

FAMILY OF THE MONTH:

GERRY RICHARDSON

Barna Research Group says that unbelieving adults age 19 and over have just a 6% probability of becoming Christians. Gerry Richardson was a happy, successful person who never realized there was more to life until his forties.

Gerry graduated from Devry Technical Institute and took his first job with Mine Safety Research in Callery, PA. He found a great wife, Julie, and they had two daughters, Dawn and Robin. Life was good. They joined a local country club and enjoyed golfing together. Gerry got involved in sky diving and began accumulating hours towards getting a pilot's license.

Gerry advanced his career and took a job in sales with Umbaugh Pole Building Company. Construction was a good fit for him and during his 12 years he became a divisional president. During the Carter years and high inflation, the construction business went through some hard times and the Umbaugh Co. was bought by another company. In 1982, Gerry formed his own company with a partner, Jim Heasly and a few other employees from Umbaugh. Hanover Building Systems succeeded for 35 years of ups and downs. During this time, he followed the advice his father had taught him, "You owe your service back to your community from which you drew your profits." He was a Rotary member for 36 years, served 15 years on the board of the Chamber of Commerce, and 8 years on the board of the United Cerebral Palsy.

In 1985, the treasurer of the Chamber of Commerce invited Gerry to a CBMC (Christian Business Men's Committee) dinner. God used the speaker that night, whose testimony mirrored Gerry's life without God, to touch his heart and he filled out a card saying that he prayed the sinner's prayer that Thursday night. The following Monday morning at 7:00 A.M. Gordy Stambaugh came into Gerry's office and offered to

disciple him in a CBMC training program for the next year. At the age of 44, Gerry beat the odds I mentioned at the start and began his life of service for God. He realized he should find a church. God used a friend to invite Gerry to "Bring a Friend to Church Day." Coincidentally, it was a church that Gerry's company had recently built (Christ American Baptist Church). After a few months of his regular attendance, Julie surprised him and said she would come to church with him. She gave her life to Christ in 1987 and they grew together in that church until she died of lung cancer after four years in and out of remission in 2002.

That Chamber of Commerce whose treasurer invited him to the dinner that changed his life would add another significant chapter to his life. The president of that Chamber, Sandy, who Gerry served under on the board for 15 years would become Gerry's next wife and partner, "Itill death do us part." Sandy was a gift from God to Gerry in many ways. The American Baptist Church had a mission to plant 1,000 new churches in 10 years. Gerry and Sandy spent two years of Saturdays in a program to train and certify lay pastors to help them towards that goal.

In 2017, Gerry sold his business to his employees and retired so they could spend more time with family. A little voice told him to, "buy two." Sandy bought a house in Lynchburg, VA near her daughter and grandchildren and Gerry bought a house in Ingomar right up the street from his daughter. They would go back and forth spending a month at a time in each house. When they visited NPC, they liked

Pastor Dan because of his Biblical messages, the friendly people, and the facility, in that order.

After joining NPC, Gerry and Sandy took part in the Tuesday JOY group and served in the Sonshine Ministry at Stonebrook.

Unfortunately, Gerry experienced the same heartbreaking battle of losing his spouse again as Sandy lost her battle with cancer in October 2021. Gerry is still lonely and grieving, but instead of feeling sorry for himself he went through Stephen Ministry Training and is now ready to help others. He loves his cat, Buddy. His prayer request is for his daughters and sons-in-law to come to know Christ the way he does, and that God will use him to comfort and lead others. If you want to start a conversation with Gerry, ask him what it's like to be a World War II living historian and participate in re-enactments as a chaplain or to fly his own little plane.

WHAT SHOULD I SAY?

HOW TO TALK ABOUT JESUS WITHOUT BEING (TOO) AWKWARD

In June, Diana, our office manager, had her car in the shop three times in close succession due to some mechanical issues. She went in a fourth time to give the men working there a gift card to treat them to lunch because she was grateful for their help. Then she was back again for another car related issue. Aren't cars fun!

Car rant aside...Diana had been feeling a bit of a nudge to share about Jesus at each of these visits but had not yet done so. After leaving the shop for the fifth time without sharing, the nudge turned into a conviction, so Diana went back to the shop without any car issues – Praise God!


