It is disheartening to see people gathered and everyone looking at the tv, phone, or iPad. Everyone at our house knows the cell phone must be out of site. Gale's aunt Carma makes everyone put their phone in a basket and they can't pick it up until she gives approval later in the afternoon. We need to keep the focus on what is important about Thanksgiving—God and family- and being thankful for both.





As You start your holiday shopping — Remember Amazon Smile

How to use Amazon to fund the church projects.

As you probably know, the church has started a building fund and some of the projects to get our church ready for our 2022 bicentennial have begun.

Did you know that if you shop through Amazon, we can actually get a donation from them? The Smile website allows for a small portion of qualifying purchases to be donated to a charity of your choice, and we would hope you choose the church.

It's easy to do:

Open a browser window to https://smile.amazon.com Notice this is NOT just amazon.com, but it has a SMILE in it. This page will look slightly different than your usual Amazon page.

If you already have an Amazon account, you can sign in using the link in the upper right hand corner of the page.

Then click the "Get Started" button.

In the search box, type in "Rockville First United Methodist Church" and click "Search" for our church's name.

You should see the church name pop up in a list. Hit the gray "Select" button next to the church's name.

Check the box next to the statement "Yes, I understand that I must always start at **smile.amazon.com** to support Rockville First United Methodist Church."

Click the orange "Start Shopping" box

The next page you see is the regular Amazon shopping page that you normally have used.

You may get a pop up asking if you want to add an app to your browser to automatically go to the Smiles page each time.

Remember your purchases only help the church if you go to the smile.amazon.com before you start shopping.

shopping. This hasn't been tested on a mobile device, but if you use a phone or a tablet it may offer to load an app that will automatically go to the Smile account.

Council Business

Rob Belcher opened the meeting with prayer.

The September minutes were approved after the following corrections: Food Alliance Program, Melinda Duckett. Rob Belcher has ordered a tune-up kit and carburetor for the snow blower.

OLD BUSINESS:

Tuck Point construction will be moving to the front of the building for repairs. The roofers will start on October 23^{-c}.

<u>Handicap Ramp</u>: Council reviewed a set of plans for the new handicap ramp. The south side bottom step will come out farther than the north ramp to accommodate the turn of the handicap ramp. It was suggested to install handrails on both sides of the stairs. Lighting for the ramp was discussed. It was decided the lighting we have now is sufficient. The church sign also needs to be updated, maybe using the framing of the existing sign. A possibility of installing a digital sign.

<u>Covered Bridge</u>: Parking lot project total was \$7,445. Rummage sale total was \$1,175.25 and Soup Dinner total was \$694.

Mary Jane Evens reported the carpet is being removed from the downstairs classroom. There is still 1 couch and cardboard boxes that need to be removed. Alex and Carol Milligan have volunteered to paint and replace flooring of the downstairs bathrooms.

NEW BUSINESS:

There are wires and live gas lines connected on the condensation pump on one of the old boilers. Bill Becker will contact AC Electric to disconnect the units. The boiler is located downstairs in the last room on the right.

Quotes are needed for the installation of the doors downstairs to secure the area. Double doors are needed but will have to be according to code for security.

CODA is meeting at the church every other Wednesday 6:00 p.m. – 7:00 pm. The church's representative needs to lock/unlock the doors, check the heat and/or AC.

<u>Pastor's Report:</u> We received requests from Riverton Parke Post Prom committee for donations for the prom. It was decided to not donate to either Parke County schools for Post Prom.

Pastor Jon reviewed the Charge Conference reports. Charge conference will be held at the Brazil First United Methodist Church on November 21st at 3:00 p.m.

Emergency lights have been installed.

Elaine Waltz reported the screen door on the porch is in need of repair. It was decided to remove the screen door.

The church could apply for the Historical Church Award. A list of requirements was presented by the Pastor. It was felt that this may be good to coordinate with the 200th Anniversary, but appears it may be too time consuming to get done now.

The Church took a bus trip to Newport to see the Lester's Southern Gospel group which was enjoyed by all. The Lester's have a Matinee on December 4th at Ridge Farm, IL. We are making plans to attend. There will be a charge of \$25 for the concert and meal.

Ad Council Minutes, Cont'd

Trustee's Report:

Cottrell Construction will start on the roof on October 23rd. There is no credit through our insurance to use the upgraded shingle, so regular shingle will be used.

When the Tuck Point is completed, we need to get quotes on repairing/replacing the wood trim around the outside windows.

There is another broken window leading into the nursery. The brick contractors from American Masonry did board up the window temporarily. Bill Becker will contact Professional Glass to repair the window and look into other windows with BB holes.

B&B Foods inspected the oven that was not lighting. They made a few minor adjustments, and the oven is now operating properly.

