Koinonia (pronounced coy-no-knee-uh) is a transliterated form of the Greek word *κοινωνία*, which refers to concepts such as fellowship, joint participation, the share which one has in anything, a gift jointly contributed, a collection, a contribution. It identifies the idealized state of fellowship and unity that should exist within the Christian church, the Body of Christ. The term may have been borrowed from the early Epicureans—as it is used by Epicurus' Principal Doctrines 37–38. The term communion, derived from Latin *communio* ('sharing in common'), is related. The term "Holy Communion" normally refers to the Christian rite also called the Eucharist.

The idea of the newsletter name change is to remind us that we are in communion or fellowship with one another. Sharing our news helps create and build the community of Zion, a community of which we are all a part. It also reminds us that we exist to be an extension of God's community, fellowshiping with God and one another. Koinonia also encapsulates our newly revised church mission, vision, and values statements that express the very core of our existence as a church but also as Christians.

By having the name of the newsletter focus on koinonia and purpose, we are reminded that we are a community of fellowship, joint participation, communion, and love. This is yet another way for us to live and breathe this reminder. May we always remember to continually strive to be the welcoming, loving agents of fellowship and community as God asks of us as an expression of our faith!

Our summer worship schedule is in effect. Worship at 10am through Sept. 4th. Sunday School resumes Sep 11th.

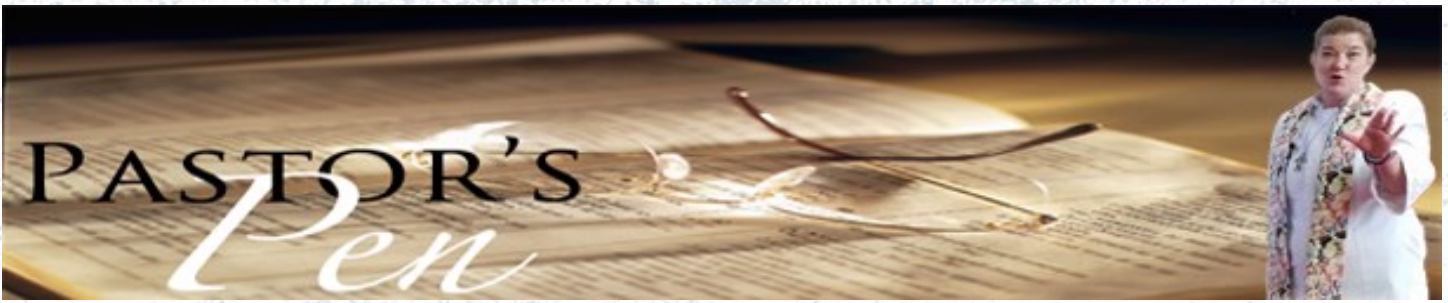

Consistory Highlights for June 2022

This spring the Consistory has been starting each meeting with a litany reading led by Katie of our Values, Beliefs, and Mission statements. This has been a wonderful way to reflect on the path that ZION is taking.

Questions about the monthly team reports were brief and easily answered. The Search Committee met with the Association Conference Minister in May to review ZION's profile. The committee currently is making some adjustments to our profile based on this discussion. Our new Articles of Incorporation has been held up at the State due to a formatting question. This should be easily resolved. ZION has sent checks to the World Central Kitchen and the UCC Ukrainian relief fund and has received thank you letters from both groups. Donations for both Ukrainian relief efforts will continue to be collected.

ZION had the largest number of participants of any UCC church at the May 14 Association meeting. Debra was approved for ordination. Katie will be preaching at Debra's ordination which will be scheduled for sometime this summer. Katie also spoke about a new Association initiative to address Medical Debt Relief. Medical debt is the leading cause of poverty in many areas of our country. The Association has pledged \$7000 to support this effort. Each church in the Association is asked to contribute \$185 toward this goal. Katie will address and elaborate on this issue in her upcoming sermon. It was decided that we will accept donations from the congregation for this effort and that ZION will make up any deficit to meet the \$185 pledge request. It was also suggested that perhaps Medical Debt Relief could be a future HARC project with ZION taking the lead on it.

ZION was awarded \$2000 from the Funkhouser Grant for the Soup Kitchen and the Food Pantry. We did not receive an award from the Rotary Club this year.

A representative from the Maryland Food Bank will visit the Soup Kitchen and Food Pantry this week to familiarize himself with our operation. It is hoped that this may lead to some financial support from the Maryland Food Bank to modernize this part of our church and/or the parsonage.

We continue to have difficulty with our security cameras whenever there is a strong storm. This then results in calling Tele-plus to correct this issue. Upon further discussion with Tele-plus, it was decided that it was most cost effective to replace the NVR device, basically the computer brain of our security system. A motion to this effect was made, seconded, and passed.

