He made it a Holy Day because on that day he rested from his work, all the creating God had done. This is the story of how it all started, of Heaven and Earth when they were created.

Genesis 2:1-4, The Message Bible

Dear Siblings in Christ,

When Luke was smaller, I loved to watch him sleep. It was as though all his wannabe-grown-upness, his independence, and his tough-guy exterior melted away and I was reminded of the baby who rested on my shoulder quite often. Even as a teen sometimes resisting sleep is impossible, no matter how hard he tries. Not too long ago we had a long drive home from a trip. All the way he talked – until we were finally about five miles from home. There, in the middle of his own sentence, he began to snore.

Rest. It's important and restorative. Watching Luke sleep, even at fourteen years old, I'm reminded that it's the only time he grows. I'm reminded that it's when we heal. God, who created us, designed us to need and to use rest as a way of literally being **rest**ored. Even God took a day off after using all that energy to create. The gospels are filled with stories of Jesus taking a break. He practices good self care. Why don't we?

Years ago, our culture shifted to a place where we're constantly plugged in, engaged, available to one another, and working. We compete with one another about who is the busiest, whose schedule is fuller, whose last week was the craziest. We began to devalue our need and desire for simple rest, whether it's a good night's sleep or a great afternoon nap. Or, maybe just an hour on the porch sitting with a good book, or with nothing. I know some of you are busier in retirement than you ever were while working outside your homes.

And the pandemic's influence? We invented ways to be engaged when the pandemic shut us down. I, for one, never heard of Zoom until I heard of Covid. We've been in solid "go mode" since

March 2020, looking for new ways to engage and to reinvite activity. While participation in community is good, nourishing, fulfilling, and necessary, so is stopping. So is being alone with God. I think it's especially important that we recognize this as we continue to reengage in our pre-pandemic activities. We were overdoing it; let's not go back to overdoing it!

Rest, too, is especially important as we look toward and plan for a busy holiday season. More thanks are not given and Christ's birth is not more celebrated if your calendar is full. Be intentional about your activities and remember that resting in the Lord is also celebrating the life that God has breathed into you. (I know this is not the first I've written about this subject, and it won't be the last -I, too, need to hear this regularly. (\bigcirc))

God calls us to take a break, to truly honor that commandment about taking a Sabbath day – to be at holy rest with the Lord so that we might be **rest**ored by the Spirit's presence. Take in a deep breath. Pause for a bit. You need it. You deserve it. God commands it. You are God's beloved child. It's okay to collapse in God's arms for a while; rest on the Lord's shoulder and snore. Interrupt yourself to do it. And, may you wake refreshed by God's holy rest.

Some mothers had asked for paper towels, toilet paper, cleaning supplies and other household needs. WELCA News

The ladies met in October and got down to business immediately. First, we sent \$300 to New Hope Ministries for Trinity's semi annual contribution. This is our church's contribution and is based on the East Berlin/Abbottstown Food Pantries' Board recommendation that each local church contribute annually to help with the Food Pantry.

- 3. We once again will have a Christmas Angel Tree so Trinity's congregation can help local families from South Central Community Action Program (SCCAP) located in Adams County. Details are in this newsletter.
- 4. We will be making Christmas wreaths to share with our shut-ins to brighten their holidays. A date & time will be announced for anyone who would like to help create these wreaths.
- 5. We will also be collecting new, warm bedding to be given to local families this winter. This project was done last year & the families receiving items were extremely grateful. A Thrivent Action Team card will be applied for to help with this project as well.

Our next meeting will be Tuesday, November 2 at 7 PM. Looking ahead, the Men's Ministry Group offered to make a Christmas meal for the ladies and we are planning for it to be held Tuesday, December 7.



Review it daily, praying over each blessing, "I thank God for …." Add to it as you think of new things.



Bob called the meeting to order and Pastor Susan led with a Devotional Liturgy with scripture reading from Romans 15: 13-14.

The agenda was reviewed and one item, the proposed budget was moved from Old Business to New Business in the agenda list.

Secretary's Report-was reviewed and Dona made a motion to approve as written, Louise seconded the motion, all agreed and the motion carried. Until COVID cases begin to fall rather than rise, we recommend ceasing congregational singing while worshipping indoors. However, cantor(s), masked and plexiglass shielded, can serve as the voice of the congregation in hymn singing or singing parts of the liturgy. In addition, liturgical parts could be spoken by the congregation. Please consider moving to OUTDOOR worship. The weather allows it, but it would also make us safer to continue congregational singing, as well as allowing the choir to return to their important role. The choir should not resume singing indoors.

ALL SAINTS

Pastor Susan has a great idea for using congregational candles during All Saints, during the reading of the saints. The congregational candles will be lit prior to the reading of names, and when the name of a loved one is read, the family is encouraged to raise their candle.

