

What is this Sabbatical thing?

In the Sunbeam over the past few months, I've asked some questions related to our work and learning with Communities of Calling: How are we emptying ourselves (August Sunbeam) and how do we fill ourselves (October Sunbeam)? Because, as we think about God calling or speaking to us, it is easier for us to listen (filled) only once we have cleared away the noise and made space for God's voice to be heard (emptied).

These ideas of being emptied and filled really began to take shape and become clearer to our team as we discerned the possibility of a sabbatical for myself.

A sabbatical is a period of rest with a purpose. According to the National Clergy Renewal Program at Christian Theological seminary, a sabbatical is an opportunity "for pastors to step away briefly from the persistent obligations of daily parish life and to engage in a period of renewal and reflection. Renewal periods are not vacations, but times for intentional exploration and reflection, for regaining the enthusiasm and creativity for ministry, for discovering what will make the pastor's heart sing."





The idea of a sabbatical comes from biblical origins. The very root of the word is the same as that of "Sabbath." In the first story of Creation, God created the world in six days and rested on the seventh.

Any Confirmation student could (or 3rd should) tell vou that the commandment is to keep the sabbath. In Leviticus 25, the Lord tells Moses to tell the people to give their land a sabbath rest: after six years of planting and reaping, the seventh year shall be a year of complete rest for the land. (Didn't farmers used to leave their fields lie fallow for a season until recently?)

Many denominations, ours included, recommend that a pastor receive a one- to three-month sabbatical after five to seven years of service to their congregation. I have now been ordained and serving with you for over eight years. (That's hard to believe!)

Please hear me when I say: This has been a difficult request for me to make. So many of you are in demanding fields of work, often demanding 24/7 attention. I wish everyone had this kind of an opportunity in their line of work. For all of us, though, this time of sabbatical can be a reminder that God invites us, if not commands us, to take a regular and intentional time of rest, renewal, and reconnection.

Another thing to mention is that this time of sabbatical is as much for you all as a congregation as it is for me. This will be a chance for St. Paul's to catch its breath and refocus on its mission for ministry, all while being served by and hearing from some great guest preachers and leaders.

I am planning a sabbatical for late-Spring, early-Summer. The Council and Staff Support committee have been discussing the details of this opportunity for quite a while, and we will be sharing those details and answering more questions in the months to come. If you have any questions right now, myself or Tom Oelrichs (Council President) or any member of the Staff Support committee (Luke Goosen, Susan Kyle, Sandy Schlesselman) would be happy to have that conversation with you.

ADVENT CALENDARS

Advent is just around the corner! Advent is a season of waiting and preparing for the birth of Jesus Christ. Many people use calendars or other methods to help mark the days of Advent. During the past few years we have been experimenting with some fun ways to do those calendars and plan to do them again this year. We will be doing FIVE different calendars this year:

- 1) Chocolates
- 2) Kids Candy
- 3) Craft Beer
- 4) Commercial Beer
- 5) Wine



Everyone who participates will be asked to answer one question which will be compiled into an Advent Devotional booklet for each of us to use throughout Advent. How it works: if you take part in the chocolate, candy, or beer calendar, you bring in 24 of the SAME item (chocolates, candies, or beer), and in return you will receive 24 different items – one for each day of Advent in December. If you take part in the wine calendar, you are asked to bring in 4 of the SAME bottles of wine (regular sized, ~\$8-14 range) and you will receive 4 different bottles in return – one for each week of Advent. Because we need an exact count of who is participating, you must sign up to participate on the bulletin board in the link or by contacting Janice or Pastor Stephen. You will then receive more information and the question that needs to be answered. Your items must be dropped off by November 22 at the Church Office or Parsonage Garage. There is always room in the calendars so please feel free to invite a friend to participate. Please speak with Pastor Stephen if you have any questions.