Diana learned a method to share the gospel using something called, "The Soul-Winning Script." Sometimes she sticks to it more closely than others depending on how the Spirit leads her. The method starts by asking, "Has anyone ever told you that God loves you and has a wonderful plan for your life?"

- If the person answers "yes", she asks a few more questions to confirm and then asks how she can pray for the person. Then she prays with them right then.
- If the person answers "no", she shares some scriptures passages, asks if she can pray for the person, prays and then asks if the person would like to pray to receive Jesus. The final part of the method includes getting a name and information to follow up, an invitation to church and sharing a bible and some discipling resources.

This is what Diana did with the men at the shop. When Diana asked how she could pray for them, one of the men shared that his wife had recently died of cancer and another man shared that his wife was currently battling cancer. Diana took the opportunity to pray right then and there for them and then she invited them to pray with her. One of the men did pray with her and agreed to visit her church. Now we are waiting for God to prompt the man's heart to follow through. So, for the rest of the story, you'll have to check in with Diana. I know she would be thrilled to share it with you! That's just one way to PBJ!

I pray that God gives you the opportunity to be a laborer for His harvest WITHOUT having to take your car to the shop on multiple occasions. But, however He does it, we can praise Him for His power and perfect timing!

One last thing: we are called to be holy, set apart, a peculiar people (1 Peter 2:9, KJV), so it is actually okay if you are a little awkward! - AMBER STITES

VBS SPARK STUDIOS SPIRITUAL RECAP

VBS is long gone for the summer but so many fun memories remain! Singing great songs, watching goofy skits, making new friends, walking like Jesus, Water Day slip and slides and bounce houses and water balloons bursting...all of these are fantastic things to remember about Spark Studios. But the main reason is to teach kids about God and His love for them. Each year, we offer a Bible class and a Missions rotation for both the senior and junior campers. Take a minute to hear from their leaders, who will tell you a little about their experience at VBS.

BEN BURKHOLDER — SENIOR CAMP BIBLE LEADER

Every time I get to teach the Bible classes for VBS, I feel privileged to be able to articulate the faith not just for NPC kids but also kids from the area. One experience this past VBS captured the importance of this opportunity. It was about half way through the week, and I was teaching a lesson on sin's effects and how God rescues us from sin in the Gospel. Unfortunately, I had more content than time, and I found myself rushing the Gospel section more than I wanted that day. Nevertheless, God was able to use it. I gave my best yet brief explanation of the Gospel from 2 Corinthians 5 and then realized we were out of time as the next group was trying to enter. It was then that a young boy not from our church raised his hand and asked, "Wait, does this mean that God won't strike me?" The way he framed the question caught me off guard. I immediately went over to him and asked him to repeat to make sure I heard it correctly. He reiterated the words with a solemnity that knew sin deserved God's punishment. However, having just learned of God's grace, you could see the reality of the Gospel dawning in this young man's mind. Through the work of Jesus, God had reconciled us to himself, and I was able to affirm that for him (2 Corinthians 5:17-21). Since his group was leaving at that moment, I handed him off to his counselor who was

more than willing to follow up in the squad time they were going to. As I cherished this brief but powerful moment of discovery for him, all of the time and energy invested in preparing those lessons suddenly felt small and insignificant. If one young man discovered God's grace and love as a result of that lesson, I wouldn't want to be anywhere else.



SUSANN PINKERTON — JUNIOR CAMP MISSIONS CO-LEADER

Diane Glancy and I have served together for the last three years in this role. Every year, after working with her, I rejoice in God's perfect design of his people working collaboratively as the Body of Christ. If I have an idea, she makes it happen. Her creative vision for making our room enticing and inviting always brings such wonder to the kids. She often prefers that I do a lot of the talking, but she isn't afraid to share Biblical wisdom, make suggestions to help me say things more clearly, or act out a scene with me. Through the Holy Spirit's leading, she's set the thematic Bible verse for our room each year which centers our teaching. This year's was I John 4:19.

