
#### Ministry Mission Statement:

### THE CANDY CANE STORY – AN OBJECT LESSON



Hold up a candy cane or give one to each child in your family or class. Have them describe it to you. As they share their observations, tell them how each says something about Jesus Christ:

**"the white"** – Jesus was pure and holy; He was without sin.

Hebrews 4:15: "For we do not have a high priest who

is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who has been tempted in every way, just as we are yet was without sin."

The white is also a picture of how God washes our sins away and makes us white as snow when we trust in Jesus as Savior.

Isaiah 1:18: ""Come now, let us reason together," says the Lord. "Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they are red as crimson, they shall be like wool."

"the red stripes" – The red, of course, is a picture of the blood Jesus shed for each of us; the red stripes depict the stripes on His back as He was beaten.

Isaiah 53:5: "But he was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities: the chastisement of our peace was upon him; and with his stripes we are healed."

"the hardness of the candy" – The hardness represents Jesus as our "Rock": if we build our lives upon Him, they will be secure and lasting.

Luke 6:38: "He is like a man building a house, who dug down deep and laid the foundation on rock. When a flood came, the torrent struck that house but could not shake it because it was well built." Ephesians 2:20: "Built on the foundations of apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the chief cornerstone."

1 Peter 2:6: "For in Scripture it says: "See, I lay a stone in Zion, a chosen and precious cornerstone, and the one who trusts in him will never be put to shame."

"the candy cane's shape" – The candy cane is shaped like a shepherd's staff; the Bible calls Jesus our Good Shepherd who watches over us and cares for us; we are called the sheep of His pasture.

John 10:11: "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep."

Psalm 100:3: "Know that the Lord is God. It is he who made us, and we are his; we are his people, the sheep of his pasture."

"upside down candy cane" – If you turn the candy cane upside now, it makes a J for Jesus!

Matthew 1:21: "She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus because he will save his people from their sins."


In God's reminder to persevere I felt comforted. And strengthened. I realized that it's not enough to keep going on my own.

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# Is There a Meaning Behind "The 12 Days of Christmas"?



There has been much written about the meaning of the holiday classic, "The 12 days of Christmas." This article does not claim to answer the question definitively; however, it does present one researcher's findings which seem creditable.

"The 12 Days of Christmas" may not be as beloved as some other favorite Christmas carols but ask anyone what their true love gave/sent them on the first day of Christmas, and they'd probably be able to sing right back to you, "A partridge in a pear tree!"

The following are facts determined by the *Good Housekeeping* writer identified below. Consider the fact that not much of the song makes sense from a modern perspective. Like most old tales, you have to first understand the context of when they were written.

**First, what are the 12 days of Christmas?** The twelve days over which the song takes place is a reference to Christianity. "The 12 Days of Christmas" historically does not reference the days leading up to Christmas but rather the 12 days following, known as Twelvetide. The period begins with the birth of Christ on December 25th and ends with the coming of the three wise men on January 6th, known as the Epiphany or Three Kings Day. The weeks before Christmas are known as Advent, ending on December 24th.

**The lyrics to "The 12 Days of Christmas" were originally different.** Though some scholars believe that the song is French in origin, the first printed appearance of the song was in the English children's book *Mirth Without Mischief.* In the original lyrics, the "four calling birds" were actually "four colly birds." The term "colly" is Old English slang for birds dark as coal, a.k.a. blackbirds. In other versions of the song, the partridge is replaced with a "very pretty peacock upon a pear tree." If you think that's weird, consider a Scottish version that gifts "an Arabian baboon." It wasn't until 1909 that British composer Frederic Austin penned the version of the lyrics that we are all familiar with today.

**The song originated as a game.** Most historians believe that the Christmas carol started out as a "memory-and-forfeit" game in 1800s England. These types of games were played by British school children, and the rules were simple: When it's your turn, you repeat all the previously sung lyrics and add the next one. If you can't remember a verse, you owe your opponent a "forfeit," which was usually a kiss or piece of candy.

**The song doesn't have a hidden biblical meaning.** You may have seen this theory floating around via chain emails and message boards. In a nutshell, the theory claims that during a time when Christians were punished for worshiping openly, "The 12 Days of Christmas" song was used to secretly pass on the ideology of Christianity. Per this theory, each gift symbolizes a different aspect of the Christian faith:

- ✤ The Partridge in a Pear Tree is Jesus Christ.
- ✤ The 2 Turtle Doves are the Old and New Testaments.
- The 3 French Hens are Faith, Hope, and Charity, the theological virtues.
- The 4 Calling Birds are the four gospels or the four evangelists.
- ✤ The 5 Colden Rings are the first five books of the Old Testament, the Pentateuch.
- ✤ The 6 Geese A-laying are the six days of creation.



