## **Answers to Sermon Notes**

Life Action Redux/Warm Up #4: "Forgiveness" Matthew 18:21-35 5/15/22

- 1. What do you **know** about forgiveness, and where did you **learn** it?
  - a. In some ways the <u>entire</u> Christian <u>life</u> boils down to this question.
  - **b.** Yet so many walk around with <u>notions</u> about forgiveness that just <u>aren't so</u>.
  - c. And the destructive consequences of this, both for <u>now</u> and for <u>eternity</u>, are enormous.
- 2. So, today we turn our attention to the word of God here in Matthew 18 as <u>Jesus</u> seeks to set Peter <u>straight</u> (and all of us) about this all-important topic.
- 3. There six important things about forgiveness here that we need to look at.
  - a. Forgiveness is not <u>public</u> and general but rather <u>personal</u> and specific. (vs. 21)
    - i. It is about <u>my</u> brother and <u>me</u>.
    - ii. And it is about a specific <u>sin</u>.
    - iii. <u>No one else</u> can forgive your brother but you.
    - iv. You can forgive <u>no one else</u> but your brother.
    - v. Though others are <u>affected</u> and can share their concern and seek to help (vs. 31), you alone have the <u>power</u> to forgive that brother for his specific sin against you.
    - vi. Forgiveness must be employed <u>directly</u>.
    - **b.** Forgiveness is not <u>reconciliation</u> but rather the desire for it. (vs. 15-20)
      - i. The simple fact that reconciliation has not been **<u>achieved</u>** does not mean that forgiveness has not been **<u>employed</u>**.
      - ii. The entire process of vs. 15-20 is designed to restore *relationship*.
      - iii. However, relationship cannot be restored with just a *heart* of *forgiveness*.
      - iv. It also requires the **repentance** of the only one who can express it.
      - v. Even when forgiveness is employed, **broken** relationship may occur.
  - c. Forgiveness is not a <u>duty</u> but rather a <u>desire</u>. (vs. 21-22)
    - i. Jesus is not correcting Peter's **<u>number</u>**; he is correcting his **<u>attitude</u>**/motivation.
    - ii. It isn't about numbers or <u>limits</u>; it is about <u>reconciliation</u>. (Luke 17:3-4)
    - iii. This is the only way we can go from <u>score</u> keepers to <u>peacekeepers</u>. (Col. 3:12-13)
  - d. Forgiveness is not a matter of justice but rather of mercy.
    - i. Justice <u>demands</u> recompence. (vs. 28-30)
    - ii. Mercy <u>desires</u> restoration through repentance. (vs. 32-33)
    - iii. Though we may have a "just" claim against a brother, we do not take the path of "justice" in seeking to address it.
      - a. A <u>concern</u> for justice (that righteousness be done) is a good thing; a <u>demand</u> for justice (that recompence be paid) is not.
      - b. If you want to bring two parties together lead them in the pursuit of **mercy**; if you want to divide them lead them in the pursuit of **justice**.
  - e. Forgiveness is not <u>optional</u> but rather <u>essential</u>. (vs. 35)
    - i. For it reveals a heart that has learned forgiveness at the <u>throne</u> of <u>grace</u>. (vs. 32-34)

- ii. This servant went through the <u>motions</u> of having his debt forgiven but showed that he had not <u>learned</u> anything about forgiveness in the process.
  - a. This was already **<u>indicated</u>** in his crazy plea that if given a chance he could pay back **<u>everything</u>**. (\$10,000,000,000?) (vs. 26)
  - b. He obviously didn't really understand what he had been <u>forgiven</u>.
- iii. Anyone who has been forgiven the **massive** debt that we had with God could never demand the relatively small debt (\$15,000) others have had with us.
  - a. Though these debts are not **insignificant**, they simply do not **compare**.
- iv. Though hurt and scars may <u>remain</u>, only the path of forgiveness from the <u>heart</u> can begin to <u>heal</u> these. The path of justice cannot.
- v. Refusing to forgive, then, is not <u>understandable</u>; it is <u>wicked</u>. (vs. 32)
- vi. Is your primary identity "<u>forgiven</u>" or "<u>offended</u>"?
- **f.** Forgiveness is not <u>human</u> but rather <u>divine</u>. (vs. 35)
  - i. From a <u>human</u> perspective it is impossible.
  - ii. From a **<u>divine</u>** perspective it is not.
  - iii. <u>God</u> is the great forgiver.
  - iv. Allow his **<u>Spirit</u>** who lives in you to lead you through it.
    - a. The first stop will be the <u>cross</u>.
- 4. What do you **<u>know</u>** about forgiveness, and where did you <u>**learn**</u> it?
  - **a.** May each of us show in our true <u>desire</u> to forgive that we know all these things about forgiveness and that we learned them at the <u>cross</u>.
