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Greetings!

As you receive this, we will just have completed a mini liturgical season we often call Allsaintside, or perhaps Allhallowstide. I always look forward to this series of Holy Days! Most folks, even folks outside of the Church's ministry, tend to enjoy the Eve of All Saints as a night of spooky fun, costumes, and of course candy. But the days that follow are heavy with the Church's doctrine and pastoral ministry.

On November 1, All Saints' Day, and November 2, All Faithful Departed (also known as All Souls' Day), Christians all over the world take a couple of days to reflect on God's goodness in the witness of His Holy People. We often think of saints as the Avengers of the faith, the heroes of the Church with amazing stories of God's power working mighty things in and through them. And I believe that we can certainly be encouraged by the lives and witnesses of the saints. But the thing I really love about All Saints is the sense that Christian holiness, wrought by the Cross of Jesus, is absolutely available to each one of us. Which means that the great little hymn "I sing a song of the Saints of God" is really onto something. That sense of invitation into Christ-like lives is one of the great reasons why baptisms are so appropriate for the day. All Saints' Day reminds me that anyone who seeks after Jesus can be a light to the world, a beacon of hope, and a lamp of love in a world that really, really needs it. This year, we offered a Choral Eucharist on the Eve of All Saints, October 31, and on November 1, All Saints' Day, the Holy Eucharist was presented with hymns.

And while All Saints is a day of celebration and sharing the joy of Christ with all his people, All Souls is a bit more subdued. On All Souls, we remembered those saints, family, and friends who have entered into their reward. We often call those that have passed before us the "Church Triumphant," as we trust that the dearly departed are now enjoying the perpetual light of rest in God's nearer presence. I look forward to this day as an opportunity for grief and remembrance even as we consider the joy of the Communion of the Saints. This year, we offered a quiet Requiem Eucharist in the Garden of the Resurrection at noon as well as a full Choral Eucharist in the church at 6:30 p.m. with the stunning Requiem setting by Maurice Duruflé.

I pray you have had a blessed Allhallowstide!

Fall 2021 Outreach: Helping EIS

This November, parishioners have the opportunity to join a fall drive to collect supplies for Emergency Infant Services. Commonly known as EIS, this nonprofit organization offers assistance with basic needs items for children ages five years old and under whose families are facing financial and personal challenges. EIS respects all who walk through its doors, offering same-day services, regardless of income or residency status. The top priority of EIS is to provide accessible, immediate help because a hungry child cannot wait. With a staff of only fifteen people, EIS cannot function without the generous contributions of time, funding, and donated goods from folks like us. Several members of our congregation are involved in the wonderful work of this well-respected community agency.

On Sunday, November 7, you will find a poster on the north wall of the Common Room with a list of the supplies EIS is most in need of. As part of the church office commitment to help collect goods for EIS this month, we invite parishioners to participate as you may be able. This may be as simple as going online to make a financial contribution to EIS. Or, perhaps you would like to visit its website and click the "Amazon Wish List" tab and buy a specific item or size that is hard to keep in EIS inventory at its Denver service center. Or, maybe you'd like to peek at the list of most helpful supplies on the poster and make a trip to the store (or order from your favorite merchant) and obtain the supplies to bring to the church Common Room drop off point by November 22. The church staff will deliver the items collected in our fall drive on Tuesday, November 23.

If you'd like to have an emailed list of the supplies we are collecting for EIS, feel free to contact Mary Waller (mwaller@stjohnsa.org). High priority needs include, but are not limited to: formula, baby food, toddler-sized clothes and diapers, and baby wipes.

She also received instruction in London with Jane Packer and Kenneth Turner, as well as at Cambridge University.

A gentle and generous teacher, Sadie brought arrangements for display and armloads of florals for us to arrange as she explained the elements of design, touching on the importance of connecting with nature as we move along our spiritual paths. She shared the rich history and tradition of flowers on the altar. We were encouraged to forage from our gardens at home and from those of our friends - because this is how the practice of beautifying the church began. Father Bumsted delighted us with a visit and a blessing.

