David's Son

A temple worthy of the God of Israel would be a great legacy for David to leave. But before blueprints are drawn, God sends David this message through the prophet Nathan.

"So who's asking for a house? And who do you think you are anyway, volunteering to build it? The tent's just fine for me. I'm turning the tables on you, David. You wanted to build me a house, a building of wood and stone. That won't ever happen. Instead, I'll build you a house—not a building, but a dynasty. I will establish the reign of your offspring. **He** will build a house for me, and his kingdom will prevail forever."

This promise comes true, and in more than one way. David builds no house for the Lord; it is his son Solomon who constructs the temple. Descendants of David reign over Israel and Judah for centuries, but finally those kingdoms come to their end. The promise of an everlasting kingdom finds its fulfillment in a later descendant of David, namely Jesus, who through his cross, resurrection and ascension comes to reign over a kingdom that is eternal.

Today's Challenge: BLESS

If we pay careful attention to our lives, we may discover that what happened to David and his grand scheme happens to us. Our plans are not objectionable. Certainly, people can be blessed. But they can be motivated by a bit of human love mingled with portions of pride and short-sightedness. Before we BLESS, we need to listen, really listen, to the One whose plans and pure invincible love sent His son to us to establish His eternal kingdom.

Today, go find a task in the house that would bless someone if you did it. Don't tell that person you did it. What an even greater challenge? Do the same for a neighbor.

Through the prophet Isaiah, God promised a unique sign. It was not a sign in the stars above. The sign was not a flashing LED sign announcing a new product to buy. The sign would be a person, a baby in fact. Like other babies, this baby would have a mother who would bear him. His name would be significant. He would bear the name "Immanuel" which means "God with us." In Isaiah's day where they faced enemies who wished to attack them, this was a comforting message. It still is a comforting message today that God is "with us." The Gospel of Matthew (Matt. 1:22-23) identifies Jesus as the one who is the ultimate fulfillment of this verse and Mary as the person God chose to bring this wonderful sign into the world. In the person of Jesus Christ, God has come to be with us, even when he was merely an infant. Whether we are lonely, tired, sad, angry, or anything else, we can know that God has come to be with us.

Today's Challenge: BLESS

Is there someone at school, in the neighborhood, or at work who needs to hear these encouraging words today that God is with us and he has shown his love by coming to us? Think of someone who might be sad, lonely, disappointed, or upset and could benefit from hearing these words today. If you don't feel ready to tell them these words, maybe just "be with" them as God has come to be "with us" and listen to them.

Jesus Messiah

This is the passage Jesus chose to read in the synagogue in Nazareth in the earliest days of his ministry (Luke 4). He clearly indicated that it was being fulfilled in Him. Jesus is the anointed one – which in Hebrew is *Mashiach* or *Messiah*. The Spirit falls on Him and empowers Him to both preach of the coming deliverance and then to make it a reality by His death and resurrection. Sinners are here called the afflicted, the brokenhearted, captives and prisoners. So, the Messiah has come to heal and liberate which work clearly leads to our joy and to our holiness as we get to be the oaks of righteousness that bring Him glory.

The message Jesus brings and sends us to declare is called *good news*. That is what we mean when we speak of the *gospel*. It is news that comes to hurting people and points them to the one who is their hope and deliverer. It is our privilege to bring the good news of Jesus.

Today's Challenge: JESUS

Father, we rejoice in our anointed King this day and commit ourselves to trusting Him, loving Him and declaring His joy to those around us. Give us insight as to how we can apply the good news to those who are in need of healing or deliverance. And anoint us to represent well our precious Savior, whose glory we long to see and in whose name we pray, Amen.

Reflection Question: How has Jesus bound up your broken heart or given you liberty or freedom? Thank Him today!