- ◆ The 7 Swans A-swimming are the gifts of the Holy Spirit, the seven sacraments.
- The 8 Maids A-milking are the eight beatitudes.
- The 9 Ladies Dancing are the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit.
- The 10 Lords A-leaping are the ten commandments.
- The 11 Pipers Piping are the eleven faithful apostles (Judas not counted).
- The 12 Drummers Drumming are the twelve points of doctrine in the Apostle's Creed.

Snopes, a factchecking/myth debunking site, breaks down the many historical and logistical errors in the "hidden meanings" theory as follows: If Christians were living in fear of even mentioning the basic tenant of Christianity, how were they able to sing a song that mentions the word "Christmas" in every lyric?

Wherever one researches the meaning of "The 12 Days of Christmas, many versions will be found. My family enjoys singing this song, and we're not going to worry about the meaning unless we find something that is immoral or illegal. Since Christmas is fast-approaching, I must tune up for my part -5 Golden Rings. Unfortunately, my cousin, who sang this part of the song with me, transitioned in October of this year. So, if the song has no other meaning for me, it will remind me of my cousin and the fun we had singing, "Five Golden Rings.

### Don't Just Say You Are My Sister REALLY BE MY SISTER!

Psalm 133:1-3: How good and pleasant it is when God's people live together in unity! It is like precious oil poured on the head, running down on the beard, running down on Aaron's beard, down on the collar of his robe. It is as if the dew of Hermon were falling on Mount Zion. For there the LORD bestows his blessing, even life forevermore.

Psalm 133 is one of the shortest chapters in the Book of Psalms. It is believed that David may have composed this Psalm after he was unanimously crowned as king by the united tribes of Israel, or after his son Absalom's revolt was put down and the tribes hurried to show their loyalty to David. This Psalm may also be viewed as prophetic, referring to the reunion of the tribes after the Babylonian captivity, to the unity of the Christians at the time of the Gospels, or to the Messianic Age.

What I find so profound about Psalms 133 is that in three short Bible verses we learn that:

- 1. It is God's desire for us to live in unity & it is our responsibility to work together in harmony. *How good* and pleasant it is when God's people live together in unity!
- 2. There is individual benefit in our obedience to God's desire for us to live in unity. It provides a total covering of blessing flowing down our head and face and over our shoulders. It is like precious oil poured on the head, running down on the beard, running down on Aaron's beard, down on the collar of his robe.

3. When we work together in harmony there is life long benefit to our family, our Ministry, our Church and to our Community. - It is as if the dew of Hermon were falling on Mount Zion. For there the LORD bestows his blessing, even life forevermore.

So why does it seem that no matter what you are involved in - family, ministry, work - God always blesses you with one very special person who not only drives you totally bonkers but who also seems to have the uncanny ability to bring out the worst in you? I think I may have figured it out . . . God has a very interesting sense of humor because God's Unity is a precious gift, a prize that can't be totally appreciated without considerable effort and sacrifice. God's Unity is a state of the heart, an internal commitment that only comes with spiritual maturity and growth which probably also has a whole lot to do with long suffering!

So how do we get to the point where the importance of being unified, especially when we are about God's business, takes priority over what we all suffer from - our will, our pride and our selfishness? When does being obedient to God's desire for us to get along trump our immediate reaction to an imagined slight or offence intentional or not? What will it take when pulling off our earrings and kicking off our shoes isn't our first response to hurt feelings? When will reconciliation become our personal and spiritual 1<sup>st</sup> priority? When will saying I'm sorry become genuinely as easy as breathing, and humility becomes a badge of honor we all strive for?

Don't worry, I'm not quite there yet either . . . but I am really working on it, because all Believers will one day come to a crossroad where desiring to please God becomes more important than being right and having your way. Imagine if we took all the negative energy hurt feelings create and turned it into a passion and commitment to stay unified no matter what - just imagine all that we could accomplish . . . imagine the benefit we together could create within our families, our church and our community!

So during this Holiday Season and New Year beginnings, let us all strive to be better and do better by each other and instead of knocking a sister's crown to the ground, be the sister that straightens it instead, and let's all work together so God's desire for unity becomes our priority as well as our combined norm.