Finance:

Finance Committee Summary Report- Month Ending September 30,2021

Total income for September was 15,594 and total expenses \$15,099; Year to date income \$144,938 and YTD expenses \$148,763 for a YTD deficit \$3,825. Of this total, Current Income for September was \$14,421 and Current Expenses \$13,905. Year to date Current income \$134,094 and YTD Current Expenses (Excludes Benevolence) \$136,696 for a YTD Deficit of \$2,602. Compared to 2021 budgeted income of \$148,257 our cur-

rent giving is short by \$14,162. Due to reduced expenses in 2021 the effect of this shortfall has been minimized but we are operating with a small deficit. As we continue to "return to normal" we can expect to incur more normal budgeted expenses so meeting our budgeted Income will be important to avoid a reduction of cash. This past month we received a bill for Pastor's benefits of over \$5K. This bill is being challenged as it appears that Terry's benefits were incorrectly suspended, and Trinity was being billed for certain portions of his medical coverage. We are awaiting a review of this situation from the Portico and will continue to pay the normal budgeted benefits until this situation is resolved. Cash on hand to meet current operating expenses is \$30,121. Income for our commitment to Synod Benevolence (\$12K) is ahead of budget and is currently at \$10,843. Please keep in mind the Newsletter Treasurer's report only includes budgeted income and expense accounts. Income and expenses for capital projects (contributions designated for "property") are not part of current income and operating expenses. In the last quarter of the year, we do have some notable larger expenses such as HVAC maintenance contracts, cemetery maintenance and insurance payments which will total approximately \$5K.

Capital Improvement Checking and CD's

Recognizing a near term (3-5 years) need to tuckpoint our bell tower and perform some other capital maintenance, Council began placing contributions that were designated for Property/Capital Improvements into CD's in anticipation of the financial need to have these services performed. We currently have \$75K in Capital improvement CD's and \$28K in the Capital improvement checking account. Sometime next year the Finance Committee will consider a recommendation to move additional funds from Capital Improvement checking and place these funds in Capital improvement CD's leaving a portion in checking to cover any unexpected Capital expenditures.

<u>Other</u>

Unlike other accounts designated as "checking", Mission in Motion, WELCA and Missionary Support checking accounts are not part of Trinity's "General Fund" and are maintained separately with different authorized signors of the accounts.

Sabbatical Leave CD is part of the Pastor's compensation package. We currently contribute \$750/year to this CD. The balance that has accumulated in this CD to date was accumulated during Pastor George's service at Trinity. The conditions of the Sabbatical Leave policy were not met during Pastor George's call therefore this money remains as an asset of Trinity and was not subject to payment under the terms of the Sabbatical Leave Policy.

Social Ministry:

Ruth's Harvest Packing continues <u>Tuesday</u>, October 19 at 1:00pm at St. John's in Abbottstown.

WELCA-voted to pay the \$300 semi-annual Food Pantry contribution for Trinity Lutheran Church. This is our church's contribution and is based on the Food Pantry's council's recommendation that each church contribute annually.

We also donated \$250 to our local VFW for their Wreaths Across America project. Deb King has information to share with our congregation & will include this in our next newsletter.

We are hoping to help local SCCAP families with their Christmas wish lists by doing a Christmas Angel Tree. More information will be shared soon.

Mission in Motion-met October 5, 2021

The meeting was called to order by Pastor Susan and opened with a Devotional Liturgy. Kay Hinkle presented a historical summary of MIM and discussion followed about the future path of MIM and the various options being considered. Kay Hinkle has resigned from a leadership role in MIM and none of the four remaining voting members were willing to assume that vacancy. After a lengthy discussion, the group reached a consensus there is a desire to continue MIM under a new leadership format. A motion was made by Mike

Brown to disband the core voting group currently existing and open voting to all participants of MIM activities. The three core voters in attendance unanimously voted to disband the current voting structure accordingly.

Additional discussion then ensued to determine a new organizational structure. - Attention Church members!!! Property Committee is requesting additional help in the cleaning and maintenance areas and to become members of the Property committee. Most of members are now in retirement age and some younger members sure would be GREAT!! Their next meeting will be held October 21 in the morning.

Pastor's Report

The Pastor's calendar for November was reviewed. Also, Pastor Susan reported that she had her first Hybrid Church Academy meeting and it is going well. Her visits to the home bound members at nursing facilities have been challenging as Covid numbers keep shutting the doors to visitors. She reschedules them and tries again.

Old Business

Covid 19-discussion was held on Worship & Music Committee's recommendations for worshiping. Our congregation should be masked when indoors, plexiglass should go back up at the choir loft for the cantors, and at the pulpit. Holy Communion may continue using the elements handed out with tongs. No choir will sing at this time. Louise made a motion to accept the new recommendations, Mark seconded, all agreed and the motion carried.

Discussion was also held about the upcoming events scheduled with our congregation, and registration will be required for events to help plan safely and masks must be worn.

2022 Budget-it was reviewed and details were discussed. Dona made a motion to accept the proposed budget presented by the Finance Committee, Louise seconded the motion, all agreed and the motion carried.

The meeting was adjourned, and Pastor gave a sending blessing and we ended with The Lord's Prayer.