The Congregational Council of St. Paul's Lutheran Church met on October 19, 2021 at 7:30pm.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Stephen reported that his activities included Clergy Bible Studies, CCACA meeting, Ambrose Communion, Communities of Calling meeting. Campfire Conversations (x2)Confirmation Classes. Baptism prep meetings, Senior Sunday, GSCC Worship, Worship & Music meeting, "See You At the Pole", Evangelism meeting, Synod Systems Group, Staff Support meeting, Wedding rehearsals and services, Parish Education meeting, GSCC communion and visits, Systems Class, Band practice, Dean's meeting, Fall Theological Conference, First Communion Instruction, and Acolyte Instruction. His upcoming events include the Fall Festival on October 24th, First Communion on October 31st, All Saints worship on November 6th & 7th, and First Sunday of Advent on November 28th. He will have a 3 hours Continued Education Online class on November 9th for Family Systems and the monthly gathering online for Synod Family Systems Group on October 28th. September 26th he presided over the baptism of Creed Jackson and the baptism of Layne Keith on October 17th. He presided at the funeral of

Judy Harms on October 7th. He presided at the wedding of Darin Oelrichs and Tara Weathers on October 16th. Pastor hosted a First Communion class on October 17th with 4 youth in attendance, a thank -you to Shirley Cash for helping to lead them in baking bread.

Budget & Stewardship: Will meet in November to discuss yearly budget.

Communities of Calling: Events for The Gathering were held on October 9th and 10th featuring the author Ellie Roscher. Thanks to all who attended to hear Ellie preach, teach and guide us through a conversation about tiny things that remind us who we are and who God is. Their next meeting will be in November.

<u>Evangelism:</u> The Fall Festival is planned for October 24th. They have had discussions about a "Follow the Wisemen" project and the Angel Tree. The committee would like to revitalized the Casserole Care-A-Van. Software to build a website for St. Paul's has been purchased.

Mission Facilitator: Janice has been posting daily on Facebook using The Lectionary for the upcoming Sunday. She is posting short excerpts from the readings followed with a brief explanation of the verses selected. She

will be helping Pastor Stephen in November with the Advent Calendar, with follow-up and assembling the final booklet. She reports that Don Harms has finished the cabinet for the gathering space and she is looking through the church's history books for photos to be placed for display

Parish Education: The committee met on October 3rd, there is a concern about the low attendance for Sunday School. Second graders will receive their First Bibles. They have started planning for the Christmas Program. The VBS budget was discussed, it was suggested that they talk with the budget committee.

They will have the man **Property:** from Versailles come to look at the sidewalk boiler again before the cold weather. Kelly is looking into replacing the water fountain in the fellowship hall. Shrub and weed maintenance volunteers are needed for spring. There is a thermostat in the basement and Sanctuary that needs replacing. The fellowship wall repair is complete. The shed has had a much needed cleaning. Thank you Melisa and crew for all you did.

<u>Worship</u>: Prepared services for November.

Old **Business:** Staff support committee and the council have been in discussion for almost a year about the subject of a sabbatical for Pastor Stephen. A sabbatical is an extended leave to provide an opportunity for a rostered minister to reflect on their call to ministry and relationship to God. There will be a committee formed to approach the best way to move forward. Chairman Tom Oelrichs mentioned a possible Temple talk after church (TBA) to discuss the need for a sabbatical and what it means for Pastor and us as a congregation. Advent dinner will be on Sunday, November 28th.

New Business: St. Paul's was contacted by David Tucker of United Lutheran. They will be offering the church building for use to us if needed. A daycare was discussed and a committee will be formed to look into what will be needed to move forward. There will be an open house tour for all area churches on December 5th. The tour is set to end at St. Paul's for the annual concert by the German Club.

<u>Adjournment</u>: Meeting was adjourned with the Lord's Prayer at 10:21pm.

In 1908 the black altar hangings were purchased.


In 1932 we sold subscriptions to "Farmers Wife Magazine."

In the late 1940's the Luther League purchased the food stand from MFA of Cole Camp. There were no scheduled shifts. Everyone worked every day -- ALL DAY.

In 1942 the first float representing the church was built by the Luther League. Frederick Grabau's car was coverd with chicken wire and stuffed with tissue. The League continued building a float yearly until 1957 when the congregation joined the construction.

