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Advent Greetings!

December Outreach: Refugee Resettlement Needs

In December, Saint John's Church is hosting an assistance drive to help Afghan families as they work toward resettling into our Tulsa community. We invite all parish members to participate. Simply purchase any of the items below and bring them to the church Common Room by 5 p.m. on Monday, December 20. There will be a table for these contributions in the room with more information about the project. This outreach is in partnership with The Afghan Community Care Team of Catholic Charities of Eastern Oklahoma.

A list of the items the care workers have identified that are most in need are: ink pens, pencils, composition notebooks, backpacks, alarm clocks, clothes hanger sets, queen blankets and/or bedspreads, twin blankets and/or bedspreads, coffee makers, clothes irons, kitchen utensil sets, mixing bowl sets, kitchen towels, dish drying racks, and cutting boards.

Catholic Charities has received confirmation of 800-850 Afghan refugees that have or will soon arrive in Tulsa and 1,000 in the Oklahoma City area. If you want to learn more about this resettlement program, please visit the website noted below. If you have a question about Saint John's December outreach initiative to help make this difficult transition just a little brighter for Afghan families, please contact Debbie Ainley in the office. Catholic Charities is the sole Afghan refugee resettlement agency in Oklahoma. This fall's 1,800 Afghans resettling in our state is the third largest community in the country, after only California (5,255) and Texas (4,481). Tulsa alone is set to welcome more than most states.

Treasurer Update

Hello and Happy Holidays! This month's update is an overview of our Saint John's Church operating revenue and expenses (combined) for 2021 through October:



Income - total income of \$976,920 is \$101,418 over budget for the year-to-date as of our third quarter.

Total pledges were over budget for the year by \$3,800.

Contributions and plate giving of \$77,171 were \$21,162 under budget for the year to date. Miscellaneous income (which includes transfers from our endowment) and bequests of \$227,151 are \$118,780 over budget.

Expenses - expenses of \$1,038,270 were \$62,459 under budget for the year to date.

Thus, as of October's end, the church budget reflected a net loss is \$61,349 vs. our budgeted (projected) deficit of \$225,228.

The Saint John's operating fund cash balance had a balance of \$60,192 as of October 31, 2021.

Christmas plate, end-of-year and any other gifts of thanks you would like to make to the church are deeply appreciated. Also, if you are able please consider catching up any pledges you have that may be outstanding for 2021.

Getting to Know... the Vestry

Getting to Know...the Altar Guild

In this month's Q&A with the Altar Guild, Peggy Woods shared a bit about her family and one of her passions — helping couples plan their wedding at Saint John's Church.

Q: Tell us about your family. A: I was married to Robert "Woody" Woods after I graduated from OU and he graduated from Stanford. My dear husband passed away in 2018. We have a daughter, Abby (Woods) Black who lives in Boise, Idaho, and works as a business branding officer. Her husband, Will, is an optometrist and they have two amazing children, Juliett and Annalea.

Q: How far back do your roots here go? A: Truly, since the beginning of the parish. Dr. Eckel of Trinity (the Rev. E. H. Eckel, Jr., Rector) sent my folks to help start the fledgling parish on 41st Street. And, my future father-in-law was instrumental in the building of the church. Almost all of my family has been married and buried at Saint John's and Abby was baptized here. Along with Woody and I being "cradle" Episcopalians thanks to our parents, our grandparents on both sides and my great-grandparents were also Episcopal.

Q: In addition to being a member of the Altar Guild, you are also the wedding coordinator at our church. What does that involve? A: After a bride and groom have met with our rector and get the "green light" for their marriage, I help guide them through all the details that pertain to the church other than the sacrament. I meet with the couple to listen to their vision for the service and corresponding logistics. This may include the music, flowers, reception plans, and generally calming nerves. I serve as liaison to the broader Altar Guild, coordinate with the photographer or videographer on the day of the wedding, go to the rehearsal, and of course be present on the "big day" to ensure all the little details are in place. I followed Betty Swindle in this position about 25 years ago and simply love it. It has become my passion and mission!

Q: What are a few of your hobbies? A: I am an avid needle-pointer and have made several of the church kneelers. I have also stitched projects for Holy Family Cathedral, Boston Avenue Church, and a church in Norman. One of my favorite pasttimes has been needle-pointing a series of stand-up Santa Clauses. Getting to Know Our Singers

Meet choir member Caleb Ricketts, the new tenor section leader during Sunday morning services and a Chamber Choir member. We hope you enjoy getting to know just a little more about him in this interview!

Q: Where were you born? A: I was born in Danville, Virginia, but my family moved to Broken Arrow when I was four years old and that's where I have grown up.

Q: Were you raised Episcopalian? A: No. My parents met at Rhema Bible Training Center in Broken Arrow and that church was what led them to move back here when I was young. Like many Oklahomans, the Evangelical world was my upbringing. At the end of my freshman year (April of 2018) at the University of Tulsa I was contacted by Trinity Episcopal to join their choir. My first service there was the first liturgical service that I had ever attended. While initially quite the culture shock to my "charismatic" upbringing, the rich music of the service was quick to draw me in. In my past three years as an Episcopalian, I have grown further invested in the enriching musical standards and deep traditions of the faith.

Q: How did you find Saint John's? A: I am happy to say that Saint John has been an exciting new addition to my life in the past year! The monstrous works that we have tackled in the past year such as Howells's Dallas Canticles or Finzi's "Lo, the Full Final Sacrifice" have been truly exalted experiences.



Q: What is your favorite style of music? A: My music tastes are an ever-changing tree, often molding with whatever I am currently working on or feel passionate about. Currently I am quite fond of vocal jazz groups of the 1970s and 1980s, such as The Singers Unlimited, The Real Group, and of course, The Manhattan Transfer.
