My God is Yahweh

The ancient people of Israel understood that a name expressed the essence or identity of a person. In the biblical world, a good name meant more than a good reputation because it identified the character of the person carrying it. The book of Proverbs states, "A good name is to be chosen rather than great riches" (22:1).



For the people of Israel a name identified something about the person's character or circumstances. Isaac - "he laughs" - described the response of Sarah, his mother, when she learned she would have a child late in life. Mary was told by the angel to name her baby Jesus - "to save" or "savior" - because "he will save his people from their sins" (Mt 1:21).

When a name was given it also implied an understanding of one's function. When God said, "I know you by name" (Ex 33:17), it meant more than God recognized an individual. It showed God knew his people and what the role of his people would be.

Furthermore, to name someone meant to have authority over the one named. This aspect of the process proves significant when it comes to knowing and using God's name. God gave himself the name of YHWH (in Hebrew pronounced Yahweh) in Exodus (3:13), probably meaning "he creates" or "I am (that I am)." This emphasized God did not depend on anything for his existence and God is the ultimate source of everything.

God's name could only be used of him and for him. The biblical characters whose names were given by God or included reference to God (biblical names ending in -iah or -jah include part of God's name) point to the active presence of God. So, to use God's name meant understanding and knowing something of God's agenda and purpose.

With the name Yahweh, we recognize only God is able to understand and describe himself. We are dependent upon God's revelation of his nature to understand him. Every aspect of our life and character speak of the living God, so that the world may know that God alone is our God.

9-Hole Golf Scramble

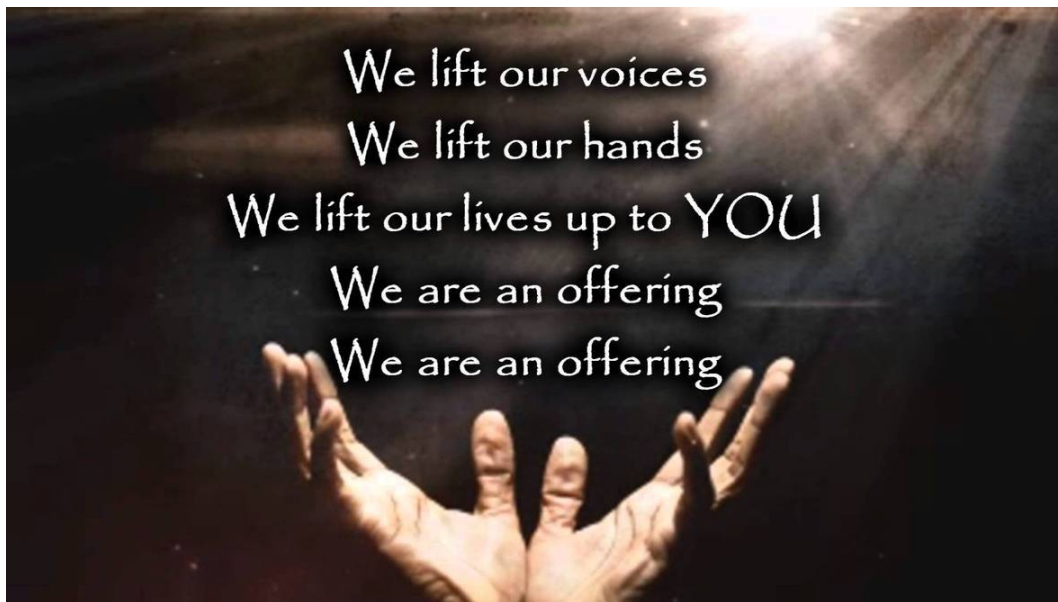
The next event is Saturday, February 22nd at 1 p.m. at the Mission Royale Golf Course in Casa Grande.

You can pick up Manna Bags to carry in your car to be shared with someone in need that you may meet in the course of your day.

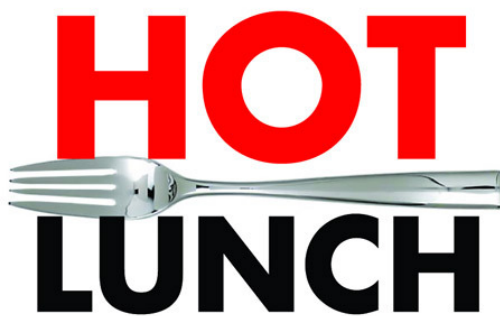
Manna Bags generally include the following items:

"Good Gifts" Ministry

Malawi is a landlocked country in southeast Africa that was formerly known as Nyasaland. The topography of the country is defined by highlands split by the Great Rift Valley and enormous Lake Malawi, which takes up about one-third of Malawi's area.

The population of Malawi is estimated at a little over 18 million. This estimate takes into account a lower life expectancy, and higher infant deaths, due to AIDS.

Malawi is among the world's least-developed countries. The economy is heavily based on agriculture, with a largely rural population. The government depends on outside aid to meet development needs. There are challenges in building and expanding the economy, improving education, healthcare, environmental

protection, and becoming financially independent amidst widespread overpopulation and unemployment.

Our congregational campaign raised \$8,783, which has been increased to \$10,000 by the church council. These funds will allow us to partner with the Malawi Health and Wellness program. Through the direction of the Lutheran Church of Malawi our funds will be used to provide access to clean water, sanitation, livestock, farm equipment, fruit trees, medical supplies and medicines, school materials, and mosquito netting.

This is a specific breakdown of expenses:

- 2 simple water wells
- 4 latrines
- 1 fish farm
- 1 fruit tree nursery
- 4 women attending farming school
- 20 sets of farm tools
- 4 piglets
- 10 chicks
- 5 roosters
- 2 pair of goats
- 4 colonies of honey bees
- 1 month of medical supplies
- 1 classroom of school supplies
- 1 community of mosquito netting.

On the second weekend of each month we continue to prayerfully consider the challenge to double our offering. Internship Fund

The \$20,848 of contributions received for the internship program have been invested in an ELCA Mission Investment Fund account. The council will continue to evaluate the possibility of participating in the internship program in the futures or applying to other staffing needs.

Special note: At the annual meeting in January, it was approved to use \$6,000 of the fund to support the work of our tutor for our GED program this year.

Casa Grande Land Fund

Our property “growth fund” has a balance of \$16,699 for the purchase of a permanent Casa Grande site. Discussion of future possibilities is ongoing.
