Unboxing the Real Gifts of Christmas The Advent of Our Transformation.

As you read this, we have entered Advent Season which encompasses the four weeks prior to Christmas Eve (Dec 24th). Christmas Day marks the *beginning* of Christmas Season which continues to Epiphany (Jan 6). We can truly celebrate and relish the Christmas Season after earnestly preparing through Advent.

The Advent Season is a time of spiritual preparation to refocus our hearts and minds to the meaning and anniversary of the birth of Christ and the next coming of Christ. The origin of "advent" is from the Latin word *adventus* which simply translates "coming" or "arrival", particularly of something or someone significant.

During this Advent Season, we are releasing the confines or common notions of Christmas.

We will unbox Christmas looking deeper into the meaning of gifts that preceded the gift of Christ and the meaning for our lives. The preparation for welcoming Christ is preparation for our transformation when we embrace the fullness of God with us.

God sent Jesus into the world to begin a transformation to bring forth the intended family of God and the flourishing of all creation. That transformation is ongoing with traction and slippage. In all seasons, God is active. Part of our preparation is noticing how God is active with us and within us. How will we unbox our limiting conceptions to fully receive the transformation within ourselves and in the world that is underway and yet to come?

In this and the coming seasons, let us wholeheartedly attune to God's presence and counsel to make this the advent of our transformation. After the celebration of Christmas, may we more earnestly join Christ in the work of Christmas. In the words of Howard Thurman:

We do this not because we can, or because we are supposed to, but because we are called to be the hands and feet of Christ. Have you ever **hoped** for a place to call home? That is what Family Promise provides for families who are temporarily homeless. This past week, five members of a family moved into Hilltop House under a new model (for us) of transitional housing. They were welcomed by Doug Orr and Kevin Day and will be staying with us for six months. They are from Venezuela and have been on a long difficult journey to arrive in Utah. We **hope** they will join us in worship so please welcome them.

How would it feel to be out in the cold without a warm coat, hat and gloves? Saturday, December 4th from 10am- 1pm you have an opportunity to bring these items and more to benefit the Rescue Mission of Salt Lake. Mission team members will be in front of Hilltop House to accept your donations. Complete details are in the weekly Happenings. This will bring you a sense of **peace** that you cleaned out that closet! Picture a look of gratitude and **peace** for someone who is now warm.

On Sunday, December 5th, we Share our Bounty by bringing non-perishable food items to church. You may have extra canned goods from Thanksgiving or found a good case-lot sale. A very large donation of frozen food from a member moving out of town was a welcome



bonus at the November Bounty. Sharing with the Rescue Mission and Crossroads Urban Center brings **joy** to our hearts and provides for those suffering from food insecurity.

On November 2nd, members of the Mission team and the congregation were able to assemble and distribute food bags to students at the East Midvale Elementary School. This is a new partnership with the Utah Food Bank which Hilltop responded to immediately. The Mobile Food Pantry reaches 62 schools each month The slots are filled for December but volunteers are needed for January through May, on the first Tuesday from 1:30p-3:30p. Please call the church office and you will then be contacted with details by Elizabeth Mitchell. This is truly a **love** offering and what better expression during Advent.

Mobile Food Pantry

January 4 1:30-3:30 pm

The Mobile Food Pantry outreach got off to an outstanding start! Thank you to everyone who has volunteered. We have filled December, but will need folks for January - May. The outreach takes place the first Tuesday of the month from 1:30 - 3:30 p.m.

We're assembling and distributing food bags for families at East Midvale Elementary School. When we assisted in November, we learned that some of the children who attend the school live in the nearby Family Shelter or are refugees, in addition to other neighborhood families whose resources can't cover the food they need. This Utah Food Bank program reaches 62 schools in the State once a month. We're the labor on site that makes it all happen at East Midvale Elementary.

The program builds a better future for the kids and our community longterm. Children who get the nourishment they need do better in school, have less stress, and less illness. Thank you very much for responding to this opportunity to help.

Wei. Available in the Salt Lake County Library system



grounds and in different times in history, I am troubled by this trend. I completely agree that literature for our children should contain age-appropriate themes. I am also concerned that moves to ban books may limit the diversity of experiences children are exposed to while reading.

In that context, I found this month's selection on the shelves at my local library branch. *Come, Read With Me* is a celebration of reading and what can be learned in a good book. Two children move through a fantasy world, imagining adventures and meeting several storybook characters along the way. The book provides an interesting journey in its own right, but also gives readers a chance to look for favorite characters from other books along the way! The illustrations include children with many different skin tones to show that anyone can be a reader.