For the finale, each table of workshopers was presented with materials to create a centerpiece of their own design. Masterpieces were made. Laughter filled the Common Room! Music News - *Joseph Arndt*

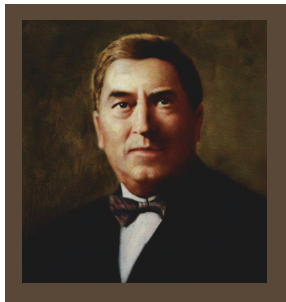

The names of loved ones departed since All Souls' Day 2020 were read at this service.



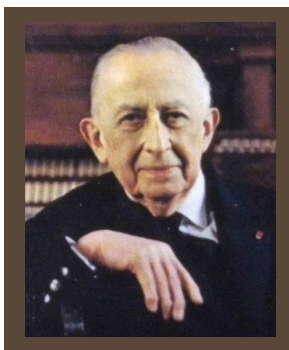
Dupré Anniversary Celebration

On **November 5**, Saint John's will host an event in memory of composer Marcel Dupré, presented by the Tulsa Chapter of the American Guild of Organists.

This 6:30 p.m. lecture features Dr. Jesse Eschbach, Professor of Organ at the University of North Texas. At 7:30 p.m. Adam Pajan and Joseph Arndt will offer an organ recital featuring two Dupré works: *Deuxième Symphonie*, Opus 26, and *Trois Préludes et Fugues*, Opus 7.

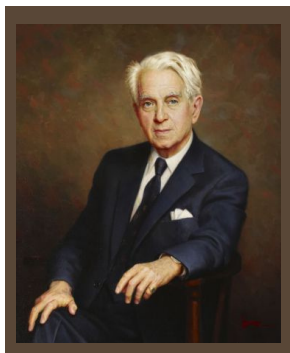
The lecture and recital are free and open to the public.

2021 marks the 50th anniversary of the death of Dupré (1886-1971), the most influential French organist-composer of the 20th century.



Howells Canticles Continue during Evensong on Sundays at 5:30 p.m.

The Canticles of Herbert Howells will continue to be featured through our Evensong services with an offering on Sunday, **November 7** at 5:30 p.m. This service will highlight the Dallas Canticles, finished in 1975 for St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Dallas. That Friday evening at 7 p.m., the choir will present Cantatas for the Advent Season. The choir and orchestra will perform BWV 35, 62 and 140.

This choir is dedicated to performing the sacred vocal music of Johann Sebastian Bach with period instruments.

Bach and Advent to be the Topics of a Special Adult Formation Class November 28

On Sunday, November 28, Joseph Arndt will lead a forum from 9 to 9:30 a.m. in the Common Room on the subject of "Bach Advent Cantatas: Music, Theology, and Symbolism."

Join Joseph for a forum that will give a preview of the Bach Cantatas concert to be offered on Friday, December 3 at 7 p.m. He will highlight the two Advent cantatas to be presented: BWV 62 (Nun komm, der Heiden Heiland) and BWV 140 (Wachet auf, ruft uns die Stimme). This forum will put these cantatas in the context of Bach's career in Leipzig (1723-1750). Joseph will also discuss the origins of the texts, Bach's compositional choices, as well as the symbolism of "Bridal theology" apparent in BWV 140.

Getting to Know...the Vestry

Q: Where were you born? A: I was born in Okemah, Oklahoma on Christmas Day of 1940. My father was working in Colombia, South America, and my parents and older sister, Joanne, had lived there for eight years. WWII was underway, and my father did not want any confusion about my passport. He sent my expectant mother and Joanne to Okemah, followed by a prompt return to Colombia. My mother carried me back to Colombia in a basket when I was six weeks old on the PanAm Clipper flying boat! We returned to Oklahoma and I attended all twelve years of public school in Chickasha.

Q: Tell us about your passion for Saint John's music. A: I enjoy music, particularly classical music. I took piano lessons as a boy, and enjoyed everything about it except practicing. I gave it up for football and a professional football career. Now I am 0-2 in piano and professional football. My outlet is Joseph Arndt and his command of the organ!

