do. All this does is stop me from allowing God's sovereignty to be present in my life. I am missing out on His goodness when I let fear and pride get in the way.

I don't want you to miss out on God's sovereignty! So I challenge you to pray about this question, "Is there something that is stopping me from trusting in God's sovereignty?" If there is, ask God to show you what that is and to help you let go and simply let Him!

Just a few things

This month's submission from me will be a little different. I want to take a minute and go over a couple of items that have to do with worship and Sunday morning services.

First off, I want to update everyone on the new equipment we've gotten recently. The church has recently upgraded our entire sound system with new speakers, a mixer, and a sound board. The new system is a vast improvement in several ways, with sound quality being one of the biggest improvements. You should notice a better quality of sound both in person and online during our worship time and sermons. The sound team is still learning the ropes on this fairly complicated system so bear with us as we work to make worship better for everyone.

I also want to thank the members of the worship team. We have a core group of just a few volunteers who show up most Sundays and lend their God-given talents to CPCC. Some of our team members have recently moved from Topeka to places like Eskridge and Kansas City, but still make the drive each week to be a part of service at what they still consider their church "home." Take a minute to thank our worship volunteers next time you see them.

I do need to take a second to ask the congregation for a little patience and grace on Sunday mornings during rehearsal time. Our goal is to get our service rehearsal started at 8am on Sunday mornings and to be done by 9:15 so we're not playing during Sunday school. We do try to make this happen but lately, due to the new sound system and all the challenges that go along with it and with the aforementioned commute of some of the members of the band, even getting started on time is a struggle. I understand that it can be a bit distracting to have the band still playing while you're trying to start Sunday School or set up coffee and donuts, but I'm asking for you to give us a little leeway from time to time. If we rush through rehearsal and don't put in the time or work to get the songs and message just right, we aren't able to give you our best offering during service. We promise we will continue to do our best to be done shortly after 9, but if it doesn't happen, please have a little patience with us.

Finally, one quick housekeeping item. During service, after our opening worship set, we have our "ministry moment" prior to the communion devotion. We try to keep these brief but sometimes the Spirit moves in our speakers or there is a lot of information to be shared. To minimize the disruption of the natural flow of service, I'd like to ask a favor of those that come forward to speak. I usually invite the ministry presenter and the elder forward as I say the offering prayer. When that happens, don't be afraid to come to the front of the sanctuary during the prayer and take a seat on the front row. You do not need to wait until the offering or the first speaker is done before going forward. When we take this unnecessary time to wait, it slows everything down...and Derek gets antsy enough to preach as it is! Next time you share during service, try to be up front and ready when it's your turn, we're all excited to hear what you have to say!

We continue to work through reviewing the policies and procedures of CPCC in our meetings as well as looking at various needs of the church building. Additionally, we are in the process of fleshing out what an Acts 2 church looks like based on the desire to be devoted to "the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread, and the prayers" (Acts 2:42) with one another. The vision of the Acts 2 church takes time to implement and can only be done when all are committed to making it happen. This is not about a program or initiative, but a culture of fellowship and unity. So how does this happen and how can you help? We are glad you asked!

Unity in any body of believers begins and ends with PRAYER! We have access to the King of kings and the Lord of lords, the Maker of heaven and earth, but we must approach prayer the right way and with the right attitude.


Eric Cook's lesson at Sunday Evening Teaching (S.E.T.) on September 19th focused on this. (If you have not been attending S.E.T., you should be. It is an opportunity to hear from a variety of teachers in our congregation who teach on topics you may not hear on Sunday morning.) Eric taught from Judges 19-21 which deals, in part, with how the Israelites approached prayer and seeking God, and how God answered those prayers. (If you missed it, the full teaching is on the CPCC YouTube channel and on our website at www.centralparkcc.org). The Israelites approached God three times before going into battle with the tribe of Benjamin. The first two times did not go so well for them and thousands of Israelite fighters were lost. You might ask yourself why, when the Israelites asked God and complied with His answer, did they lose both battles? The answer lies in the heart of the Israelites when they prayed and asked God about the battles. Each time they sent a delegation to ask God to confirm what they had decided in the flesh. (How often do we do that still today?) God answered them both times, but it was the plans of men that failed. Finally, on the third visit to pray, the Israelites, all of them, humbled themselves and truly sought God's leading. Their hearts were in a right place to be obedient and fully led by God.

We have an opportunity to watch God work miracles, both here at CPCC and across our city, state, nation, and world. We have an opportunity to witness revival, like so many great revivals before, that start with prayer. Eric read an article from Dr. J. Edwin Orr that outlined the great revivals in history which began with prayer, just as the Israelites prayed the third time they approached God.

How we pray is critical. This is not from a legalistic, scripted perspective, but in our attitudes towards prayer and obedience to God rather than our own fleshly desires. Are we asking God to confirm our own plans? Or are we humbling ourselves, giving thanks and fully committing to being led by God? We cannot expect the presence of God to be with us, as the Israelites learned the hard way, unless we seek it in the way He has appointed.

Join us as we continue to seek God's leading for Central Park Christian Church.

Happy Fall, Y'all!

Doorstep is beginning to plan how we will operate our Christmas Store this year. We will still adopt 260 households with 800+ individuals from the Christmas Bureau as we do every year. How distribution will be handled is being planned, and we will update our member congregations once we know the details.

We are now through the first quarter of our 55th Anniversary year, and donations for the 55th Anniversary Fund to replace our HVAC have brought in over \$31,000 so far. We feel incredibly blessed to have received this amount! We need at least another \$129,000 to replace the HVAC system which is 60+ years old. Anything over the HVAC amount will go to help more of our neighbors in need with basic needs such as rent and utility assistance. We are asking our supporters to donate a minimum of \$55 per person towards our 55th Anniversary Fund.

understand that God's timing is the right timing. There is always a *meanwhile* with God. He is always working the bad out for our good.



It's easier said than done but, again, we need to trust God and love others as He does. This doesn't mean we excuse the pain they have caused, but that we should have compassion enough to never shame them or refuse to forgive them.

The enemy is the real villian. The devil is real and he is on an all-out assault against all things good and real. He hates the word "together" and will do anything to divide what God has created.
