The second class will be 102: Taking A Deeper Dive Into Service with Rev. Barbee. I am excited to see so many of you back in worship. We have been very successful in not having Covid spread at worship service. You have done your part and we are so appreciative. PEACEMAKING AND JUSTICE COMMITTEE FOCUS ON GUN VIOLENCE

In April 2022, a bill was signed allowing gun owners to carry concealed handguns without a license from the State (permitless carry). This is not what the majority of Georgians wanted. The Governor and 2nd Amendment enthusiasts cited widespread concern for safety among Georgians due to a spike in violent crime.

4.6 million American children live in homes with guns* that are both loaded and unlocked. And every year, nearly 700 children, 17 and under, die by suicide with a Gun.

A study by the Harvard School of Public Health of the 50 states reveals a powerful link between rates of firearm ownership and suicides. Based on a survey of American households it was found that in states where guns were prevalent rates of suicide were higher. The inverse was also true.

Though they tend to get less public attention than gun-related murders, suicides have long accounted for the majority of U.S. gun deaths. In 2020, 54% of all gun-related deaths in the U.S. were suicides (24,292), while 43% were murders (19,384), according to the CDC.

Do guns make us safer? Statistics point to a different reality.

A study conducted in 2010 revealed that 8,000,000 tons of plastic were thrown into the ocean. The World Economic Forum suggested that by 2050 plastic will be entering the ocean at a rate of a garbage truckload per minute.
