

Personal Integrity and Our Relationships With One Another

2 Corinthians 1:12-22 January 30, 2022

<u>The Big Idea</u>: We all know what it's like to be misunderstood. There is pain in having our motives questioned. Unjust criticism stings. Paul, in 2 Corinthians 1-2, models how a faithful Christian should respond to those things. We are called, as Christians, to put our focus on Christ in all the ups and downs of friendships.

THE BACKSTORY:

2 Corinthians 1:12-22 (ESV)

1 12 For our boast is this, the testimony of our conscience, that we behaved in the world with simplicity and godly sincerity, not by earthly wisdom but by the grace of God, and supremely so toward you. 13 For we are not writing to you <u>anything other than what you read</u> and understand and I hope you will fully understand— 14 just as you did partially understand us—<u>that on the day of our Lord Jesus you will boast of us as we will boast of you</u>.

¹⁵ Because I was sure of this, I wanted to come to you first, so that you might have a second experience of grace. ¹⁶ I wanted to visit you on my way to Macedonia, and to come back to you from Macedonia and have you send me on my way to Judea. ¹⁷ Was I vacillating when I wanted to do this? Do I make my plans according to the flesh, ready to say "Yes, yes" and "No, no" at the same time? ¹⁸ As surely as God is faithful, our word to you has not been Yes and No.

For the Son of God, Jesus Christ, whom we proclaimed among you, Silvanus and Timothy and I, was not Yes and No, but in him it is always

Yes. ²⁰ For all the promises of God find their Yes in him. That is why it is through him that we utter our Amen to God for his glory.

²¹ And **it is God** who **establishes** us with you in Christ, and has **anointed** us, ²² and who has also put his **seal** on us and given us <u>his Spirit</u> in our hearts as a guarantee.

Take-Aways For God's People Today:

- 1. When at all possible, a Christian should keep their word and follow through on their commitments. This a direct reflection of how we value our relationships. [2 Corinthians 8:21]
- 2. Circumstances change and sometimes people are not able to do what they said they would. Do we offer them the understanding and grace we want others to give to us when we are the one who can't follow through?
- 3. One way to minimize fallout from interruptions is to be a person known for keeping promises and commitments. When we don't, are people surprised? Or, do they think, "This is the way they are. I can't count on them." [Psalm 7:8]
- 4. Personal integrity <u>begins</u> and is <u>sustained</u> in "<u>small</u>" decisions we make every day about telling the truth, doing what we say we'll do, and giving honest answers to questions. [Luke 16:10]
- 5. If I lose my integrity, I lose my ability to lead and influence others. This becomes a huge Gospel issue for Christians. [1 Peter 2:12]
- 6. When you've been disappointed by someone else's failure, look to Jesus and forgive the offender. Jesus is always faithful to keep His promises. [1 Corinthians 1:19-20]
- 7. Christ is the epitome of integrity and the ultimate source of integrity for his people. Our submission to His Lordship demands that we be people of our word and people of grace towards others. ["...it is through him that we utter our Amen to God for his glory." v. 20 b]

Integrity is the glue that holds our way of life together.

We must constantly strive to keep our integrity intact. When wealth is lost, nothing is lost; when health is lost, something is lost; when character is lost, all is lost.