Thankofferings: Our History

Beginning in the late 1800's, Lutheran women were given small Thankoffering boxes to place in a special location in their home as a visible reminder of blessings received throughout the year. The women would daily add coins to those boxes noting their particular blessings. With the money collected from the Thankoffering boxes, women's groups would fund needs in their churches as well as in their local communities. Eventually, the concept of an annual church service to celebrate their giving was developed.

Thankoffering: Continuing the Tradition

Thankofferings show gratitude for God's blessings in a tangible manner to express that gratitude. It is a tradition grounded in gathering as a community to joyfully give thanks for what God has given us. Our thankoffering boxes have always been, and still are, our opportunity to say "thank you" to God in both significant and ordinary ways. Today at St. Paul's, the presenting of these boxes of thankoffering is part of our annual Thanksgiving service.

Here at St. Paul's the thankoffering boxes were distributed earlier this

year. However, if you did not receive one or have misplaced your thankoffering box you may find boxes at the usher's stand. You may bring your thankoffering box to worship at our Thanksgiving service on Thursday evening, November 24 or you may bring your box to church any Sunday throughout the month of December.

Your thankofferings will be donated to the Women of the ELCA (Churchwide) in support of their many ministeries. The Women of the ELCA are facing many financial challenges following two decades of reduced revenue for the organization. This year, the Women of the ELCA have reduced their budget by 31%, which has a major impact on staffing. This year, only two of the ten staff members are working full-time, and the remaining eight positions have been reduced to 20 hours each week. Making a Thankoffering is gratitude in action spiritually, mentally, and even physically.









OAKS INDIAN MISSION

Oaks Indian Mission has long been a recipient of our benevolent giving. Reviewing our financial





Oaks Indian Mission has a long and interesting history which began in 1801. Over the years, the history of Oaks focuses on three chapters of their existence:

1801-1898 – The Period of the Moravian Missionaries

The Moravians emigrated from Europe to work among the Cherokee people of the Carolinas and Georgia. When the resettlement of the Cherokee (Trail of Tears) began in 1834. the Moravians left their Georgia homes for Oklahoma (not yet a state) to search for a good site for resettlement for the Cherokee nation. They found such a site, which was just north of the present city of Tahlequah, Oklahoma. They named this site New Springplace.

1898-1926 – The Period of the Lutherans

In 1892, a Danish missionary, Niels Nielsen, spent the summer Tahlequah, Oklahoma, learning the Sequoyah Syllabary allowing him to write, but not speak the language of the Cherokee. In September of that year, he opened his first school with eight children. Over the next ten year, he established a number of preaching stations and schools. In 1902, the Moravian Church Board invited him to go to Oaks, Oklahoma. At which time, the Moravian Mission passed its heritage onto the Danish Evangelical Lutheran.

OAKS INDIAN MISSION

Rev. Nielsen found missionary work among the Native Americans to be slow and somewhat trying. It was in 1898 that he baptized his first convert, a girl of 16. A church was established there in October 1903, named the Eben Ezer Lutheran Church.

1926-1980 – The Period of Oak's Indian Mission Children's Home

The Oaks Mission as a Children's Home was established in 1926 and is located approximately 65 miles east of Tulsa, Oklahoma. Until 1977, the children of the Mission were treated without regard for individual needs. They were housed, fed, clothed, supervised, and sent to school. This approach to the care of these children was referred to as "boarding school provision". In 1979, the children were assessed according to four related sets of needs: delinguent, in need of supervision, deprived, and boarding.

In 1980, the name of Oaks Indian Mission was changed to Oaks Indian Center. This was also the time when the dormitory setting was eliminated and cottage living was put in place. Cottage living is comprised of several self-contained homes with cottage parents and their children. The

cottage parents provide a loving home atmosphere where "family" is the focus of attention. In this home-like setting, they serve children, ages 7-17, from over twelve different tribes.

In January, 2004, The Board of Directors, voted to change the name back to Oaks Indian Mission to better relate to and focus on their mission and heritage. Their mission is to care for abused, neglected, or abandoned Indian children, guiding them on a path that will allow them to live fulfilled and successful lives.