### "You Are Never Alone"

"Keep your lives free from the love of money and be content with what you have, because God has said, "Never will I leave you; never will I forsake you." Hebrews 13:5

A common issue many people face is a feeling of loneliness. Whether they are physically isolated or socially isolated, many find themselves in a pit of deep despair. I too, have experienced this in a very real and raw way. Grinding through life, wrestling with difficult circumstances, and wondering if I was the only one struggling. Unfortunately, many times when we find ourselves in these circumstances we begin to believe the lie that God is not a loving God if he allows us to go down these lonely roads. Do not fall into this trap. Christ's gift to us at Calvary paid the price for our sins, but did not guarantee us a pain-free or worry-free life. We often face challenges that are meant to draw us closer to him or help others through similar experiences. If you are experiencing loneliness, try to appreciate the lonely path Christ walked to pay the ultimate price for your deliverance, and attempt to discover the many ways you can comfort others in their time of need, which ultimately brings glory to God.

One of the most beautiful and impactful fictional illustrations of God's presence never leaving us is portrayed in episode 2 of season 2 of the television drama "Chosen". (The Chosen is a television drama based on the life of Jesus of Nazareth and is the highest grossing crowd-funded TV series or film project of all times.) In this episode, Nathaniel is introduced as an architect who designs buildings; but after a project he is developing collapses and severely injures several workers, his dreams are shattered, and he feels abandoned, let down, and all alone. Eventually, he finds himself sitting all alone under a fig tree and in a moment of desperation sets fire to his architectural plans representing his life's work and cries out to God, pleading for help (Psalm 145:18). At the end of the episode, Philip introduces Nathaniel to Jesus who says, "I was there with you under the fig tree. I saw your face." It is a climactic moment in the episode as Nathaniel immediately recognizes that he is in the presence of the Messiah. It is a reminder that Jesus is always with us, even at our weakest and loneliest moments, reassuring us that "he will never leave us or forsake us."



Almighty God, thank you for granting us the courage to trust you in our times of loneliness. Give us the strength and confidence to know that you will never leave us. Fill us with your presence, teach us from your loving Word and let us live lives that bring glory to you, so that we too can comfort others in need. Amen.

Whenever you feel lonely, alone, or in need, remember that God himself lives in you by his Spirit and is offering you all the comfort, companionship, strength, and faith you need to persevere.

### Toasted Pecan Snowballs

O Prep Time: 45 minutes
O Cook Time: 15 minutes
Total Time: 1 hour
Yield: 36 cookies

# Ingredients

- 1 cup (230g) unsalted butter, softened to room temperature
- 2 cups (240g) confectioners' sugar, divided
- 2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract\*
- 2 and 1/4 cups (281g) all-purpose flour (spoon & leveled)
- 1 cup (125g) finely chopped and toasted **pecans**\*
- optional: 2/3 cup (127g) sprinkles



### Instructions

- 1. In a large bowl using a hand-held mixer or stand mixer fitted with a paddle attachment, beat the butter for 1 minute on medium speed until completely smooth and creamy. Add 3/4 cup confectioners' sugar and beat on medium high speed until combined and creamy-looking. Scrape down the sides and bottom of the bowl as needed. Next, beat in the vanilla extract on medium-high speed until combined. Switch to low speed and slowly add the flour. The dough will look dry and you may not think the flour will fully combine. Once all of the flour is added, turn the mixer up to high speed. The dough will come together. Finally, beat in the pecans. At this point, you can beat in the sprinkles as well.
- Cover the cookie dough tightly and chill in the refrigerator for at least 30 minutes and up to 3 days. (If chilling for 3+ hours, make sure you let the cookie dough sit at room temperature for at least 30 minutes before rolling into balls. The cookie dough will be very stiff after being in the fridge that long.)
- 3. Preheat oven to 350°F (177°C). Line 2 large baking sheets with parchment paper or silicone baking mats. (<u>Always</u> recommended for cookies.) Set aside. Pour the remaining confectioners' sugar into a shallow bowl.
- 4. Scoop or roll 1 Tablespoon of cookie dough per cookie. Roll into a ball and place on the baking sheets, at least 2 inches apart. Bake the cookies until golden brown on the bottom edges and just barely browned on top, about 15 minutes.
- 5. Allow the cookies to cool for 5 minutes on the baking sheet, then very gently roll them in the confectioners' sugar to coat completely. Place the cookies on wire racks to cool completely. Once completely cooled, roll in confectioners' sugar again. This is when the sugar will really stick!