Resurrection Hope

"For there is hope for a tree, if it be cut down, that it will sprout again" (Job 14:7) Christmas has the power to restore the hope that what has been cut down can sprout again. That is true for the stump that was the kingdom of Israel, and it is true for us cut-down stumps as well. This hope is founded on the power of God in the gift of the Holy Spirit. This Spirit, which rested on Jesus, gave Him wisdom and understanding. It gave Him counsel, might and knowledge. It delighted Him in the fear of the LORD. And it does the same for us! Because Jesus promised us that same Spirit. He said, "I will ask the Father and he will give you another Helper, to be with you forever, even the Spirit of truth...He dwells with you and will be in you." (John 14:17) And that Spirit, "who raised Christ Jesus from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies." (Romans 8:11) The fact that Jesus was raised to life is a firm foundation of hope for those who trust in Him. When we feel the temptation to despair or fear the world around us, we should do as Paul instructed Timothy: "fan into flame the gift of God...for God gave us a spirit not of fear but of power and love and self-control" (2 Timothy 1:6-7). Let your delight be in the fear of the LORD and let that lead you to hope in the promise of new life.

Today's Challenge: PRAY

When you are tempted to fear or lose the hope of restoration, let the knowledge that the Spirit is with you drive you to pray. Through prayer, fan into flame the gift of God – faith in his resurrection power. Ask God to show you who needs to feel the hope that life can sprout again through Christ.

Shephend from Bethlehem

It is amazing to realize that prophets could tell what would happen in the future including where Jesus would be born. The prophet Micah predicted that the Northern Kingdom of Israel which included Jerusalem would be besieged by Assyria. It happened. The Kings and rulers were taken captive to Babylon. Then he predicted that out of the little town of Bethlehem one would come to rule over Israel. God's people would be abandoned until this child was born. It happened 700+ years later. That child (Jesus), would be a shepherd to his flock and his greatness would reach to the ends of the earth.

We can marvel in God's faithfulness and his plan to redeem the nation of Israel who had turned its back on God. Punishment and hard times may come, but God sent his son to be born in Bethlehem to shepherd his flock back to live securely.

Today's Challenge: BLESS

A simple way to bring joy to someone today would be to give them a candy cane. The excessive sugar might not be a blessing, but the spiritual message it conveys is sweet. Tell the recipient of your gift that the candy cane reminds you of a shepherd's crook and that if you turn it upside down it is a "J", the first letter in Jesus' name. Jesus was God's gift to us on Christmas. The red stripes remind you of the blood Jesus would shed for the forgiveness of our sins. The white stripes remind you that he was the only one "pure white" (without sin) who was worthy to pay the price for our sins. As you share the candy cane with your friend, be thankful that God sent his son to shepherd us into His Kingdom.

This is the genealogy of Jesus the Messiah the son of David, the son of Abraham:

Abraham was the father of Isaac, Isaac the father of Jacob, Jacob the father of Judah and his brothers, Judah the father of Perez and Zerah, whose mother was Tamar, Perez the father of Hezron, Hezron the father of Ram, Ram the father of Amminadab, Amminadab the father of Nahshon, Nahshon the father of Salmon, Salmon the father of Boaz, whose mother was Rahab, Boaz the father of Obed, whose mother was Ruth, Obed the father of Jesse, and Jesse the father of King David.

David was the father of Solomon, whose mother had been Uriah's wife, Solomon the father of Rehoboam, Rehoboam the father of Abijah, Abijah the father of Asa, Asa the father of Jehoshaphat, Jehoshaphat the father of Jehoram, Jehoram the father of Uzziah, Uzziah the father of Jotham, Jotham the father of Ahaz, Ahaz the father of Hezekiah, Hezekiah the father of Manasseh, Manasseh the father of Amon, Amon the father of Josiah, and Josiah the father of Jeconiah and his brothers at the time of the exile to Babylon. After the exile to Babylon: Jeconiah was the father of Shealtiel, Shealtiel the father of Zerubbabel, Zerubbabel the father of Abihud, Abihud the father of Eliakim, Eliakim the father of Azor, Azor the father of Zadok, Zadok the father of Akim, Akim the father of Elihud, Elihud the father of Eleazar, Eleazar the father of Matthan, Matthan the father of Jacob, and Jacob the father of Joseph, the husband of Mary, and Mary was the mother of Jesus who is called the Messiah.

Thus there were fourteen generations in all from Abraham to David, fourteen from David to the exile to Babylon, and fourteen from the exile to the Messiah.

What's In a Family Name?

Has anyone in your family traced your family history and identified the countries of origin? If so, what kind of significance does it have for you? Family histories can be fun. Sometimes there is a well-known historical figure in the family tree or the family crest is discovered. For my own family, we have discovered that the Burkholders came from the Swiss mountains. While no one is quite sure what "Burkholder" means, there are two primary possibilities. One is the holder of a fortress. The other is the holder or dweller of a hillside. Of course, I like the first one better.