Next construction phase: Winter project after the roof is completed; paint and make repairs in the Chapel. Determine color and get quotes on drapery.

Finance Report: Mary Jane Evens reviewed the financial report.

Mark Spelbring has submitted an application for a grant through the United Methodist Foundation.

Staff Parish Relations Report:

Our janitor, Russ Hall, has repaired the shop vacs found in the basement. He is also checking the emergency lights and the monthly inspection of the fire extinguishers.

<u>Bicentennial Committee:</u> Next meeting will be Thursday, October 21st at 5 p.m.

The next meeting will be November 16, 2021.





November 1 is All Saints Day, a sometimes-overlooked holy day in United Methodist congregations. It is not nearly as well known as the day before, All Hallows' (Saints') Eve, better known as Halloween, but is far more important in the life of the church.

John Wesley, founder of the Methodist movement, enjoyed and celebrated All Saints Day. In a journal entry from November 1, 1767, Wesley calls it "a festival I truly love." On the same day in 1788, he writes, "I always find this a comfortable day." The following year he calls it "a day that I peculiarly love."

This may sound odd. United Methodists don't believe in saints. Right?

Well, yes... and no.

Wesley cautioned against holding saints in too high regard. The Articles of Religion that he sent to the Methodists in America in 1784, include a statement against "invocation of saints" (Article XIV—Of Purgatory, Book of Discipline ¶104). Wesley did not see biblical evidence for the practice and discouraged Methodists from participating.

However, he also advised against disregarding the saints altogether.

In an All Saints Day journal entry dated Monday, November 1, 1756, Wesley writes, "How super-stitious are they who scruple giving God solemn thanks for the lives and deaths of his saints!" (If your 18th century English is as rusty as mine, it might help to know that the word *scruple means not doing something because you think it's wrong.*)

Those to glory gone

Tradition: A Theological Guideline

In studying <u>John Wesley's theological method</u>, scholars have found four, inter-related theological guidelines: Scripture, tradition, experience, and reason. These are the sources of our understanding of our faith.

By <u>tradition</u> we mean all that has gone before us in the Christian church. We are part of a long history that goes back through John Wesley, to the early days of the Church, and the apostles of Jesus. When we think theologically we need to keep in mind the creeds, prayers, sermons, books, music, and all other ways Christians have understood the work of God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit in their lives.

All Saints Day is an opportunity to give thanks for those who have gone before us in the faith. It is a time to celebrate our history, what United Methodists call the tradition of the church.

From the early days of Christianity, there is a sense that the Church consists of not only all living believers, but also all who have gone before us. For example, in Hebrews 12 the author encourages Christians to remember that a "great cloud of witnesses" surrounds us encouraging us, cheering us on.

Charles Wesley, John's brother, picks up on this theme in his hymn that appears in our United Methodist Hymnal as "Come, Let Us Join our Friends Above," #709. In the first verse, he offers a wonderful image of the Church through the ages:

Let saints on earth unite to sing, with those to glory gone, for all the servants of our King in earth and heaven, are one.

On All Saints Day we can remember all those who are part of the "communion of saints" we confess whenever we recite The Apostles' Creed. We share stories of those "to glory gone."

Retelling these stories grounds us in our history. These memories teach us how God has provided for us through the generosity and sacrifice of those who have come before us. The stories of the saints encourage us to be all God has created us to be.

Saints on earth

Charles Wesley's hymn tells us those "to glory gone" are joined by the "saints on earth." We think of the inspirational people with whom we worship on Sunday, and those across the world we will never meet. We celebrate fellow United Methodists who inspire us, and those of other denominations whose lives encourage us. We give thanks for those with whom we agree, as well as those whose views we do not share.

Additionally, we remember and pray for our sisters and brothers in Christ who faithfully follow Jesus in places where being labeled a Christian puts them in harm's way.

One song

On All Saints Day, we recognize that we are part of a giant choir singing the same song. It is the song Jesus taught his disciples; a tune that has resonated for more than 2,000 years; a melody sung in glory and on the earth. Our great privilege is to add our voices to this chorus.

The last verse of "Come, Let Us Join our Friends Above" encourages us to sing faithfully while on earth, so we might join the heavenly chorus one day.

Our spirits too shall quickly join, like theirs with glory crowned, and shout to see our Captain's sign, to hear His trumpet sound.

O that we now might grasp our Guide! O that the word were given! Come, Lord of Hosts, the waves divide, and land us all in heaven.

On All Saints Day, let us give thanks for both the saints in glory and those on earth, who have led us to Jesus. As they have shared the gospel with us, may we add our voices so someone else may hear about the grace and love of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Thanks be to God for the lives of his saints.




