Stir-Up Sunday

Today, the Sunday Next before Advent, is the last Sunday of the Church year. Next week begins the Church year anew with the first Sunday in Advent, four Sundays before Christmas. Our Collect today—perhaps one of the most famous in the Prayer Book—reminds us that it is 'Stir Up Sunday,' a Sunday synonymous with Christmas puddings. The great cry to "stir up" is a reminder to congregations to get the Christmas pudding made in plenty of time to mature before Christmas (a process easily aided by a healthy dose of brandy on top!).

However, the Stir Up (or *Excita*, "excite," in the Latin original) prayer is actually asking God for something much more important. We are praying that God will *stir up* our wills, so that we might get on with doing the good works he has planned for us to do. Then, as a consequence, we pray that we might receive our abundant reward.

In an age when so much is about how we feel, it is important to be given an alternate perspective. In the end, it is our will, rather than our feelings, that is the most important governour of our actions. Authentic love is not about feeling, but rather choosing—by our wills—to do good to others even though we may not feel good towards them. We pray that God will "stir up" our wills, so that they will be in charge of us, doing what we know is right.

This Sunday also directs us towards preparation for the coming Advent Season. Our focus will soon be on the Second Coming of Christ (the "Parousia"), the Last Judgment, and the Heavenly Jerusalem. What does the Church teach about the Parousia? That Jesus will come in glory unexpectedly, and that no man knows when this will be. When he comes, the bodies of the dead will be raised and united with their souls. All who have ever lived will be judged in what is called the "Last Judgment," which will happen in such a manner that everyone will know who Christ is and that his judgments are just. The world, and all creation, will be transformed and divinized. This is the great hope of the Christian, and today encourages us to allow God to begin to "stir up" that reality within us.

O watch and pray ere Advent dawn!
For thinner than the subtlest lawn
'Twixt thee and death the veil is drawn.
But love too late can never glow:
The scatter'd fragments Love can glean,
Refine the dregs, and yield us clean
To regions where one thought serene
Breathes sweeter than whole years of sacrifice below.






