



# A D V E N T = 2 0 2 1

Advent is a time of preparation in the four weeks before we celebrate the birth of Christ. The word "Advent" is derived from the Latin word adventus, meaning "coming," which is a translation of the Greek word *parousia* from verses such as 1 Thessalonians 5:23:

"Now may the God of peace himself sanctify you completely, and may your whole spirit and soul and body be kept blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ."



## JOY

This season we are focusing on Joy. In the Old Testament, the prophets often speak of the experience of joy and the act of rejoicing when Yahweh will bring restoration and will come once again into their midst. Zephaniah 3 says:

"Sing aloud, O daughter of Zion; shout O Israel, Rejoice and exult with all your heart, O daughter of Jerusalem! The King of Israel, the LORD, is in your midst... Fear not, O Zion; the LORD your God is in your midst."

Likewise, Isaiah 12 declares "With joy you will draw water from the wells of salvation" after this important statement:

"Behold, God is my salvation; I will trust, and will not be afraid; for the LORD GOD is my strength and my song, and he has become my salvation."

Thus, joy is not just an emotion, but a natural reaction to work that the Creator does among His people, particularly the work of drawing the lost back into relationship with Him. It is that reason that the New Testament frequently exhorts us to rejoice about Jesus and His work on the cross.



## JOY

Because Christ Jesus has come into our midst and His work on the cross is the basis of our salvation, our most natural response should be one of pure and unadulterated joy!

Therefore, we can have joy even in the midst of the most difficult and darkest of times. Joy is not something that is fleeting but a recognition of the character of our God. A God who allowed His own Son to provide the atoning sacrifice required to bring us back into right relationship with Him. A God who continuously walks beside us and draws us closer to Him. A God who refines us and a God who cherishes us. And our beloved Messiah who will return one day to establish His kingdom in complete fulfillment of all that Scripture has promised us.

#### WEEK 1 OF ADVENT

#### **JOY IN CONFIDENCE**

We can be confident that God is good, and His heart is to draw us nearer to Him and make us more like Him. "Good and upright is the LORD; therefore he instructs sinners in the way." (Ps 25:8) As we trust God and follow Him, He loves us, He teaches us, and He reveals His truth to us, but not in mere knowledge. The truth of God is transformative, changing us from the inside out to be more like Him. As we surrender our hearts to God, He strengthens our hearts in holiness. (1 Thes 3:13) As we grow in holiness, we grow in likeness to our Savior. God is glorified in our everyday lives, which serve as a witness to the world that there is a living and holy God whose name is the Lord.

Jesus Christ promises all those who believe in Him not only eternal life, not only forgiveness of our wrongdoing in the eyes of God, but salvation that begins today. James 2:23 tells us that "Abraham believed God, and it was counted to him as righteousness." He was called a "friend of God" and was given the promise of a future savior. Jeremiah 33:14 restates the promise of salvation from God. "The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will fulfill the promise I made to the house of Israel and the house of Judah." God repeats His promises to King David and through the prophets. He then fulfills the promise of salvation through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ for all the world to see. Therefore, we can be confident that God has not forgotten the promises he has made to us! Numbers 23:19 tells us, "God is not man, that he should lie, or a son of man, that he should change his mind. Has he said, and will he not do it? Or has he spoken, and will he not fulfill it?" James 1:17 describes God, "with whom there is no variation or shadow of turning."

God has shown us that He is faithful to us, and because of this, we can continue to trust Him all the days of our lives. Hebrews 11:10 describes Abraham as "looking forward to the city that has foundations, whose designer and builder is God." We can confidently and joyously look forward to eternity with God.

#### WEEK 1 OF ADVENT

We live our entire lives in this world, in a sense, in the meantime. Psalm 130:5 says, "I wait for the LORD, my soul waits, and in his word I hope." We can live our lives here on earth with joy–unspeakable joy! We know our future is not only secure, but we have unimaginable goodness to look forward to.