Draft job descriptions for the Administrative Assistant and the Multi-Media Specialist positions were shared. These drafts are hoped to be finalized within the next week or so in order to begin advertising for these two positions.

Upcoming events include the Mental Health First Aid Training on June 11 at ZION, the Block Party on June 18, an inside movie event to be scheduled this summer, the Ag Fair in July which involves our 4-H Club, the Cash Scholarship application deadline of June 30, and a planning meeting on June 28 at 3pm at ZION for an Interfaith Day of Peace Progressive Dinner on September 11. If you are interested in attending or volunteering for any of these events, please contact the church office.

As you can see, lots is happening this summer at ZION but, the Consistory will be on hiatus until Sept.

Our Open and Affirming Journey:

What Is a Covenant and What Does it Have to Do With Becoming an ONA Congregation?

“For Christ, having received, not one or two of us, but all together, has thus connected us, so that we ought to cherish one another.” ~John Calvin

Covenant is a core-value not only in the ONA movement but within the Reformed tradition that is deeply rooted in the Bible. It is a concept that not only goes back 500-years to the beginning of the Reformation, but that is over 3000 years-old going back to the Hebrew scriptures and tradition. Essentially, to be in covenant means this: “Accept one another, just as Christ accepted you, in order to bring praise to God” (Romans 5:17, NIV). Now, Paul in Romans is literally using a word that means “to take”. It is translated in the NIV version as “accept” and is a better translation than “welcomed” as many translations including the NRSV version translate it as. “Welcomed” is really a weak translation of the word, where “accept” gets closer to Paul’s concept which is “to take people into our lives” and is the same sense in which we use it in our marriage vows: “I take you to be my husband...I take you to be my wife...I take you to be my spouse.” So we see that “acceptance” for Paul is more than a “welcome”. The Greek verb Paul uses means “to take” others into our lives--not a transitory welcome but an enduring relationship. Paul wants us to take other people into our lives, and that is the basic content of a covenant in our tradition. John Calvin (French Theologian and Reformer) wrote regarding Romans 15:7 that “For Christ, having received, not one or two of us, but all together, has thus connected us, so that we ought to cherish one another.”

The Mayflower Compact in 1620 put it this way: “[We] solemnly and mutually, in the presence of God, and one another, covenant and combine ourselves together....”

The church in Dedham, Massachusetts in 1638 said it this way, “[We covenant] through the help of the Lord to live together in this, our, holy fellowship according to the rule of love.”

Thomas Shepherd (Congregationalist Theologian) wrote in 1648 that “Members [of the church are] bound to cleave only to Christ, their head... and to one another by mutual love, which they are bound to strengthen and confirm... by a Solemn Covenant.”

In 17th-century New England, covenants actually created churches because there was no hierarchy. There was no external authority to tell churches what they had to do so they gathered together on the basis of a covenant and those covenants actually constituted the church. In the same way an ONA covenant really tells a church who they are and what their values are. The values our ancestors in faith associated with covenants included belonging to Christ, connection, mutual love, experiencing God’s presence, and holy listening. The church in Dedham, MA, wrote their covenant only after several months of sitting down every day listening to the Word of God together, not only in Scripture but in the stories they shared with one another, and they prayed. They did all of this because they wanted to discern what God’s plan was for their church. And just as they did, we too must pray, discerning what God’s plan for our church is because God does have a plan for our church and every participant in it. Will we covenant together to breathe life into God’s plans, to discern what God’s will for us as a congregation is? Will those plans include an ONA covenant? Will that covenant be inclusive of all of God’s children or will it demand exclusivity? Will our covenant be compassionate and loving of all of our neighbors or only to select neighbors? Will it be mindful of the language it uses to include the oppressed and the marginalized or will it contain language that is inclusive of us but offensive to the oppressed and marginalized? Will our fellowship be governed by the rule of love, connecting us all together so that we may cherish one another? Will we cleave to Christ and one another by mutual love, strengthening and confirming that love in solemn covenant? These are the exciting questions we have set forth to answer in the process of our ONA journey.

We look forward to journeying together with you!

In March we as a congregation voted to begin the journey of discernment to decide if we should become an open and affirming (ONA) congregation. ONA is a movement within the UCC that would designate us as a welcoming and inclusive congregation to include our LGBTQIA+ siblings in Christ. In April we formed an ONA team to help guide us through this journey of discernment. On Pentecost Sunday, June 5th, we officially commissioned that team. The team has been busy planning and building a foundation to begin sharing with the congregation inviting us all to hear, pray, listen, and to be gracefully engaged in and throughout this process. Updates and informative articles such as this will be shared in the newsletter and/or weekly bulletins in addition to special events and forums to help guide us together throughout this process of discernment.

