# Highlights &

### A Note from the Pastor February 2022

Last year in the February Newsletter I wrote: "In the past 2 plus years this building has become important to me. It is important because it is one of the most beautiful and historic buildings in the town and the county. It is a building that represents a congregation that dates back to the beginning of Rockville. According to what I have read, less than one year after the town was founded a group of people met to form a Methodist congregation. It is the second brick building to be built in Parke County. Only the Lusk home was built earlier. Our architect advised us that most likely, the bricks were made and baked in ovens on the site of the church. The beauty of the window that shines on the community every night witnessing to the presence of Christ and His invitation has a glory that can only come from God. The towers and the balcony bear witness to the history of faithful people that have met in the Methodist tradition for 200 years.

The building is also important because of what it represents to the community. This is a House of God. What people see when they drive or walk past is a witness to our faith and beliefs. By that, I don't mean they read the name on the sign and identify our denomination. I mean that what they see represents the US and what WE think about God. This building is a testament to others about how we esteem God. Is He important enough that we make this building seem as though He lives here? We tell people He does, but does it look like we believe He does? When people see a church building in need of repair they think the congregation is dying and can't afford the building or the congregation is not really committed to their witness. How can God be good and take care of us when He can't take care of His place of worship? We need to show people this IS God's house, He lives here, and we honor him with this building.

Finally, this building is important to me because it is where you are. It is where ministry has happened for over 100 years through a congregation that has gathered in ministry for 200 years. For you that have been part of this congregation for more than a short time this building is home. It is where we gather as sisters and brothers in our Father's house. It is full of memories, births and funerals, baptisms, weddings, and fellowship. It is where we sing, pray, learn, smile and even shed tears together. We worship and are touched by God, lifted by the Spirit, and molded into the image of Christ. This building is special and we want to make it special for those who follow. It is important that ministry continues, and lives are changed. It is important that people find forgiveness and grace, experience fellowship and acceptance, feel the love of God and His people in this place.

#### A Note from the Pastor Continued

In the year that has passed God has shown that He is at work in our church, our congregation, and this building. We have done so much since last year. No longer are we afraid a piece of the building will fall on someone. We no longer have to look at the walls and wonder how much more damage will be done by water infiltrating from the exterior. Every time we get a big rain, I no longer worry will this be the one in which the roof starts to leak because of the loss of the more than 100 shingles missing due to the shape of our roof following the wind storms. We are no longer concerned the chimney may fall and be in the Sanctuary when we gather for worship, or worse, fall while we are in worship. Eight large, unsealed openings have been bricked up (so well, I would challenge you to find them) and the church is immediately gaining the benefit of reduced utility costs and a more comfortable Fellowship Hall and open areas.

As you can see in the pictures that are included in this newsletter, the basement is undergoing major updating. The carpet that was not only looking terrible, was also a trip hazard. Someone who attended here years ago came back for a funeral and slipped downstairs to reminisce. They came back up and asked one of the ladies serving the funeral dinner, "What happened to the basement? It looks terrible." I wish that person could see it now, and in the months to come, as three families have taken it upon themselves to clean up, spruce up, and make the hallway, restrooms, and one of the classrooms beautiful again. These families have done these projects on their own in addition to the work the church is completing.

I have heard many comments as I move around town in my normal day to day activities about the work at the church, especially the ramp being constructed. Other people of town are excited to see the work going on. There is much more to be done. I am excited about what God will do for us and with us this year. As I wrote a year ago, When people see a church building in need of repair they think, How can God be good and take care of us when He can't take care of His place of worship? We need to show people this IS God's house, He lives here, and we honor him with this building. This year has been a demonstration to all that God is alive and active in our congregation. This beautiful, historical building is a testimony that WE have been serving, worshiping, and loving in the Name of Christ and we will continue to do so for another 200 years! We are proving He lives here and we are honoring Him with this beautiful building.

By the way, this is February-the Month of Love. 1 Corinthians 13 says, "Three things will remain, Faith, Hope, and Love. And the greatest of these is Love." We generally think of the February love as a romantic one centered on Valentine's Day. That is a wonderful form of love. But what is greater is the love of 1 Corinthians 13 which is Agape love. It is not a love of emotion, but a love of the mind. Agape love is making a decision to love someone unconditionally, no matter who they are, or what they have done. It is the love that reminds us of the line from our communion service that is a quote of Romans 5:8, "God proves His love for us that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us." What a wonderful love. What a great example for us to follow. February, and every other month for that matter, should be a month of love. Not just an emotional love, but the agape love that demonstrates to someone they matter, God loves them and so do we.

Love you all, Love being your Pastor, Love seeing the work God is doing with you and through you!



# Rockville First United Methodist Church Administrative Council Minutes January 18, 2022

### Council Business

Rob Belcher opened the meeting with prayer.

The December minutes were approved.

### **OLD BUSINESS:**

Handicap Ramp update: Progressing well.

Mark Downing gave an estimate of \$3500 for plastering in the sanctuary and towers, also the foyer. Mark will be starting in approximately 3 weeks. Before this work begins, the heater/radiators will need to be removed.

Classroom project is making progress. Michael Esh has given a bid for the resurfacing the floor of \$8100 for the classroom floor and \$10,000 for the rest of the basement. Michael will be starting soon. Mary Evens has removed the registers from the fireplace classroom, bathrooms, hallway and beside the janitor's closet in the basement.

State Farm has sent the reimbursement check of \$5200 for the roof.

The new proposed door at the bottom of the stairs: It was suggested to install a buzzer/doorbell when installing the new security doors. The doors will remain locked when the downstairs is occupied. The buzzer/doorbell will alert persons downstairs that someone wants to enter.

Hickory Rehabilitation Center reached out to us with a need of stocking caps. We purchased the caps at Ace Hardware who allowed a 20% discount. The hats have been delivered.

#### **NEW BUSINESS:**

There are a few Administrative Council seats that need to be filled for 2022 –Women's Rep and Men's Rep still need to be filled.

It was discussed if the church should go virtual with the status of the County being completely red. It was decided not to close the church unless absolutely necessary. You may wear a mask if you desire. Please stay home if you are not feeling well. We will make sure the hand sanitizers stands are full.

<u>Pastor's Report:</u> Keys to the snowblower has been placed in the key box in the office along with keys to the lock on the snowblower. Russ Hall has been shown how to start snowblower.

Pastor Jon is working on "Check Day", the year end report for the Church.

<u>Trustee's Report</u>: There is a leak under the window in Chapel that will need to be addressed before painting can begin. Layton's checked the A/C – heaters units in the basement. The unit in the fireplace room needs the circuit board replaced.

Steve with SHP Electronics looked into and made repairs to the problems we were having with the sound system.

### **Staff Parish Relations Report:**

Pastor Jon & Gale along with Stacey Bettis took the youth on a bus trip to Christmas Town. Approximately 8 youth attended. The bus ran fine. New plates have been installed on the bus. The bus needs to be driven once a week.

Pastor/Parish training will be coming up soon. Pastor Jon and Carol Keller will be attending.