#### ANTICIPATION

I love that sense of anticipation that something good is on its way. It rents space in our minds to the point where we long to have it at this moment. We look for markers for when these events are to take place. We stay alert to when the launch sequence starts for that special event, whether it's a birthday, childbirth, Christmas presents, bucket list vacation, etc. The joy of having something to lean towards and experiencing it to the fullest gives us the satisfaction of living—the pleasure of hearing the good news that something is around the corner. We hang on to the promise because we know deep down that the source is reliable. We live to get to that event; we dream, internalize, meditate, and speculate the details even before they unfold.

Luke 3:4 quotes Isaiah 40:3, "A voice is calling, "Clear the way for the Lord in the wilderness; Make smooth in the desert a highway for our God." Malachi 3:1–4 too describes a messenger that is to come preparing the way before the Lord. In a time of great distress, I would imagine that these passages brought anticipation and a clue as to a person who would fit this description. These gave insight into the one preparing the way and the Messiah Himself. After being mute for several months, the first word out of Zacharias' mouth was a prophecy about the Messiah to come. A declaration that the season was near to His manifestation to the world. He knew that his son was going to be very instrumental in ushering the arrival of the One.

I could not imagine the jubilee taking place in the hearts of those who understood the times and seasons of John's and Jesus' arrival. That 400 years have passed between the last Old Testament book to this moment in history. Being oppressed by the Roman empire, most thought that the Messiah would come and rescue them back into the greatness, the times of King David and Solomon. But the true gift is that he was making way for all people to know God the Father, promised to Abraham in Genesis 22:18. "That all the nations will be blessed because you have obeyed My voice." Also outlined in Luke 1:73, "the oath that he swore to our ancestor Abraham." There is a great joy to be included in the very same promise of Abraham. A significant marker in the launch sequence was John, son of Zacharias, and this was the very marker they had been looking forward to.

But are we not so different today? Look at the world today. We are looking to our promise of His return with our own markers in time. We longingly await the arrival, just as Jews in that time awaited for His.

Prayer: Give us clear directions to stay alert, study the scriptures, preach the good news to all creation, make disciples, and anticipate His return.

So, what gives us hope? Assurance? Something to hang onto? A concrete promise that the Messiah is on the way? Just as we started to open our present in anticipation on Christmas morning, we see in Luke 3:1-6 describing the very thing that the prophets of the Old Testament declared.

#### WEEK 2 OF ADVENT

Luke 3:2-4, "during the high priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zachariah in the wilderness. He went into all the region around the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins, as it is written in the book of the words of the prophet Isaiah, 'The voice of the one crying out in the wilderness: "Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight." That when God speaks, it happens. When it happens, there is an overwhelming richness of his character that is on it. Luke 3:5-6, "Every valley shall be filled, and every mountain and hill shall be made low, and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough ways made smooth; and all flesh shall see the salvation of God."

As we celebrate the "coming" Advent season with gladness in our hearts, I echo Paul's opening statement from Philippians 1:3-11. "I thank my God every time I remember you, constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now. I am confident of this that the one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ. It is right for me to think this way about all of you because you hold me in your heart, for all of you share in God's grace with me, both in my imprisonment and in the defense and confirmation of the gospel. For God is my witness, how I long for all of you with the compassion of Christ Jesus. And this is my prayer, that your love may overflow more and more with knowledge and full insight to help you determine what is best, so that in the day of Christ you may be pure and blameless, having produced the harvest of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ for the glory and praise of God." Paul, the pharisee of pharisee who now is in prison, is praying not only for the church of Philippi but for the body today, that we would know the richness of the promise of Jesus. We have been part of this plan since the beginning and as it continues to unfold. We can take heart knowing with the same anticipation and hope that we are secure, held firmly by him who paid it all. To rejoice in this time and season, that all glory be to God, Amen!

#### WEEK 3 OF ADVENT

#### AGAIN I SAY, REJOICE!

As we draw near to the Christmas season, the celebration of our Lord and Savior, it is often a time of reflection of the past year. For some, happy memories and good times of the past year flood our memories. For others of us, the year may have had a few bumps here or there. But through the sweet seasons and the difficult times, the apostle Paul gives us a gentle reminder in Philippians 4:4-5: "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near."

