

More Ways God Works Through Our Weaknesses

2 Corinthians 12:1-10 June 26, 2022

<u>The Big Idea</u>: Rational people usually avoid hardship when given a choice. Sometimes we have no choice. Trouble comes our way, we beg the Lord to take it away, and we wait for His answer. He may choose to remove the "thorn", but He may very well use the weakness to display His power and glory in our lives.

2 Corinthians 12:1-10 (ESV)

12 I must go on boasting. Though there is nothing to be gained by it, I will go on to <u>visions and revelations</u> of the Lord. ²I know a man in Christ who fourteen years ago was <u>caught up to the third heaven—whether</u> in the body or out of the body I do not know, God knows. ³ And I know that this man was caught up **into paradise—whether** in the body or out of the body I do not know, God knows— ⁴ and <u>he heard things that cannot be told</u>, which man may not utter. ⁵ On behalf of this man I will boast, but on my own behalf I will not boast, except of my weaknesses— ⁶ though if I should wish to boast, I would not be a fool, for I would be speaking the truth; but I refrain from it, so that no one may think more of me than he sees in me or hears from me.

⁷ So to keep me from becoming conceited because of the surpassing greatness of the revelations, a thorn was given me in the flesh, a messenger of Satan to harass me, to keep me from becoming conceited. ⁸ Three times I pleaded with the Lord about this, that it should leave me. ⁹ But he said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness."

Therefore I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may rest upon me. ¹⁰ For the sake of Christ, then, I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities. *For when I am weak, then I am strong*.

3 Reasons We Should Accept Our Weaknesses

- → Weakness is good because without it we never experience the fullness of God's power.
- → Weakness is good because without it mercy remains a mystery.
- → Weakness is good because it compels us to look beyond ourselves for answers and in doing so magnifies the sufficiency of God's grace.

7 Lessons from Paul About Your "Visions & Thorns"

- Life-changing, supernatural, spiritual experiences are rare and should never be thought of as normative or essential.
- Paul never promotes his experience as something all Christians should pursue and experience. Never chase after someone else's experience. Never promote your own!
- The thorn was no accident. God's hand is evident at every turn.
- "Thorns" can, at the same time, be sent by God for His purposes and hijacked by Satan for his purposes. We must choose what we will respond to .
- "Weaknesses" are nothing to be ashamed of. Acknowledge them, trust the Lord with them, and receive His power in them.
- It is perfectly acceptable to beg God to take away your "thorn". How He chooses to answer you is up to Him. If He decides the answer is "no" you will be given two things: grace to endure and God's power in your life.
- Remember that thorns weaknesses are not sins, or even temptations to sin. They are a part of God's original design for our lives or something He chooses to bring into our lives at a later time which will cause us to cry out to Him and depend on Him.
