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Addiction is one of the behaviors we are most judgmental about. Most of the time it is because we have no reference to or experience with it. There are as many addictions as there are flowers in the garden. Some are just seen more than others and most all of us like to think we are above or better than those who struggle with the worst.

The first thing that has to happen for those who bear addiction is to admit that they have one. In whatever way they feel most comfortable they need to seek help. <u>This may seem easy to most people, but it is NOT!</u> They have all kinds of fears about treatment.

The first thing the rest of us need to do is give them a break, especially if they are taking steps to <u>get better</u>. Whether we want to admit it or not, there are few of us without some kind of addiction. We have addictions of wanting the latest version of everything, so we can feel that we are better than others through our toys, cars and clothing... the houses we live in... the schools we send our kids to. We spend ourselves into bankruptcy to make those things happen. Some of us swear like coalminers, mostly when few others are around... We eat ourselves into obesity and bad health... We judge others constantly... sometimes not even realizing it at the time. These are just some of the common addictions that we share and we often don't even see them. I could go on and on and on. So the next time you judge someone like this, think of the addiction that you carry and overlook or hide so well...

People don't continue addiction because they like what is happening to them. They have no control over their behavior. That's the problem! In some cases they are suicidal, because they can't control their behavior.

In most of the cases, that I have been involved with, one of the first steps is to receive the Lord into their lives. They admit that they need a higher power to help them overcome. We could do them a great service to be there for them as a servant of His love, rather than the Devil's spokesman for condemnation! Surely they need to be accountable for their actions, but they also need to be forgiven in grace, as the Lord does for us. Phíl The weather man is predicting that Phil, the ground hog, if he were to live around here, would not see his shadow because of an approaching storm, so spring is just around the corner; but, in Punxsutawney, where Phil lives, it is supposed to be a mostly clear morning. So, Phil will likely see his shadow, indicating that there will be six more weeks of winter. This is not the best way to predict the weather.




The weather is something that we talk about, making predictions, all the time. If a storm is on the way, we want to know about it so we can prepare to withstand it. Fortunately, weather forecasting has been greatly enhanced over the years, and we are given a better idea about what might transpire. We are warned well in advance. It is a whole lot better than using something like "Red sky at night, sailors' delight; Red sky at morning, sailors take warning." An old adage, which is true, within limits.

It is true, most of the time, because weather patterns move from west to east with the prevailing winds. At night, we look west to see the setting sun, and how its rays refract on the dust and moisture particles. Red is the result them being suspended in a high pressure trough with stable air. And we can see it because no storm clouds are building up to block the sun's rays, indicating that good weather will likely follow. But, looking east to the sunrise and seeing red indicates that the high pressure trough has already passed and a low pressure trough is likely on its way, which usually brings storms. It is not always accurate, but is often enough to be a reliable way of predicting the weather.

Jesus even talked about it this phenomenon. It was when some Pharisees and Sadducees were "testing" Him to see if He really was the Christ, or not. It took place immediately after He had miraculously feed 4000 people with seven loaves of bread and a few fish (Mt. 15:32-39). Not seeing this as a sign, they asked Jesus to show them a "sign from heaven." He said, "You see a red sky in the evening and say, 'It will be fair weather,' but you can not discern the signs of the times?"

In his gospel, John highlighted seven signs that can be used to determine that it was the right time for God to send His Son to save the world, just as He promised. They were: Changing water into wine, Healing the royal official's son, Healing a paralyzed man, Feeding the 5,000, Walking on water, Healing the man born blind, and Raising Lazarus from the dead. Jesus offered more signs than these, but John felt like they were enough to convince anyone who could "discern signs." He didn't list the only sign that Jesus told these Pharisees and Sadducees that He would show them: The Sign of Jonah. It was a veiled reference to His death, burial, and resurrection. And is the only sign that anyone really needs to 'see' in order to predict the 'weather' (spiritually speaking).

We are enjoying the good weather of God's favor. A season when we can respond to God's offer of grace. But the storm of God's judgement is approaching. It is on the horizon. We can prepare ourselves for it by trusting God to save us. Those who do don't have to worry about that storm, whenever it arrives, for God's grace will bring us through it unharmed.
