

# 2020 -- Peace and Goodwill

A year from now we will have "2020 hindsight." What will be said about the year we are now entering?

Looking back, one economist says, we have just lived through a decade of the greatest



improvement in human living standards in history. Extreme poverty has fallen below 10% for the first time. Global inequality has been plunging with the economic growth of Asia and Africa. Child mortality has fallen to record low numbers; famine virtually went extinct; malaria, polio, and heart disease are all in decline.

So, as we start this year why doesn't it feel like it? Why does it seem we are angry at one another? Why the blaming of some terrible "they" who are winning at "our" expense?

Several trends have been listed as potential factors to the problem. One is technology. Technological progress has been a source of unease and resentment since the printing press sparked the Reformation. To many the present pace of change feels like more than we are meant to process.

Second, the statistical decline of participation in organized religion. Religion has been an important part of our society. Yet, historically religion hasn't always been a

source of social unity and peace.

Third, is the plight of increasingly skeptical young people. It has been suggested children have been raised to be more fragile and less tolerant of ideas that are not liked, or seen as threatening. Still, complaining about "these kids today" has been a historical pastime. Furthermore, studies show the angriest and most divisive people today have not been the youngsters.

The trends are seen as part of a broader failure of traditional institutions -politics, culture, family -- that have always given people a sense of meaning and
belonging. People want to be a part of something larger than themselves. Today, to
provide this sense of identity, many are seeking ideologies that have proven to be
divisive.

We seem to live in a society claiming powerlessness and victimhood. Not really knowing what is wanted beyond "not this." There is a message of outrage, but little accepting of responsibility.

What is necessary is to do the work. This begins with telling people what they need to hear, not just what they want to hear.

When we look back we may recognize how we have learned, gained new understanding, grown, made progress, and moved forward.

Of course, there is bad news. Unfortunately, we tend to focus on those bad things that fall outside the ordinary. The good news, experienced over the last decade, is that the new ordinary is pretty good.

# The Value of Adult Education Ministry

Thousands of people are requesting a place in one of our state's adult education programs (GED and English language instruction), but funding



hasn't moved in 21 years. The result has been long waiting lists and lost opportunities.

Adult education programs include students who have dropped out of school for financial reasons, often to prevent homelessness. Others, to care for an ill family member, to face an unplanned pregnancy, or many other factors. Returning to school after years away requires determination. Students must often balance study with duties as parents and demands of employers.

Leaders in adult education say programs are vital in raising the state's lagging education levels. More than 500,000 people in Arizona over the age of 25 don't have

a high school diploma. For people age 25-34, Arizona ranks 40th in the nation for people with bachelor's degrees or higher. These programs provide for many future financial benefits and can help lead students down a pathway to higher education.


# **Ladies Quilting Ministry**

Watch for a new winter season to begin in early 2020. Games are played at the Paul Mason Sportsplex on Pinal Ave in Casa Grande.



Manna Bags generally include the following items:



# "Good Gifts" Ministry

Malawi is a landlocked country in southeast Africa that was formerly known as Nyasaland. The topography of the country is defined by highlands split by the Great Rift Valley and enormous Lake Malawi, which takes up about one-third of Malawi's area.

The population of Malawi is estimated at a little over 18 million. This estimate takes into account a lower life expectancy, and higher infant deaths, due to AIDS.

Malawi is among the world's least-developed countries. The economy is heavily based on agriculture, with a largely rural population. The government depends on outside aid to meet development needs. There are challenges in building and expanding the economy, improving education, healthcare, environmental protection, and becoming financially independent amidst widespread overpopulation and unemployment.

Our congregational campaign raised \$8,783, which has been increased to \$10,000 by the church council. These funds will allow us to partner with the Malawi Health and Wellness program. Through the direction of the Lutheran Church of Malawi our funds will be used to provide access to clean water, sanitation, livestock, farm equipment, fruit trees, medical supplies and medicines, school materials, and mosquito netting.

This is a specific breakdown of expenses:

- 2 simple water wells
- 4 latrines
- 1 fish farm
- 1 fruit tree nursery
- 4 women attending farming school
- 20 sets of farm tools
- 4 piglets
- 10 chicks

- 5 roosters
- 2 pair of goats
- 4 colonies of honey bees
- 1 month of medical supplies
- 1 classroom of school supplies
- 1 community of mosquito netting.
