Second Lesson

Luke 8:26-39 (NRSV) Rev. Katie Penick

Then they arrived at the region of the Gerasenes, which is opposite Galilee. As he stepped out on shore, a man from the city who had demons met him. For a long time he had not worn any clothes, and he did not live in a house but in the tombs. When he saw Jesus, he cried out and fell down before him, shouting, "What have you to do with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I beg you, do not torment me," for Jesus had commanded the unclean spirit to come out of the man. (For many times it had seized him; he was kept under guard and bound with chains and shackles, but he would break the bonds and be driven by the demon into the wilds.) Jesus then asked him, "What is your name?" He said, "Legion," for many demons had entered him. They begged him not to order them to go back into the abyss. Now there on the hillside a large herd of swine was feeding, and the demons begged Jesus to let them enter these. So he gave them permission. Then the demons came out of the man and entered the swine, and the herd stampeded down the steep bank into the lake and was drowned. When the swineherds saw what had happened, they ran off and told it in the city and in the country. Then people came out to see what had happened, and when they came to Jesus, they found the man from whom the demons had gone sitting at the feet of Jesus, clothed and in his right mind. And they became frightened. Those who had seen it told them how the one who had been possessed by demons had been healed. Then the whole throng of people of the surrounding region of the Gerasenes asked Jesus to leave them, for they were seized with great fear. So he got into the boat and returned. The man from whom the demons had

gone out begged that he might be with him, but Jesus sent him away, saying, "Return to your home, and declare how much God has done for you." So he went away, proclaiming throughout the city how much Jesus had done for him.

We Welcome Everyone Already, Why Become ONA?

Excerpts from the ONA 101 Webinar by the Open & Affirming Coalition of the UCC

Becoming an open and affirming (ONA) congregation is an act of worship that brings praise to God. In fact the entire journey of discernment is an act of worship bringing praise to God! It is a time of listening to God, discerning God's purpose for your congregation and praising God for the many gifts bestowed upon us by God.

Accept one another, then, just as Christ accepted you, in order to bring praise to God. Romans 15:7 (NIV)

Simply welcoming everyone is great but for LGBTQIA+ church seekers it needs to be spelled out. Every church around says all are welcome but LGBTQIA seekers have painfully learned that these words aren't always true, in fact more often than not they find that they really aren't included in that welcome unless they want to deny the person God created them to be. So in this sense, church is like a "damaged brand" to LGBTQIA+ seekers and to the many straight millenials who identify with the values ONA represents.

A public welcome to LGBTQIA+ seekers looking for a church home sends a clear message that they can find a home without judgment or condemnation within your congregation. LGBTQIA+ seekers will not take a generic 'All are welcome' statement to include them. It has to be specifically stated and this is what being an ONA church does.

A congregation's affirmation and support through an ONA covenant can be a life-saving experience, especially for LGBTQIA+ youth and seniors. Many LGBTQIA+ seniors find themselves after a lifetime of being out having to go back in the closet when they get to the point where they need to depend on help and support from others or have to go into assisted-living or nursing care. ONA congregations offer support structures to LGBTQIA+ seniors and youth who are more prone to bullying that they normally do not have.

As an ONA congregation, you would be part of a growing movement within our denomination that has restored thousands of LGBTQIA+ Christians not wanted by other churches to the family of faith. Imagine if this were the vocation of your church: To restore wholeness to the broken body of Christ. The body of Christ is broken, is not whole, because for the most part LGBTQIA+ Christians are not included. It is the sacred vocation of ONA churches to restore the body of Christ to wholeness by including LGBTQIA+ Christians.

But some of you may ask, won't becoming an ONA church make us a 'gay church?' This is an urban legend actually. Of the 1,700+ ONA congregations within the UCC, only about 8 or 9 have predominantly LGBTQIA+ membership and they were founded as predominantly LGBTQIA+ churches. Instead you as a congregation get to be part of a powerful healing transformation in the LGBTQIA+ lives you touch through Christ and in return you gain new friendships, talents and gifts to benefit your faith community.

By becoming an ONA congregation you reach straight allies too. Many young heterosexual adults, especially young couples with children, identify with ONA values and want to raise their children in a church that support those values. Many tell us that they join ONA congregations specifically for being ONA, fordisplaying a rainbow still-speaking comma on their website with their ONA covenant or a banner or flag outside to signify that this congregation is different that the hundred other mainline Protestant churches in their community. Many of these young parents voiced that their children are too young for them to know how their child's sexual orientation or gender identity are going to develop and they don't want their child to be in a church that will be biased, judgmental, or hypocritical should their child identify as LGBTQIA+. They desire their church home to be a healthy environment for their child. So, a confident and well-informed welcome to LGBTQIA+ seekers also welcomes straight millenials and the younger Generation Z and can be an essential element of a congregation's growth strategy.

1/3 of millenials say they left churches because of homphobic or transphobic practices and teachings.

Juneteenth is June 19th annually and is a day to celebrate unity and equality with and for our African-American siblings in Christ!

On June 19, 1865, two-and-a-half years after the Emancipation Proclamation went into effect, federal troops under the command of Union Major General Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston, Texas. They brought a life-changing message for the estimated quarter-of-a-million slaves in the state: "All slaves are free" and entitled to payment for their labor. This important day in history became known as Freedom Day, or Juneteenth, now a U.S. federal holiday.

World Refugee Day is an international day designated by the United Nations to honour refugees around the globe. It falls each year on June 20th and celebrates the strength and courage of people who have been forced to flee their home country to escape conflict or persecution. World

Refugee Day is an occasion to build empathy and understanding for their plight and to recognize their resilience in rebuilding their lives.

Whoever they are, people forced to flee should be treated with dignity. Anyone can seek protection, regardless of who they are or what they believe. It is non-negotiable: seeking safety is a human right.

Wherever they come from, people forced to flee should be welcomed. Refugees come from all over the globe. To get out of harm's way, they might take a plane, a boat, or travel on foot. What remains universal is the right to seek safety.

Whenever people are forced to flee, they have a right to be protected. Whatever the threat – war, violence, persecution – everyone deserves protection. Everyone has a right to be safe.

Every minute 20 people leave everything behind to escape war, persecution or terror. There are several types of forcibly displaced persons.


