Thank you for your patience. The new update went online this morning and I am now trying to catch up on everything I neglected while I was working on it. That brings me to the brief statement you asked me for. So here it is.

"Considering my background and my history with the Shroud, the obvious answer, at least in my eyes, is the image. It was the unique properties of the image that caused me to join the STURP team when I was first asked in 1976. Initially, I said no, but the image properties got my attention and I ultimately joined. I understood from the beginning that one could not produce an image with those specific properties using art or photography, so my scientific curiosity got the best of me. Remember too, I am Jewish, so I had no particular emotional attachment to the subject matter. In fact, it was my reluctance to participate in a "religious" project that first prompted my negative reply, but I quickly found the STURP team members to be serious scientists who were truly empirical and not driven by any agenda. In the end, we have to face the fact that no one would have *any* interest at all in the Shroud of Turin if it DIDN'T bear that image. Otherwise, we wouldn't be having this conversation. Final answer: the image!"