We might find family histories amusing today and perhaps a matter of some significance, but it was more than that in Jesus' day. The family history mattered a great deal, especially if you descended from important people. Our passage today shows that Jesus' family has very important connections. It begins with Abraham, which would be true of other Jewish people in his day, but his ran through King David, which meant he would qualify to be the "Son of David" that God promised back in 2 Samuel 7. In fact, when Matthew starts off calling Jesus the "Messiah" or the "Christ," he is saying that Jesus is the rightful king who was to come from David's line. That is pretty important.

I'll make one other note here too. Matthew has broken Jesus' family history into three series of 14 generations. The first runs from Abraham to David. The second goes from David to Josiah and to what Matthew calls "the exile to Babylon." This was when God removed his people from the land because they disobeyed him. The final series of generations ends with Jesus and then Matthew summarizes his pattern: "Thus there were fourteen generations in all from Abraham to David, fourteen from David to the exile to Babylon, and fourteen from the exile to the Messiah" (Matt. 1:17). For those waiting for God to restore his people from the conditions of exile, the coming of the Messiah was the moment for which they had been waiting. God was rescuing them from their exile through the promised son of David. Help had come. By the way, do you know what number you get if you turn the Hebrew letters of David into numbers and add them together?--14!

Today's Activity: JESUS

If you're doing this as a family, discuss with someone what you know about your family history. What does this mean for you? If you're doing it by yourself, ask a friend about his or her family history and the significance that has to his or her family. Then, ask what it would be like if you could trace the family history to an important king. Imagine what it would be like to grow up in Jesus' family when you knew you had connections to royalty.

This is how the birth of Jesus Christ came about; His mother Mary was pledged to be married to Joseph, but before they came together, she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Because Joseph her husband was a righteous man and did not want to expose her to public disgrace, he had in mind to divorce her quietly. But after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins." All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had said through the prophet: "The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel" -- which means, "God with us." When Joseph woke up, he did what the angel of the Lord had commanded him and took Mary home as his wife. But he had no union with her until she gave birth to a son. And he gave him the name Jesus.

Matthew 1:18-25 NIV

Joseph and Mary Believe

Joseph was concerned about what other people would think of him and of Mary if they had a baby so early in their marriage. He was so afraid he considered walking away from Mary and from God's purpose for him - to be the father of Jesus! Sometimes fear can make us feel like running away from God and others. Have you ever been afraid of what people will think of you if you follow Jesus? You are not alone! Sometimes God asks us to do courageous things for his purposes. God encourages us to follow him and his purposes, even if we are afraid, through the Holy Spirit. Joseph and Mary believed that God called them to an important purpose - being the parents of Jesus! Even though this was an important purpose, they were still afraid. But in their fear, God encouraged them by his Holy Spirit and his word - Jesus was the fulfillment of God's promise to save his people from their sins. We can find courage to believe and trust God's promises and purposes in our lives just like Mary and Joseph did, because of Jesus and the Holy Spirit!

Todays' Challenge: PRAY

Dear Lord Jesus,

Thank you for coming to earth as Immanuel, God with us! Thank you for giving Joseph and Mary courage to believe and follow your purpose for them even though they were afraid. Help us follow you even in the times when I am afraid. Thank you for saving us from our sins and by your Holy Spirit helping us to follow you and obey your word. In Jesus Name, Amen.

Do not lear

How do you react when you hear news about something that is completely out of your control?

When the angel Gabriel appeared to Mary, even though she was greatly troubled, she didn't run away or ask him to leave her alone; instead, she listened and tried to understand the meaning of it all. She bowed in submission to Gods call on her life. She was called, chosen, and consecrated ... therefore, she cooperated and let God use as her as He so desired.

A faithful response to God looks to Him in trust even without answers to all our questions. Seldom can we say why things happen as they do. Often we don't have all the information we need. If we waited until all our questions were answered, we'd never do anything. So, we do not fear but bow in obedience.

Can you and I learn from Mary's example to trust God when we hear something that is going to rock our world? Can we pause and truly take to heart that God is in charge. Nothing happens, good or bad, outside of the providence of God's grace and love. We walk by faith and not by sight. Believing this, we're able to take the unexpected events of everyday life and see them not as impositions that get in the way or as obstacles to be overcome, but as opportunities that can lead us into a closer relationship with God and those around us. Then, can you and I find ways to take that trust and come along side another who is in a fearful situation?