Q: Please share a bit about your family. A: I am married to Phyllis, who was and still is my only REAL girlfriend! I had a few platonic chums in high school and freshman year of college. Phyllis and I met as sophomores, dated four years, and have been married fifty-eight more! Our only daughter, Sarah, lives in Kansas City. She has three children: Parker, who is in his second year of med school at Duke University; Duncan, who is a college sophomore in K.C.; and George, who is a high school senior. Our son, Benjamin, passed away in 1978 at age eight years. And our son, Grant, lives in New Castle, Colorado. His daughter, Grace, is a high school junior.

Q: Tell us a little about your career. A: I am most fortunate to have worked for three best-in-class organizations: the United States Army (five years), Helmerich & Payne, Inc. (thirty-six years), and Atwood Oceanics, Inc. (thirty years).

Q: Do you have a favorite holiday? A: Thanksgiving has always been a special day for me because it is a family day, with a few exceptions. Growing up, it was always a day of delicious meals, good weather, football out of doors, and family. During my college years, it was a day in Maine with Phyllis's parents and grandparents, followed by a Boston Bruins game at the Boston Garden. Getting to Know...the Altar Guild

Jane Cowdery's life is a rich combination of living around the world, family, career, and service to her churches. We know you will enjoy getting to know just a bit more about this parish volunteer. And, we recognize her father's service to our country and the sacrifices (and opportunities) Jane's family made (and had) as a military family.



Q: Where did you grow up? A: My parents met in Washington where my dad was doing an internship and my mom was a nurse before World War II. My dad was an army surgeon in WWII and Korea. My two sisters and I were born in Washington and we grew up in many more places: Governor's Island, New York; Gainesville, Florida; Hyattsville, Maryland; West Point, New York; Orleans, France; and Fort Knox, Kentucky. We ended up at the University of Oklahoma when my folks were transferred to Fort Sill.

Q: What location did you find the most unusual of the places you have lived? A: France, where I attended eighth through tenth grades at Orleans American High School. The schools the Department of Defense operated had good teachers. We had a Teen Club and were always awaiting the new dances and records from the States. We did not have a television or a telephone there but did have an American Forces Network radio. We got to see many countries in Europe. Orleans was in the chateau country so we'd take a picnic and go see Loire Valley chateaus on the weekend.

Q: Were you raised Episcopalian? A: We always attended the churches on post, which were largely interdenominational Protestant, except all the church clergy and staff and services that I really remember from like fourth grade on were Episcopalian. I have fond memories of children's choir and youth choir at West Point at the post's Episcopal Church there. I went to the Catholic church and St. John's Episcopal Church while in Norman. I was confirmed in maybe 1969 at St. Stephens in Wichita and then went on to St. Dunstan's in Houston, St. Mary's in Edmond, and St. Dunstan's in Tulsa before landing at Saint John's in about 1998. Saint John's Altar Guild is my fifth altar guild!

Q: Tell us more about your family. A: My husband, Allen, and I were married at All Souls Church in Oklahoma City, and we lived in Wichita, Houston, and Edmond before moving to Tulsa in 1983. We lost Allen in August 2014. Forty-five years of marriage was not long enough. Our son Owen went to OU and now lives in Tulsa and attends Saint John's. Our daughter Elizabeth attended Southern Methodist University, is married to John Daniel, and lives in Houston with my two grandchildren: Katie, a high school sophomore, and Will, who is in fifth grade.

Q: Tell us about your career. A: I am on my fourth career, as I like to say. I've been an attorney since 1990 - started late in life - and am still at it.

Related to this, on days the office closes early, or all day, there will be no Daily Office offered in the evening. Additionally, all groups routinely scheduled for a meeting in the building will not be hosted in the church if there is an office closure due to weather on that meeting day/at that time. We regret any inconvenience this may cause, however the office leadership desires to practice an abundance of caution and follow best practices for the safety of our staff and visitors.

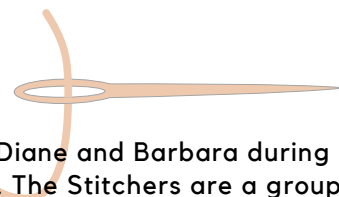