To rejoice is to outwardly proclaim the joy we have for our Lord Jesus Christ, the same joy that fills our hearts. In Revelation 4:11, John writes, "Worthy are You, our Lord and our God, to receive glory and honor and power." So may this passage be our proclamation. It is God that "created all things," and because of His will, all things "existed and were created." John the Revelator reminds us to let our praise to Him be our song and let our joy in the Lord transcend our current situation, good or bad. So let us not express our joy to the Lord once, but again and again and again!

Paul did not forget those who were facing times of trial and hardships. "Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God," (Phil. 4:6). Let us stop and reflect on this passage. God does not want us to worry about anything. Much like a caring parent who wishes their children not to be scared or anxious. Why? Because they have control of the situation.

The child should not be worried about where they live, where the next meal is coming from, or whether there will be clothes for them to wear. The parent has it all planned out for them. In the same way, God takes care of each one of us. Jesus says in Matthew 6:26-27, "Look at the birds of the sky, that they do not sow, nor reap, nor gather crops into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more important than they? And which of you by worrying can add a single day to his life's span?"

However, it does not stop there. The apostle Paul continues, "And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus," (Phil. 4:7). God invites us through humility and thanksgiving to give Him our worries, anxieties, and requests. His peace surrounds and protects our hearts and minds. What a mystery it is! When we experience happiness, we have joy in Christ. When we experience sadness, we still have that same joy in Him!

#### SING ALOUD, O ISRAEL!

Paul's command to rejoice in the Lord came long before the days of Jesus. In the Old Testament, Zephaniah the prophet writes to a pre-exilic Israel, likely before the reforms of King Josiah. He warns the Israelites that judgment is coming against Judah and Jerusalem. After this judgment, Zephaniah prophesied his central message: The Day of the Lord. He declared to the Israelites to "Sing aloud, O daughter Zion; shout, O Israel! Rejoice and exult with all your heart, O daughter Jerusalem! The LORD has taken away the judgments against you, he has turned away your enemies. The king of Israel, the LORD, is in your midst; you shall fear disaster no more," (Zeph. 3:14-15).

#### WEEK 3 OF ADVENT

Zephaniah was declaring to Israel that God would deliver them from the threats of neighboring nations. Israel's deliverance would not be the result of their proud works but by the grace God has given to His people. Zephaniah continues," On that day it shall be said to Jerusalem: Do not fear, O Zion; do not let your hands grow weak. The LORD, your God, is in your midst, a warrior who gives victory; he will rejoice over you with gladness, he will renew you in his love; he will exult over you with loud singing as on a day of festival. I will remove disaster from you, so that you will not bear reproach for it. I will deal with all your oppressors at that time. And I will save the lame and gather the outcast, and I will change their shame into praise and renown in all the earth. At that time I will bring you home, at the time when I gather you; for I will make you renowned and praised among all the peoples of the earth, when I restore your fortunes before your eyes, says the LORD,"


(Zeph. 3:16-20).

The Israelites were looking forward to the Day of the Lord. They were to sing aloud, rejoice, and lift up Yahweh's name despite their situation and sinful nature. We get to experience the fruits of the Day of the Lord when Jesus came to the earth. He fulfilled the covenant by sacrificing Himself and giving us the gift of a renewed spirit. But we also have something to look forward to: the day Jesus returns to restore our whole body, and we spend eternity with Him! Paul understood the prophecies of Zephaniah and was overjoyed when they came to pass. Zephaniah's declaration is the Good News. The law is no longer binding to us Christians, but instead, Jesus Christ redeemed us through His shed blood. The message should stir joy in our hearts!