Today's Challenge: BLESS

God, help us to bow in humble submission to You, trusting that You will enable us, whom you have chosen, called, and consecrated, to walk by faith for Your glory. Amen

Isn't it *amazing* that the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob used the Roman government to relocate Mary & Joseph from Nazareth to Bethlehem? I expect Caesar Augustus mostly had future tax revenues in mind when he declared the census; but God was busy keeping promises and fulfilling prophetic scripture. Caesar thought he was in charge, yet he had no idea that he was actually performing a job for the Heavenly Travel Agency. The timing of the mandatory trip was not convenient for Mary & Joseph. Traveling at the end of a pregnancy is never easy or comfortable. When news of the census decree was announced, I expect most of us would have responded with either, "Are you kidding me?!" or "Really?! Now?! Couldn't this have waited?!" Events may be unexpected to us—even governmental initiated ones—but they are not a surprise to God. He is the one who is truly in charge. Often we don't understand our circumstances, but God is with us (*Emmanuel*) and we can trust that His plan is the best plan.

As the master orchestrator, He is conducting the entire musical score. We often only hear our small part and don't understand the measures of silence, but God hears the whole symphony—and it's AWESOME!

Today's Challenge: BLESS

Are you grumbling and complaining about your current situation? Ask God to grant you contentment and heavenly insight into your difficult situation.

Is there someone you interact with frequently who is in a challenging circumstance? What practical thing can you do to demonstrate the love of Jesus to him/her? Did you not make the team, or get a part in the musical or get that promotion? Open your heart. Maybe the Heavenly Travel Agency is looking to redirect you. Shephends and Angels

Shepherds were different. They spent most of their time working and living outdoors, rarely coming home. While at their job, they were surrounded by far more sheep than people, smelling a lot like the animals they were tending! Shepherds were rough and tough, able to protect their sheep from bears or thieves or whatever came at them. They were rarely seen in town, except to occasionally get supplies; and when they did, they weren't usually welcomed.

Angels are spectacular! They are radiant, seemingly quite large, and there are lots of them! They cause people to be in awe and fear. Today's verse even says that they terrified the shepherds. More than this, angels are residents of heaven and primarily serve as God's messengers to His people, saying important things to those who need to hear them.

In today's passage, we read about the angels appearing over Bethlehem to announce the birth of Jesus to the people, the Good News of the Savior's arrival to save man from sin. In this moment, God announces that His promise to His people has been kept: Immanuel; God is with us! Yet, who do the angels make this announcement to? The temple priests? The local government? Caesar? No. The angels first come to the shepherds. The rough, smelly, unwelcome shepherds. The announcement of the King's birth comes to the lowliest people! Why? Because God wanted to show us that He didn't send His son for the proud and self-important. Rather, He sent His son to everyone who is humble and believes that Jesus is God's promise and hope for salvation. Even for shepherds! ...and that's Good News worth announcing!

Today's Challenge: JESUS

Who are the "shepherds" in your life? Who do you know who needs to hear the Good News of Jesus? What stops you from announcing the Good News of Jesus to them? Identify one way you be an "angel" to them today and do it!

My Eyes Have Seen

El Roi, "the God who sees," is one of the names of God in the Bible. In Genesis 16:14-15, after an angel of the Lord cares for her in the desert, Hagar, Sarai's servant, addresses God as El Roi, "the God who sees me." Think about that for a moment. God sees you! What is the full implication of this promise? I don't think it means simply that God's eyes work, but rather that He truly knows us—every thought, every feeling, every shortcoming—He knows it all. Nothing escapes His attention and He still loves us, cares for us and wants what's best for us.

In our passage today, we read that God also allows us to see Him! When Simeon takes the child in his arms, he sees more than a baby. Simeon sees salvation and glory. He sees God in the flesh. In Jesus, we can see and know God. When we read our Bibles and learn about what Jesus does and how Jesus loves and cares for those, whom no one else loves and cares for, we are seeing God. And not only do we get to see Him, He invites us to become like Him. Jesus is a light to reveal God to the nations and while He was here, ministering on earth, He said to His disciples, "You are the light of the world. ...let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven."

