

What it Means to Live as the People of God

2 Corinthians 6:11-18 April 3, 2022

<u>The Big Idea</u>: Through his own example and in his teaching, Paul calls us to live as God's people in a fallen world. This echoes Jesus' directive that His disciples are to be "in the world but not of the world." [John 17:14-16] We are to generously love one another, seek to influence for Christ rather than be influenced by the world, and always remember that God lives in us through Christ.

2 Corinthians 6:1-11 (ESV)

6 ¹¹ We have <u>spoken freely</u> to you, Corinthians; <u>our heart is wide</u> <u>open</u>. ¹² You are not restricted by us, but you are restricted in your own affections. ¹³ In return (I speak as to children) widen your hearts also.

14 Do not be unequally yoked with unbelievers. For what partnership has <u>righteousness with lawlessness</u>? Or what fellowship has <u>light with darkness</u>? ¹⁵ What accord has <u>Christ with Belial</u>? Or what portion does <u>a believer share with an unbeliever</u>? ¹⁶ What agreement has <u>the temple of God with idols</u>? For we are the temple of the living God; as God said,

- "I will make my dwelling among them and walk among them, and I will be their God, and they shall be my people.
- Therefore go out from their midst, and be separate from them, says the Lord, and touch no unclean thing; then I will welcome you,
- and I will be a father to you, and you shall be sons and daughters to me, says the Lord Almighty."

3 Questions I Need to Ask Myself About My Relationships With Unbelievers:

- o "When I am with these non-believers, do I find myself in situations where I am dangerously exposed to temptation that may get the better of me?"
- o "When I am with non-Christians, do I find it easier than at other times to compromise on ethical matters? Do I find myself judging as 'grey' what I would call 'black' if I were with Christians?"
- o "Does my association with non-Christians tend to make me less vocal about my faith or less visible in my stand for Christ?"

<u>Please Note</u>: The answer is not always to withdraw from the relationship. It might be that the Lord simply wants me to be <u>stronger</u> in my witness and walk with these unbelieving friends. Or, there might need to be an adjustment to the time or setting of my interactions with them.

Timeless Truths:

- 1. Jesus never calls His disciples to a life of isolation and monastic living with only Christians around us.
- 2. Whatever the context of the Church's and the Christian's relationship with unbelievers, the question should always be:

 Who is influencing whom?
- 3. We ought not project the 'unequally yoked' principle onto issues of personal preference where there is no moral or spiritual issue at stake.
- 4. To be 'unequally yoked' means you are in a substantial relationship that, by definition, is difficult to dissolve.
- 5. To be 'unequally yoked' means you are in a substantial relationship that, by definition, restricts your freedom of movement. Is the direction of your movement in this relationship pleasing and glorifying to God?