As the year comes to a close, be joyful for what the Lord has done for us. Let us proclaim our joy through song, thanksgiving, and through the act of rejoicing. Despite this year's ups and downs, let Isaiah's words remind us who we should keep our trust in: "Surely God is my salvation; I will trust, and will not be afraid, for the LORD GOD is my strength and my might; he has become my salvation. With joy you will draw water from the wells of salvation. And you will say in that day: Give thanks to the LORD, call on his name; make known his deeds among the nations; proclaim that his name is exalted," (Isa. 12:2-6).

Rejoice in the Lord always, and again I say, again I say, rejoice!

#### WEEK 4 OF ADVENT

While Joseph's lineage is mentioned both in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke, no such mention of Mary's background can be found in Scripture. In fact, we know very little of her past before her angelic visitation (except for her being betrothed to Joseph) and once she give's birth, very little of her life.

#### THE ASSIGNMENT

God sent an angel to Mary, but no ordinary angel. This is Gabriel, one who stands in the presence of God, an archangel. Imagine the significance of this to a marginalized girl in ancient Jerusalem whose lineage and significance is ignored. Gabriel shows up and says "Greetings, favored woman, the Lord is with You". "Don't be afraid Mary, for you have found favor with God. You will conceive and give birth to a son, and you will name him Jesus. He will be very great and will be called the Son of the Most High. The Lord God will give him the throne of his ancestor David. And he will reign over Israel forever; his kingdom will never end."

#### THE RESPONSE

"Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign. Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel." (Isaiah 7:14) Mary asked "How can this happen, I am a virgin?" Now Gabriel explains to Mary how the Holy Spirit will come upon her and the power of the Most High will overshadow her. Gabriel's final comment (vs 37) "...for nothing is impossible with God". Her final response is "I am the Lord's servant. May everything you say about me come true." She wasn't doubting, she just didn't understand how she could become pregnant without relations with a husband. She was asking a sincere, honest question to try to understand. God did not reject her question. As a good father, He answered Mary's question through Gabriel.

#### THE HOLY SPIRIT'S RESPONSE TO MARY

Mary left a few days after Gabriel's visit and went to Zachariah and Elizabeth's house. Upon her greeting, the baby in Elizabeth's womb jumped for joy. Suddenly, the Holy Spirit fell upon Mary and she began to prophesy of the Lord's mighty hand and how he has humbled the proud and exalted the humble.

#### WHAT CAN WE LEARN FROM MARY & HER RESPONSE

Who we are and where we've come from, lowly, marginalized, disenfranchised or insignificant has no bearing on how God sees us because God sees our heart. He used a lowly young woman in a male dominated society to give birth to the savior of the world.

It is true that sometimes God asks us to do something that appears confusing or scary or hard. We naturally have questions. Asking God sincere questions is not doubting, it's just being a child asking his father a question.

Mary said yes, knowing that being pregnant in her society before being wedded would mean ostracization and shame and possibly losing her husband. Her YES was putting everything in her life on the line.

God didn't use a high ranking Pharisee daughter, a Synagogue leader's daughter, a highly educated man or woman. He used a lowly girl and poor man (Joseph) who couldn't afford a room for the child's birth and so the Messiah was born in an animal's stable.

#### WEEK 4 OF ADVENT

#### MEDITATION

The Savior of the World, born in an animal's manger. Born to an unwedded, poor, humble teenager in a society that did not even count or recognize women. This story is not so much about Mary as it is about the Father's heart, His love, what He values, and how He see's the least and lowliest of us all. Mary is all of us. When He sees us, it's not how successful, how important or how many badges we have, it's simply how humble we are, how child like we are and how willing we are to submit to His assignment for our life.

#### CHRISTMAS EVE

The word *manger* has become so common place that the true meaning of the word has been lost. The truth is, a manger was a dirty feeding trough for barn animals. Not the first place I would choose to place my newly born child. Yet in this setting our Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, and Prince of Peace was born. An act of humility the world had never seen before. Jesus came not only to be a light in the darkness but to redeem us and liberate us from our sinful ways. Titus 2:14 tells us Jesus came to redeem us from all wickedness and to purify for Himself a people that are His very own, eager to do what is good. **Jesus calls us His very own.** This powerful truth is enough to make us rejoice!