A joy and challenge of working with our littlest campers, ages 4-6, is knowing what new vocabulary words might need to be taught. "The Gospel" was one of our introduced terms. On Tuesday, the children heard a very simple, color-coded, gospel message and learned about the many areas of community service that Hearts of Hope Ukraine performed for orphans, widows, and refugees. On Thursday, we practiced ways to serve our community with hearts filled with love for Jesus (and we actually wore cut out hearts imprinted with the beautiful name of Jesus, and a Crown). Children took turns at kindergarten-style stations where they pretended to give translation services for refugees (another new vocabulary word and favorite station with walkie-talkies); cared for stuffed animals; shopped with empty boxes from Diane's pantry for those in need; shared a meal with others with play-food and dish sets; and cared for "orphans" (another vocabulary word) with baby-dolls. On our last day, we reviewed our

color-coded Gospel message, creating a bracelet for ourselves and one to share while practicing telling the Gospel message: God is holy, we are sinners, Jesus died on the cross, He forgives our sins so that we can be with God, Jesus wants us to grow more like Him. A highlight of the week was that several of our return guests excitedly demonstrated their knowledge of Jesus through their joyful retelling of the Good News.

NANCY VAN SICKEL | JUNIOR CAMP BIBLE LEADER

One of the things that I loved to see this year was so many children from last year. It was so wonderful to see that many of these children did not know the common Bible stories that so many of us know. It was heartwarming to know that God was using VBS to put the truth of scripture into these children's hearts.

Another exciting thing was one of the children made up their own demonstration of what we learned about the Holy Spirit and showed it to the woman he was staying with on Friday. I was amazed that he made his own demonstration for her about how even though you could not see Jesus He was still there. How exciting to see a child make their own visual of what they were learning to show someone else. The thing that really kind of blew my mind is he made up his own completely different demonstration but it was accurate. Never underestimate what God is doing in the minds of the little ones. We can learn from them.

DEBORAH MCKINNEY | SENIOR CAMP MISSIONS CO-LEADER

This year in Senior Missions, Kirstin Lukas and I tag-teamed to answer the questions What is Missions? and What is God's heart for the world? I started off sharing the Latin word 'missio' or sending in the context of 2 Corinthians 5:20: 'We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us. We implore you on Christ's behalf: Be reconciled to God.' We are God's sent ones!

After we answered those questions we had a few more to look at 1.) How do we know who Christ is? Spoiler: by looking at his life and reading his words and 2.) How do we show the world who Christ is? The same ways he did! By the spoken word, through the gospel, and through action: by love and service to those around us.

We shared more about our camp mission: Hearts of Hope located in Ukraine and Romania and then created our own prayer cards based on verses and requests from the organization and spent time praying for HOH in groups with our cards.

On the second day we created bracelets with the acronym: H.O.P.E. Helping the kids to remember our camp mission Hearts of Hope, and also a phrase to help them put God's mission into action: Helping Other People Everyday. Kirstin set up a time of brainstorming with the kids to have them share ideas for how they could reach people around them in their communities with God's love every day. It was beautiful and encouraging to hear their ideas for how to reach the world with the hope and love of Christ.

NURSERY

We have a group of volunteers who help cover the nursery, led by our solid paid caregivers. We have Hannah Hepner in the Tykes room and on an alternating basis, we have Amari Walker and Kaylin Latkovic in the Infants room.

TREKKERS

This year in Trekkers, we will be kicking off a new curriculum! It is our goal to have a new three-year rotation that focuses on helping equip our 3rd-5th graders to think critically about faith, truth, and worldview. Many of our lessons will be based off the Foundation Worldview curriculum, but we will be pulling lessons from other fantastic sources as well. This year, we will focus on Truth (Examples we will critically explore are: What is truth and its source? Truth is not a feeling, God's Word is our highest authority, Jesus is our ultimate source of truth).

Did you know that critical thinking skills begin developing by mid-elementary school? Or did you know that research suggests that morals are set by age 9? And did you know that research is also suggesting that most salvation experiences happen by age 13, and likewise most worldviews are established by age 13? It is important that we as parents and as a church don't miss these crucial, formative years with our kids! That's why in Trekkers, we desire to take the time to invest, train, teach, and answer questions to help our youth build their very own firm faith foundation!