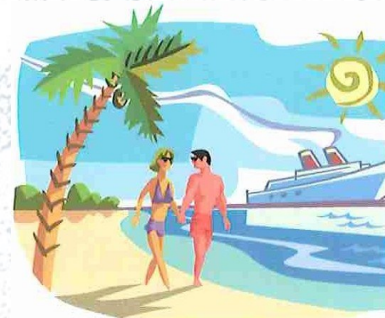


Hot, Hot, Hot !!

A Parish Nurse Note—July 2022

The dog days of summer are here! July 3 through August 11 are considered the dog days for 2022. What exactly are "dog days?" The ancient Greeks and Romans believed this time period was filled with drought, bad luck, unrest, and heat so extreme it could cause men and dogs to be "driven mad." They also felt that disease and discomfort were abundant. (FYI- a 2009 study in Finland showed that infections were higher during dog days....coincidence?) Astrologically, this is the time when the star Sirius, part of the constellation Canis Major (Greater Dog) and the brightest star other than the sun, rises at dawn and is close to the sun. This alignment was thought to be the cause for the temperature- hot, hot, hot! The Greeks and Romans were not fond of this star. However, the Ancient Egyptians knew that the Nile River flooded in late June, bringing rich soil to their crops; they were more pleased when Sirius was visible.

Here are some tips to beat the heat of the dog days and avoid dehydration. Wear lightweight, light colored, loose fitting cotton or linen clothing. Dark colors do absorb heat and tight fitting clothes block perspiration from evaporating (the body's air conditioner.) Some clothes also have built-in SPF (sun protection factor). Dry clothes give more protection against heat than wet ones. Wide brim hats and sunglasses are a must when out in the heat. Sunscreen products help prevent sunburn.....a whole other kind of heat! Pay special attention to your nose, ears, shoulders, back of the neck and lips when using sunscreen products.



Drink water throughout the day; don't wait until you are thirsty to start. Monitor how often you urinate; light colored urine and normal or frequent urination means you are hydrated. Dark urine and less than normal urination are signs you are not well-hydrated. Avoid alcohol and drinks containing caffeine; these beverages are dehydrating, even without hot weather. Specific foods can also help you stay cool and hydrated. Fresh fruits and vegetables often have a high water concentration; think watermelon, strawberries, tomatoes and peppers. Choose low fat meats, as fat takes longer to digest and has a higher salt concentration than lean meats, adding extra work for your body in hot weather.

Avoid being outside between 10 am and 2-4 pm. Take frequent breaks when in the heat and humidity, being sure to drink and snack during those breaks. If necessary, work outside in shady areas during peak sun hours. This will also help decrease your chances of heat related health issues.

Sunstroke (also known as heat stroke) is a serious medical emergency. This happens when your body can no longer regulate its temperature. Warning signs of sunstroke include throbbing headache, skin that is sore and red, nausea, vomiting, dizziness, muscle weakness, confusion, rapid heart rate and rapid breathing. If this occurs, get in a shady spot, elevate your head slightly (like using a pillow), drink cool (not cold) fluids, put a cool compress on your head, and try to stay calm. Ignoring these warning signs of a sunstroke can lead to brain swelling and even death.

So bring on the dog days of summer! But please, enjoy them safely!

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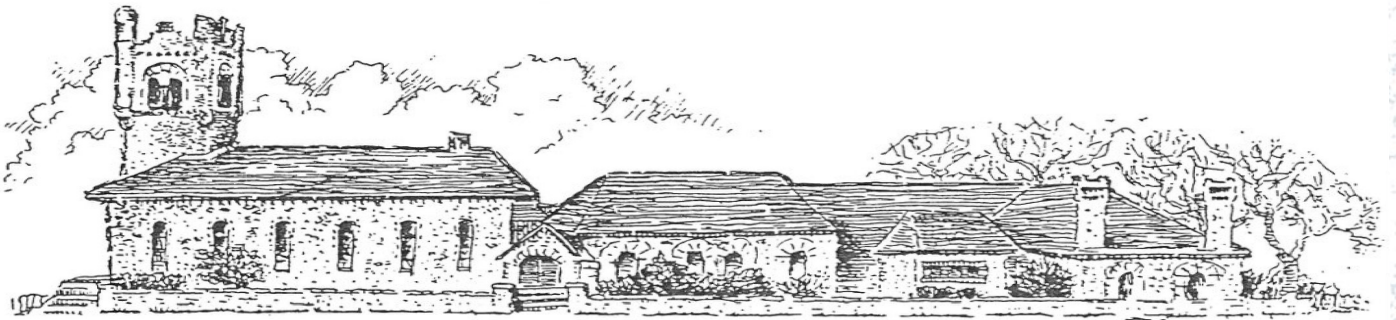