Today's Challenge: BLESS

Take the time to bless people by seeing them. As you go about your day, slow down, smile, say hello and "see" the people you live with, work with or go to school with. God could use you to be a light to reveal Himself to the nations.

Does that make you excited? Do you recognize what Jesus means to you the way Anna did? No matter your age, there is still time to get to know him better.

Today's Challenge: JESUS

Choose a way that you can get to know Jesus better today. Perhaps you could learn a new hymn about him and sing it to yourself each day or dedicate yourself to a regularly scheduled time of prayer. Maybe you could even choose some of the scriptures from this devotional and memorize them to remind you what Jesus means to this world. Then, as you think about him more, watch for places where the salvation that he brings can be an encouragement to the people around you, and share the hope that he gives you!

Now after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of Herod the king, behold, wise men from the east came to Jerusalem, saying, "Where is he who has been born king of the Jews? For we saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him." When Herod the king heard this, he was troubled, and all Jerusalem with him; and assembling all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Christ was to be born. Then Herod summoned the wise men secretly and ascertained from them what time the star had appeared. After listening to the king, they went on their way. And behold, the star that they had seen when it rose went before them until it came to rest over the place where the child was. When they saw the star, they rejoiced exceedingly with great joy. And going into the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother, and they fell down and worshiped him. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts, gold and frankincense and myrrh. And being warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they departed to their own country by another way.

Matthew 2:1-12 ESV

Gifts of the Magi

How did the Wise Men know to go to Jerusalem? There were Jews that settled in the East after the exile, having not returned to Israel. They shared their hope of their Messiah, their King of Kings, who would rule forever. Hearing of the promise of the Messiah, the Wise Men saw a star of stars and set off seeking the King of Kings. They arrive at the Jewish capital and meet King Herod (a king under Caesar). When asked about the King of Kings, Herod's wise men (scribes and chief priests) gave answers from scripture and sent them to Bethlehem. There the star rose and their eyes were opened to the house where the Messiah laid. They went in, seeing the child, they knew this King was greater than their kings, so they fell down, worshipped and freely gave gifts. The President of the United States does not fall down and worship a foreign head of state when they meet! No, the Wise Men had their eyes opened to the Messiah and they believed, fell and worshipped. Their belief is also demonstrated their belief in that they listened to a dream and not to Herod who asked them to return. King Herod could have them killed for not listening to him. The Wise Men 1) sought the Messiah the Jews believed in and spoke about, 2) listened to the scriptures that spoke of the King of Kings and 3) had their eyes to the life changing truth of Christ the Messiah.

Today's Challenge: BLESS

- 1. Invite someone to attend church to hear God's Word and the hope that is within you on Christmas Eve.

Into Egypt

When my Father was ten years old, his family had to leave their comfortable home and move to a new place several hours away. They had their car and the clothes on their back and not much else. That was scary and difficult—it was something he never forgot but didn't talk about very much.

Just after the Wise Men visited Jesus, the babe's father was warned in a dream that it was too dangerous to stay in Bethlehem. Jesus was still a little guy—likely between one and two years old—when his family left for the long walk to Egypt in the middle of the night. Can you imagine what that would be like?

They left because King Herod did not want another king in Israel and was trying to kill Jesus. Egypt had not always been a safe place for God's people, but it would be for the boy Jesus and his family, because God would go with them.

Today's Challenge: JESUS

It's hard to imagine the one who created the whole world being a small boy who had to run away with his parents so he could live. It was a narrow escape.

Sometimes we forget that Jesus is not only 100% God, but 100% human. He knows what it is like to lose everything and start over. That's why we can come to him with whatever is on our hearts. Take time today to tell Him of a challenge or difficulty you're feeling right now.

Suffering

One way we can know that the Bible is true is that it doesn't omit hard things or gloss over things that are difficult to understand. Today's scripture passage is a good reminder of that truth.

Jesus was born in Bethlehem, just as the prophets and the angel Gabriel foretold. What great news! An angel, accompanied by a heavenly chorus of angels, shared the exciting news with a lowly group of shepherds that lying in a manger in Bethlehem was a baby who was the Savior.

Also great news!

