





- Tom: "Wait, what...?"






It's all so confusing...

- You hear some form of speech you disagree with (e.g., pro-abortion demonstration).
 - You would want to protect the freedom to make the speech because you believe freedom of speech is necessary for a free society.
- Woke person hears a disagreeable form of speech (e.g., pro-life demonstration on a college campus).
 - They might want to use the force of their movement to put a stop to it.
 - They view the protection of such speech as contributing to oppression.
 - They are willing to restrict freedoms and rights (freedom of speech, and particularly religious liberty) to end oppression as they define it.

- We have to understand the Marxist ideological lenses of the Woke movement.
- We have to "unpack" the worldview of CT.


Systemic Power and Oppression

- Industrialized, capitalist societies force people into hierarchical categories (groups) defined by systemic power.
 - Oppressor: Groups that have power
 - Oppressed: Groups that do not have power

 The two groups compete with one another in a zero-sum conflict over the opportunities, goods, and resources of society. Those in power always win and always oppress the powerless.


Systemic Power and Oppression

• Marx: Basis of systemic power is social class.



The powerful bourgeoise always wins and **always oppresses** the powerless proletariat. There is <u>one and only one organizational</u> <u>principle of society that really matters</u>, **systemic power**.

How did Marx view religion?



Karl Heinrich Marx (1818-1883)

 Religion pacifies "the common folk" so they'll tolerate unjust oppression.

"Religion is the sigh of the oppressed creature, the heart of a heartless world, and the soul of soulless conditions. It is the opium of the people".

How did Marx view **Power** and **Oppression?**

 Common Understanding: Power and oppression are defined by *individuals* and their actions. The roles of oppressor and oppressed vary by circumstance. No one is inherently guilty of oppression, and nobody is inherently exempt from oppression.

How did Marx view
 Power and **Oppression**?

• Marxist Understanding: Power and oppression are systemic: "baked into the fabric of society." The roles of oppressor and oppressed depend on the position of one's social identity in society.



How can a society overcome Systemic Power and Oppression?

REVOLUTION

 The only way to overcome systemic power and oppression is to change society itself through revolution.



How is Marx's view of power and oppression relevant today?

- Critical Theorists of today conceptualize power and oppression in the same way.
 - Only White people can be racist, and all White people are inherently racist (e.g., DiAngelo, 2018; Kendi, 2020).



How is Marx's view of power and oppression relevant today?

- Further, they argue that we cannot overcome the white supremacy that is baked into our society through reform; we need a revolution.
- They don't want to reform law enforcement; they want to abolish ("defund") it and start over (Crenshaw et al., 1996; Kendi, 2020).



How does revolution happen?

- Problem: False Consciousness. Oppressed working class is blind to the true nature of class oppression; they have a *false consciousness*.
- Solution: "Woke." The oppressed working class needs to awaken to see the true nature of their oppression; they need to gain class consciousness.
- If a critical number of people gain a class consciousness they naturally will want to ban together, rise up, overthrow their oppressors, and make a new **utopian society**.



Marxism is about *taking power and exerting control*.

- If you disagree with them, Marxist organizations call you part of the problem.
- Marxist organizations <u>declare speech and actions</u> <u>against the movement</u> as <u>oppression</u>, as something that should be banned from society (sound familiar?).

Take-home Message: Three Central Ideas

 First, there is <u>one and only one organizational principle of society</u> that really matters, systemic power and oppression. Systemic power and oppression are the fundamental problems of society.

- Second, power and oppression are societal problems, not problems among individuals. They are "built into the fabric of society." The focus is on *society*. This means two things:
 - Status as oppressor or oppressed is based on your social identity, the group you belong to and the position of that group in society.
 - Oppression is everywhere.

Abstract

Glaciers are keylcons of climate change and global environmental change. However, the relationships among gender, science, and glaciers – particularly related to epistemological questions about the production of glaciological knowledge – remain understudied. This paper thus proposes a feminist glaciology framework with four key components: I) knowledge producers; (2) gendered science and knowledge; (3) systems of scientific domination; and (4) alternative representations of glaciers. Marging feminist postacolonial science studies and feminist political ecology, the feminist glaciology framework generates rolust analysis of gender, power, and epistemologies in dynamic social-ecological systems, thereby leading to more just and equitable science and human-ice interactions.

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Take-home Message: Three Central Ideas

- Third, Marxist movements like the "Woke movement" and the LGBTQ+ movement sound like liberation ideologies concerned with the good of society but they're not.
- They intend to take power and exert control. They are **totalitarian** in the enforcement of their ideas, making people afraid to speak up against them.
