

The Conclusion

Mark 4:33-34 (ESV)

With many such parables he spoke the word to them, as they were able to hear it. ³⁴He did not speak to them without a parable, but privately to his own disciples he explained everything.

One must come to Jesus as a disciple and listen carefully to receive explanations and a deeper understanding. Jesus uses parables to plumb the spiritual perception of the audience, because he knows that a Messiah who dies can only be perceived through a rare spiritual discernment. The message that Christ crucified conquers the world remains a scandalous and foolish riddle to those who are unable to hear the word with understanding and refuse to gather around Jesus as a disciple.³

Outcomes

- 1. These parables should instill confidence that overcomes despair.
- 2. These parables make the case that the seed's success does not depend on our feeble efforts.
- 3. The parables encourage patient faith.

that God would bless their work, not only in accordance with their level of effort (their standard of measure) but even far beyond (more will be given you besides). As they scatter the seed of the gospel, all believers work expectantly, knowing that their faithfulness to the task will be fruitful and abundantly rewarded in heaven (cf. Luke 6:38).

The Parable of the Seed Cast on the Earth

Mark 4:26-29 (ESV)

And he said, "The kingdom of God is as if a man should scatter seed on the ground. ²⁷He sleeps and rises night and day, and the seed sprouts and grows; he knows not how. ²⁸The earth produces by itself, first the blade, then the ear, then the full grain in the ear. ²⁹But when the grain is ripe, at once he puts in the sickle, because the harvest has come."

The point of this parable is simple: in the same way that the farmer is not the power behind the regeneration of the seed, so also the evangelist is not the power behind the regeneration of souls. The task of saving sinners does not rest on our shoulders.

The Parable of the Mustard Seed Mark 4:30–32 (ESV)

And he said, "With what can we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable shall we use for it? ³¹It is like a grain of mustard seed, which, when sown on the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth, ³²yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes larger than all the garden plants and puts out large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade."

A characteristic of fruitful hearers is that they proclaim the gospel with confidence. Because God is the one who blesses His Word and creates spiritual life, believers can fulfill their evangelistic calling with the certainty of knowing that they are part of an enterprise that cannot fail (cf. Matt. 16:18).

The parable of the mustard seed also anticipated the reality that the kingdom of God (a reference to the sphere of salvation) would bless the whole world. The mustard plant, fully grown, provided shelter to **the birds of the air** who **can nest under its shade.**²

In the church age, that blessing extends to the nations through the influence of Christians around the globe. When believers walk faithfully, they are a blessing to those around them. The corporate influence of the church has benefited the world in many ways: spiritually, economically, culturally, and morally.

Message

The Hiddenness of the Kingdom

Mark 4:21-34

Introduction

The parable of the soils emphasized the importance of being a fruitful hearer by distinguishing the good soil from the bad. In this passage (4:21–34), Jesus articulated three additional parables that expand on that theme. The Lord indicated that understanding the parable of the soils was key to understanding these later parables (v. 13).

The Parable of the Lamp

Mark 4:21-23 (ESV)

And he said to them, "Is a lamp brought in to be put under a basket, or under a bed, and not on a stand? ²²For nothing is hidden except to be made manifest; nor is anything secret except to come to light. ²³If anyone has ears to hear, let him hear."

The point of Jesus' analogy is clear: Those who have received the light of the gospel are not to conceal it; rather they are to let it shine for others to see.

How are you doing with getting your light out from under the bed and shining the gospel light?

The evangelistic mandate did not end with the apostles.

It began with them and has fallen on all believers, in every generation of church history.

The Parable of the Measure

Mark 4:24-25 (ESV)

And he said to them, "Pay attention to what you hear: with the measure you use, it will be measured to you, and still more will be added to you. ²⁵For to the one who has, more will be given, and from the one who has not, even what he has will be taken away."

With the measure you use, it will be measured to you; and more will be added to you."

At harvesttime, the farmer could expect to get back from his field only what he had put into it. He would reap what he had sown.

What incomparable motivation that should be for all believers. Jesus promised
