Every other week we attend a school Bible club in the city of One Man Village. While on our way to the school, we ran into some "agberos." Agberos are roadside tax collectors that are supposed to pull over commercial vehicles, but they take advantage of anyone they think they can pull over. Agberos pulled us over once and we settled the situation to let us continue driving. After our first encounter, we ran into some more agberos but this time I kept on driving. Somehow, one of them pulled off our license plate. We managed to get our license plate back with the help of a friend who has close ties with the police. We were very thankful God took care of us in retrieving our license plate and the friends God has blessed us with here. God has always proven Himself faithful. I am continuing how to "drive" in Nigeria, which includes how to aggressively respond to people who want to stop and extort Americans:)

A while back, I posted a short video on Facebook of what a fuel crisis looks like here in Nigeria. Nigeria has been suffering through a fuel shortage for about two months. It is very difficult for people here during a fuel shortage because many cannot work or find transport, and all of the prices go up. Sometimes it will get so bad that there will be fights over fuel. There were multiple times when we thought it was over and getting better, but somehow the next day the lines for fuel went right back to being a 6 hour wait. Now after the many weeks of the fuel shortage, it looks like things are back to normal again. God supplied our needs during the fuel shortage and we are very thankful.

Thank you to our supporters and prayer warriors. We feel your prayers here in Nigeria and look
