


Our Candles of Reforming Hope and Love





CONSISTORY HIGHLIGHTS

Now that we are officially into the fall season, our Consistory focus has shifted to developing the 2022 budget and recruiting volunteers to serve on the Consistory. The Consistory met twice this month to address these issues in addition to reviewing reports for the various Church committees. Our attendance numbers have remained steady this year but are down from previous years as are the offering contributions.

Given the age of our church structure, 2021 included many repairs and general maintenance projects much of which was funded by ZION's endowment. The proposed 2022 budget will see a continuation of these same types of projects. Relining of the roof gutters should be completed by the end of 2021. In the 2022 proposed budget are the following major projects: installing a new roof for the church structure; painting of the exterior eaves; repairing of a pipe providing heat to the Sanctuary; painting and freshening of the Fellowship Hall (Soup Kitchen area); restoring of more headstones in the cemetery; installing of a new A/C system in the Sanctuary; repairing of exterior water drainpipes and landscaping; repairing of the front wall masonry; and installing of new shed doors.

The restoration of 7 gravestones in our cemetery has begun. Funding for this part of the project was made possible by a grant from the Bowman Foundation. The restoration of the remaining headstones will be an ongoing process due to the age of many of the headstones, the impact of the environment, and the topography of the cemetery.

The congregational vote on the 2022 budget and the election of Consistory members will take place on Sunday, December 12 immediately following the worship service. Voting will be open to those in the Sanctuary and to those who participate online.

The Pastoral Search Committee reported that the Congregational survey responses are still being accepted. These responses will assist in crafting a church profile that reflects who we are as a faith community and what our dreams are for the future. If you haven't responded yet, please do so as soon as possible.

The Central Atlantic Conference has adopted a Resolution of Witness. This is a statement of commitment to anti-racism, to anti-homophobia, and to all types of hate crimes. Churches in the conference may choose to make their own resolutions.

New outdoor lighting will be featured during the holidays. It will include lighting the Christmas wreath and the Bell Tower as well as displaying a lighted Nativity Scene.

And finally, this year there will be a special hybrid, multi-generational holiday Sunday School program open to all. The movie, "How the Grinch Stole Christmas," will be the focus of these sessions and will be shown on Sunday, November 29 following the Hanging of the Greens. Regardless of your age, new insights into this beloved Christmas classic will be made during these special Sunday School sessions. Please join us for this special program.

The Best Gifts A Parish Nurse Note December 2021

The season of giving is here. Many stress over finding the perfect gift- if there is such a thing. Gift giving goes back to the three Wise Men who traveled to visit the Christ-child, bringing gold, frankincense and myrrh. As early as the 13th century in what is now Turkey, a Christian monk or bishop named Nicholas was recognized for helping those in need; he became the patron saint of children. After the Reformation, honoring saints was discouraged, but the people in Holland continued to remember the good deeds of St. Nicholas. Dutch immigrants that settled in the New York area continued to celebrate this saint. Santa Claus is a shortened form of St. Nicholas and gift giving to children in his name started in America in the 1800's.



Money shouldn't be the focus when buying gifts; the old saying, "It's the thought that counts," rings true. Gifts of time, help and just your presence can be priceless to others. Bake something as a gift or take a meal to someone who is lonely or in need. Visit someone you haven't seen in a while or take them on an outing. Help them prepare a new recipe or teach them a skill that you have mastered. Sometimes just your presence is the greatest gift you can give someone.

This story comes to mind during this season of gift-giving: A young boy asks his father how much money he makes in an hour. The father, stressed and angry that his son is still up when he gets home from work late, tells his son to go to bed without answering the question. The boy is persistent, and finally his father tells him what he makes in an hour. The boy then asks his father for half of that amount. The father at first refuses to give his son any money, but after reconsidering, he gives his son the money. When the boy puts that money with some other money he had saved, the father is less than happy. Wanting to know why the boy needed more money, the boy told his father that he just didn't have enough for what he needed; but with this added amount, the boy now had just the right amount. The boy handed all the money to his father (the amount of one hour of his father's wages) and asked him if he could now have an hour of his father's time.

Giving of yourself and your time is the best gift ever. Not only does the recipient benefit, but giving is good for the giver's mental and physical health. Your time is a gift that cannot be assigned a monetary value. These past months of Covid-19 restrictions and regulations makes it even more important to give of yourself and your time to others.


Think wisely about your gift-giving this year and remember this Irish Christmas Prayer:


