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Christianity and Patriotism

How is a Christian to respond to patriotism? How can a love of all people and a primary commitment to the kingdom of God stand with a love for country?

Patriotism can be defined simply as love of country. It's the kind of love that makes one thankful to be a citizen of a country. It's the feeling of gratitude for freedom, or democracy, or culture, or any of the values people around the world treasure in their nation.



Patriotism is not nationalism. Many people take love of country and expand it to mean love of country at the expense of other nations. It's when people believe they are better because they come from a particular place, or that others are less valuable because of their land of origin. Such exceptionalism means treasuring one's identity while minimizing others. It is saying, "My country is better than yours, and you are less civilized and enlightened because of where you are from."

Nationalism never stops to consider what one's nation could learn from others.

Paul writes about the need for the Jews to recognize the full participation of Gentiles in the kingdom of God. Their national and religious identity made it difficult to understand how a Greek, Ethiopian, or slave from Asia Minor could be just as much a part of God's new work. "Neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor

free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:28).

Jesus loved his people, his city, his nation so much he cried over it (Luke 19:41). He wanted nothing but the best for his country and it grieved him to see how his people had rejected his teachings. His example is a love for nation that doesn't pit one against another; instead, it's a recognition of love for one another followed by a mournful recognition of our shortcomings.

Jesus illustrates how to celebrate the times our nation does something great and a desire to make our country as good as it can be. We can mourn the times when our nation does something wrong. We recognize the need to temper our feelings when our country fails. Healthy patriotism lies in the ability to judge our nation in its successes and its shortcomings.

It is an important distinction that Christians' first love is the kingdom of God, over and above love of country. The Christian's primary allegiance is to God, which sometimes means the Christian patriot must disagree with the policy set by one's country. It means calling for the righting of wrongs and the upholding of equality, justice, tolerance and compassion. Christian responsibility defines our patriotism, even when it is difficult.

Jesus died for people of all nations. To the people of Israel, Jesus was betraying his own people by spreading the gospel to Gentiles. Jesus asks that we lay all of our loves at his feet so that we may grant him the first fruits of our love. Love of God, love of our brothers and sisters everywhere.

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Statement on Children in Detention

The bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church (ELCA) has joined ecumenical and interreligious partners in a statement addressing concerns over the well-being of children who cross the U.S. border seeking safety



from the threats in their home countries.


In part the statement says, "As U.S. religious leaders representing diverse faith perspectives, we are united in our concern for the well-bring of vulnerable migrants who cross our borders fleeing from danger and threats to their lives."

"Sadly, as a nation we have denied them safety, instead placing them in detention facilities. Many detention centers are overcrowded and lack sanitation, further elevating the risk of serious health issues for migrants already stressed and weakened by their journeys."

"We believe our nation and its leaders have both the moral and legal responsibility on behalf of those who seek safety in our land. The U.S. has an international legal obligation to do so having acceded to the 1967 Protocol Relating to the Status of Refugees, therefore, must implement those duties in good faith. It also has an obligation to do so under its own domestic law and should not attempt to set aside these legal responsibilities. The duty not to return a person to a state where they may face torture or other serious harm is absolute under the United Nations Convention Against Torture, which the U.S. has signed and ratified."

"We urge the administration to maintain its commitment to international law and defend human rights by implementing safeguards to ensure the safety and health of all of those seeking protection in our land, especially children who fall under our care."

The statement was signed by 23 Christian, Jewish and Islamic partners in the United States.

However, the program isn't
just a numbers game. Each

passed test means program participants are moving closer to achieving their personal goals. This month, this Adult Education report will feature one of the participants, so you can learn more about how this ministry impacts lives and empowers them to succeed.

Julio enrolled in the GED tutoring program in 2015. He worked at a dairy farm to support his wife and four school-aged children. His dedication was evident as he came for tutoring two and three times a week for almost 18 months. He

progressed steadily through his test preparation studies with the help of volunteer tutors until he eventually earned his GED in May of 2017.

Since most employers require a high school diploma or equivalent, Julio's GED certificate was the key he needed to open doors to opportunity. He set his sights on getting a job in auto repair and immediately landed a job as a part-time mechanic's assistant at Pep Boys. Julio worked at both his part-time and dairy farm job for over a year, hoping to learn enough about auto repair to advance to a mechanic and earn enough to move his family from their small trailer to a larger manufactured home.

Last month, Julio dropped by to announce that he had just accepted a new job as an auto mechanic in a local auto repair shop. If that wasn't exciting enough, he also shared the happy news that he was recently approved for a mortgage and would soon be moving his family to a larger home. Way to go, Julio!

two 16.9 oz water bottles, packaged tuna, sausage, crackers (plain, with cheese or peanut butter), energy bars,




PayDay candy bars, fruit cups, hand wipes, plastic forks and spoons, in a gallon plastic bag.

"Good Gifts" Ministry

Malawi is a landlocked country in southeast Africa that was formerly known as Nyasaland. The topography of the country is defined by highlands split by the Great Rift Valley and enormous Lake Malawi, which takes up about one-third of Malawi's area.

The population of Malawi is estimated at a little over 18 million. This estimate takes into account a lower life expectancy, and higher infant deaths, due to AIDS.

Malawi is among the world's least-developed countries. The economy is heavily based on agriculture, with a largely rural population. The government depends on outside aid to meet development needs. There are challenges in building and expanding the economy, improving education, healthcare, environmental protection, and becoming financially independent amidst widespread overpopulation and unemployment.

Our congregational campaign raised \$8,783, which has been increased to \$10,000 by the church council. These funds will allow us to partner with the Malawi Health and Wellness program. Through the direction of the Lutheran Church of Malawi our funds will be used to provide access to clean water, sanitation, livestock, farm equipment, fruit trees, medical supplies and medicines, school materials, and mosquito netting.

This is a specific breakdown of expenses:

- 2 simple water wells
- 4 latrines
- 1 fish farm
- 1 fruit tree nursery
- 4 women attending farming school
- 20 sets of farm tools
- 4 piglets
- 10 chicks
- 5 roosters
- 2 pair of goats
- 4 colonies of honey bees
- 1 month of medical supplies
- 1 classroom of school supplies
- 1 community of mosquito netting.

Internship Fund
