I had the privilege of singing at my father's funeral. Even more of a privilege is that Lori and my children sang with me. What did we sing? My father wrote a creed in 1972. One of the kids in the youth group set it to music. I got to sing it.

One of the verses includes the words: "And I believe in smiling through the pain; in getting up and going round again." My father had been a championship runner in high school. He was probably making a sports metaphor, but it became a metaphor for his life. My father was a survivor of multiple heart attacks starting in his 40's; lymphoma with surgery, chemo and radiation; Parkinson's-like disease; and several strokes that left him paralyzed on one side of his body. Smiling through the pain was his thing. Getting up and going round again was what he did!

His creed ends with the line: "Praise be to God, creator of us all, for life as it has been and as it will be!" What an amazing thing it is to have a relationship with God that sees us through the good times and the bad – to be able to praise God through blessings and hardships. My father's life and his creed left everyone he knew with a powerful example of faith.

What if we all did this? What if we left a legacy of faith? Most of us are on this journey. We are trying to live as God would have us live, to love as God would have us love in the world. But what if we added some words to that example. How amazing would it be for your loved ones to have a creed, a statement of faith, a poem, a song, whatever could express your faith that could be read after you are gone?!

I want my loved ones to know that to whatever extent they admired my life, it was rooted in my relationship with Jesus Christ. To whatever extent (probably greater) that they found flaws in my life, I have forgiveness rooted in my relationship with Jesus Christ.

After my first heart attack I wrote each of my kids a letter to be read after my death. My missives expressed my love for them, my love for God and my trust that God would bless them as God has blessed me. Those letters are still stashed several places in my house. Given that I was writing to them as eight- and ten-year-olds, it is probably time to update those letters. I have a new opportunity to express my faith and my love to my wife and my adult children.

You have a similar opportunity. Write something, make something, sing something and put it in places where it will be found: Your Bible, your files, with your will, at the church (I have a "last wishes" file for such things as well as funeral plans). This kind of thing is hard to face and easy to put off – our own mortality. But this is also an opportunity to redeem our mortality and one last opportunity to communicate love and faith as we go to be with God. May God bless our efforts!



Worship Committee Liturgy Study

In October the Worship Committee is beginning an eight-month study of a book titled *CALENDAR – Christ's Time for the Church* authored by Laurence Hull Stookey, Ph.D. *CALENDAR* is a book about the church liturgical year. The Worship Committee wants very much to share the highlights of their study of this book, in the hope of enhancing the congregation members' worship experiences. The Worship Committee plans to share the study highlights by writing articles in the OPC Plumbline each month and by writing worship service notes in the Sunday OPC bulletins. The church liturgical year historically begins with Advent in December and continues through Christmas, Lent, Holy Week and Easter and after Pentecost into Ordinary Time. Worship Committee Liturgy Study Highlights will provide the congregation with new information on liturgical enhancements of both a visual and sound nature. Examples of visual enhancements are banners and paraments, Pentecost and Holy Week and Easter cloth draperies, Advent Wreathes and Candles, and Crismon Trees. Examples of sound enhancements include hymn singing, playing of organ and instruments, and choir and handbell music.

Look for the first Worship Committee Liturgy Study Highlights article introducing the church liturgical year and showing the strange nature of church time, which will appear in the November Plumbline. The December Plumbline will include the Highlights of the Worship Committee's study of Advent.



Need a ride? Call Duet!

If you are a Senior who no longer drives and could benefit from free transportation to your medical appointments or to do your grocery shopping, schedule a ride with Duet! They offer a variety of free-of -charge services to homebound adults, including (but not limited to) rides to medical or social service appointments (with at least 4 business days of prior notification) and to the grocery store on a regular schedule that you can discuss when you contact them with your needs and intake information. Orangewood has long been a supporter of Duet, going back to the days when they were known as



Center DOAR (Developing Older Adult Resources, changed to Duet in 2009). In fact, our own David Haskins has been a volunteer with Duet for 18 years and can vouch for the value this organization brings to Seniors throughout the Valley.
