Again, thank you for your love and prayers.

Please pray that the Lord will be honored in the training of the students at Frontier for life and ministry. We are so blessed to have these students here. Pray for us as faculty and staff that we will teach the Word of God and model the love of Christ in the power of the Holy Spirit.

This semester I am teaching Theology 4 (on Prophecy), Pastoral Theology 2 (Assisted by Ron Thompson), and I will be teaching 2 Peter after our regular Instructor on the Epistles of Peter completes 1 Peter. The teaching of 2 Peter will not be until April. Also, I will be assisting in Homiletics (Preaching Classes) 1 & 3. I am scheduled to teach the Lecture Series on 1 Corinthians. When I do the lectures, I will have the whole student body, Monday through Friday for three - 1 hour sessions each day.

Also, I am excited to report that I have passed the baton of the role of Academic Dean to Josh Elliott. Many of you know Josh as 12 to 13 years ago he was our Intern at Grace Bible of Parachute. He was such a blessing then and continues to be to us. He pastored Snyder Bible Church for 11 years and came on staff here this summer. We are blessed to have him and I have no doubt about his capability. He loves our Lord so much. This also means my load is lightened. But pray for Josh in this added role for him.

My Oncologist in Cheyenne and the one in Denver have been consulting together on my case. They have expressed concern that the side effects I am having from the radiation (continued pain in the groin area and the rectal and bladder spasms) are indicators that the cancer may have invaded my lymph glands and lymph system. This is their concern even though it has not shown up in previous tests. The biopsy of the lymph gland they removed in surgery was deformed but not cancerous. They cannot be sure, however, and will not be able to test that for several weeks after the radiation treatments are over. The good news is the radiation that they are giving me now would be the same. They considered this possibility when they set up the radiation to begin with. However, it is more of the hurry up and wait syndrome and/or the good news/tough news that has been a part of our lives for the past year and a half now. Thank you for your patience with us. We vowed at the beginning to keep you informed with the news as we are receiving it.

Pray for Sue, What a trooper! But recently she has been very tired. She has her girls prayer group on Wednesdays at our home and she continues to assist however she can with Tentmakers Bible Mission.

Our goal for this year is to serve the Lord with focus, faith, and fervor - more than ever before. What an opportunity the Lord has set before us. While there are many challenges He always proves His grace is sufficient. Let us know how we can pray for you! Again you are such a joy to us!