But in the midst of these Christmas card worthy illustrations, we find a hard truth dropped into the mix. A paranoid, power hungry king named Herod felt threatened when some wise men stopped by his palace asking where to find, "the one born king of the Jews." The birth of Jesus that brought, "good news of great joy that would be for all people," (Luke 2:10b) also resulted in the slaughter of precious little boys in Bethlehem, aged two years old and younger, as Herod sought to eliminate the competition. What a reminder that sin and suffering don't take a break, even at Christmas.

BUT, there is a glorious truth worth remembering, not just at Christmas, but every day of the year. That baby born in Bethlehem is also called Immanuel, which means "God with us." One day, many years later when that baby was grown up, He would remind His friends "I have told you these things so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble, but take heart! I have overcome the world" (John 16:33).

Today's Challenge: PRAY

Lord, the Christmas season can bring suffering and sadness to the forefront in people's lives. Loss and loneliness seem to be magnified at this time of year. Show us someone today who needs the hopeful reminder that you are not a God who is far off, but one who is truly Immanuel, God with us.

Belief

In John 1:12 we learn that God has given us the **right**, in the Greek, exousia, to become children of God. Exousia (G1849), from Strong's concordance, is power, physical or mental power, the power of authority and right of privilege. These reveal that at the moment we make Jesus our Lord, He gives us His delegated power, authority and divine influence.

Jesus is the light of the world and we are called His children, His ambassadors, His beloved, His chosen, His anointed, co-heirs with Him in the Kingdom of God. It is when we believe that Jesus has died for us and when we receive him and we become children of the Most High God.

We believe, from the Greek, pisteuo (G4100), which means to think to be true, to be persuaded of, to credit, place confidence in Him. In making Jesus our Lord, and becoming His children, and putting our firm confidence in Him we acknowledge the plan of God and become enlightened in Christ. He is the way, the truth, and the life. In Him we live and move and have our being.

Today's Challenge: PRAY

Father, we come to you with thanksgiving and praise for giving us Your Son Jesus. And Jesus, we thank You for Your sacrifice on the cross. Thank You for giving us Your Holy Spirit and never leaving nor forsaking us. We praise You and give you glory and pray that we are bold, powerful witnesses for you as we proclaim the Gospel. Yet our intent was the same as for our three-year-old son Adam: to unconditionally love this second child God had provided for us.

At Christmas, Jesus was born of God by Mary's pregnancy so that we might become children of God, receiving His unconditional love for us. When we place our faith in Jesus, we are adopted into God's family. This legal right leads to personal delight and love for others. Galatians 4:1-7 states what God did for us in Christ: redeemed us, adopted us, gave us the Holy Spirit, and made us heirs of His kingdom.

Today's Challenge: JESUS

Remember that you are a beloved child of God. Out of that love, share your Christmas joy with someone at your school, work, family, or neighborhood. Consider the price of your spiritual adoption, and invest in someone else to be adopted too.

As we approach Jesus' birthday tomorrow, remember that as an adopted child, you are privileged to:

- Approach the throne of grace with confidence [Hebrews 4:16; 1 John 5:14]
- Enjoy the blessings of God's protection and care [Matthew 6:25-34; 1 Peter 5:7]
- Undergo trials as Fatherly discipline rather than as punishment [Hebrews 12:5-11] and
- Be sealed by the Holy Spirit and kept by the power of God [Romans 8:31].

Jesus, the Christ, of royal birth by the Virgin Mary, grows up to live a sinlessly perfect, prophetic life and completes His priestly work on the cross, which we'll celebrate in just a few short weeks. God glorifies Himself and sets the example of how we, out of gratitude for what He's done, should glorify our Father.

Ephesians 2:1 tells us to be imitators of God, so let us, as the body of Christ, in the power of the Holy Spirit, put God's glory on display by living out our servant responsibilities to both our fellow believers and to the lost around us. Let us dwell on the word of God, trust in the work of Christ & remember whose we are and where we are, for we are in Christ & He is in us! This is the gospel on full display, for God's holiness requires atonement for our sinfulness. To display His glory, and out of love for us, God became the God-man in the person of Jesus. He lived a perfect life for us and took on our sin in what is known as the double imputation. Not only did He give to us His righteousness and pay our penalty through His death, but now Jesus is with the living God, seated at His right hand in triumph over death and continually interceding for us to the Father. Halleluiah!
