Lamb of God

Many descriptions of Jesus have been written over the years. The exact nature of his messianic work and the kingdom he came to establish was a matter of great debate during his ministry. Never did Jesus proclaim his messianic identity more clearly or display the method he would use to bring his kingdom more pointedly than in his triumphal entry into Jerusalem.



Jesus walked from Galilee to Jericho, then arrived at the outskirts of Jerusalem at Bethany. He waited until the next day to continue his journey walking halfway to Jerusalem stopping at Bethphage. Then he rode on a donkey down the Mount of Olives and into the city. That event, Jesus' triumphal entry, stirred the people of Jerusalem and has moved Christians ever since. It is one of the most well-known events of the gospels.

Against this backdrop, Jesus taught about the way he would carry out his mission to bring God's kingdom. He intentionally went to Jerusalem to face the cross. The disciples did not want to hear about suffering and death, and did not understand. Nothing could dissuade Jesus from completing his divine mission and from equipping his disciples to spread the message. For God planned carefully when he carried out his great work of salvation. Nothing was left to chance. Jesus came to Jerusalem from the east, riding on a donkey, just as the prophets had predicted. Jesus entered Jerusalem at the time the Passover lamb was chosen. On Palm Sunday, he proclaimed himself Messiah by coming from the east and riding a donkey into the city. But his true kingship would be as God's lamb, our Passover lamb.

When Jesus came to Jerusalem, the people believed the solution to all their problems was freedom from the Romans and their collaborators. Although Jesus stands for freedom, it was not the national and political freedom the Jews sought. They misidentified their deepest need, people who were broken by sin and in desperate need for forgiveness and healing. They misunderstood Jesus when he proclaimed that he was the Messiah. Jesus is the lamb of God who brings salvation by taking away the sin of the world.



Why Did Jesus Die?

A Grand Jury Investigation into the Trial and Execution of Jesus of Nazareth April 17th at 6 p.m. Arizona City

What really motivated the main characters during the events surrounding Jesus' death? Six biblical characters come to life in new and revealing ways as they take the witness stand in a contemporary grand jury inquiry into the meaning of Jesus' death. While attempting to explain their thoughts and actions, Judas, Caiaphas, Herod, Pilate, Mary Magdelene, and

Peter face questioning by a state's attorney. The members of the grand jury (the audience) are challenged to determine the true significance of the crucifixion. The resulting testimony points out Jesus' innocence and our sinful guilt.

The drama written by Pastor Bob Kleinke, began with a confirmation student's question, "Why did Jesus have to die?" The questioning of each character makes the character come alive while still being true to the biblical witness.

"Good Gifts" Ministry

Malawi is a landlocked country in southeast Africa that was formerly



known as Nyasaland. The topography of the country is defined by highlands split by the Great Rift Valley and enormous Lake Malawi, which takes up about one-third of Malawi's area.

The population of Malawi is estimated at a little over 18 million. This estimate takes into account a lower life expectancy, and higher infant deaths, due to AIDS.

Malawi is among the world's leastdeveloped countries. The economy is heavily based on agriculture, with a

largely rural population. The government depends on outside aid to meet development needs. There are challenges in building and expanding the economy, improving education, healthcare, environmental protection, and becoming financially independent amidst widespread overpopulation and unemployment.

Our congregational campaign raised \$8,783, which has been increased to \$10,000 by the church council. These funds will allow us to partner with the Malawi Health and Wellness program. Through the direction of the Lutheran Church of Malawi our funds will be used to provide access to clean water, sanitation, livestock, farm equipment, fruit trees, medical supplies and medicines, school materials, and mosquito netting.

This is a specific breakdown of expenses: 2 simple water wells 4 latrines 1 fish farm 1 fruit tree nursery 4 women attending farming school 20 sets of farm tools 4 piglets 10 chicks 5 roosters 2 pair of goats 4 colonies of honey bees 1 month of medical supplies 1 classroom of school supplies 1 community of mosquito netting.
