2 Corinthians 8:9-15 May 8, 2022

<u>The Big Idea</u>: The most important and powerful force for transforming our self-centered lives is God's Grace. The fullest expression of Grace is in the coming of the Son of God to us. In the salvation Jesus brings, He makes us compassionate, loving, and generous towards others.

2 Corinthians 8:9-15 (ESV)

10 And in this matter I give my judgment: this benefits you, who a year ago started not only to do this work but also to desire to do it.

11 So now finish doing it as well, so that your readiness in desiring it may be matched by your completing it out of what you have.

12 For if the readiness is there, it is acceptable according to what a person has, not according to what he does not have.

13 For I do not mean that others should be eased and you burdened, but that as a matter of fairness

14 your abundance at the present time should supply their need, so that their abundance may supply your need, that there may be fairness.

15 As it is written, "Whoever gathered little had no lack."



The Coming of Jesus and Our Giving:

- The supreme and ultimate example of generosity is in the coming of God's Son to us.
- 2. Good beginnings in our commitments can be celebrated, but the real test of our hearts will be in finishing what we start.
- 3. God will never hold you responsible for what you do not have, but He does hold us accountable for what we do with what we do have.

- 5. One day, the roles may be reversed and we will stand in need of people who know God's grace in Jesus and will joyfully, willingly turn their generous hearts in our direction.
- 6. God's assurance to us is that He will supply our needs. His provision is to be used and never hoarded.