We are looking forward to critically thinking with your kids all the while doing it in a fun, engaging way! And as always, there will be dinner, games, and prizes!

KIDS' WORSHIP

We will take a one week break from Kids' Worship on September 4 and then start up again on the 11th as well as other ministries. We kick off the new school year by talking about lessons taught by the Apostle Paul, with scripture passages from Romans and Ephesians, which will go well with Pastor Dan's series on Romans.

Kids' Worship begins in the Tykes room, where the 2 and 3-yearolds are read a Bible story, explained the meaning of that story and prayed for and with by some capable leaders. In the Tykes room, we have Melanie Nichols, Brian Harrer and Beth Hendley, who would appreciate your prayers, as they lead the little ones in the Tykes room.

Kids' Worship middle level is what we call Preschool. This is for the 3-5-year-olds and kindergarteners. They will also be studying lessons from Paul, on a preschooler's level, while we do fun activities to help solidify the Bible lessons. We teach the kids about our sponsored child and where she lives, as well as collect an offering and pray for her. REFLECTIONS ON A WEST VIRGINIA MISSIONS TRIP

In July 2022, our youth served in West Virginia with Praying Pelican Mission. Here is one student's account of what happened on the trip:

I hope you are doing well! I am grateful for this awesome experience to serve in West Virginia, and I am so excited to tell you a little bit about it. On Sunday we went to Liberty Street Church and then helped set up for the Art Camp that we were going to help out with that week. Then we helped out with the youth group there. Some have gone through a lot, whether it was drug abuse or physical or sexual abuse. Some went there just so they could get away from their home life. We got to play and worship with them; it was a beautiful time.

On Monday morning, half of us went to a school and the other half went to a homeless shelter. My group went to the school and did some landscaping work. Then we painted a few rooms inside for a few hours. The other group helped clean and paint at the homeless shelter. In the afternoon we helped out at the Art Camp. We got to sing some songs and help the kids with their art projects. After dinner, we had worship and small group time. We talked about our day and then relaxed. It was a great time to grow closer to my youth group.

On Tuesday, we went back to the school and painted. In the afternoon, we helped out at the Art Camp and then had dinner. The other half that went to the homeless shelter told us stories of families that they met. Some of the kids were very crazy and loud, and others were very quiet and kept to themselves. We also discussed the devotion that we did that morning. An interesting story about the day was how the devotion was connected to a person that we met at the homeless shelter. We all did the same devotion every morning, and that week, we were reading the story about Joseph. That morning we were at the part where Joseph was thrown into prison because he was accused of doing something that he did not do. The group that went to the homeless shelter told us about a man that they met. He was accused of beating his wife and

was kicked out of his home. He came to the shelter just a few days ago. His wife is bipolar and apparently wasn't taking her medicine. She started making things up and imagining things. He was heartbroken that his wife would do something like this. He said the police would come to the house in a few days to check things out. However, until that happens he had to stay at the shelter. It's so fascinating how our devotion that morning was connected with a man at the shelter. What are the odds of that happening on the same day? I believe it was God revealing himself to us. I pray that man will be set free from the accusations and be able to see his wife again someday.

On Wednesday morning, my group went to the school to paint while the other half went to the homeless shelter to finish painting and cleaning. That afternoon we helped out at the Art Camp. It was the last day of camp, and so it was a little sad. I met this little boy named Tanner and we became best friends. He is 10 years old and is very passionate about art. Even though we were only together for three days we grew really close. When it was time to say goodbye, he gave me a hug and said he would be back next year. Sadly, I had to tell him I would not be back, but I promised him that I would never forget about him.

On Thursday morning, we finished painting at the school. And then went exploring in the afternoon as a group. We went to "The Overlook," which was basically a park up on the mountains. The picture above shows a view of the whole city. It was a beautiful view of Parkersburg. Afterwards, we went back to the student youth ministry, and we did an evening of affirmation. We went around in a circle and told each other what we loved about them. It was a beautiful time to just get to know each other and grow closer as a group. On Friday morning we packed and headed back home.

I am so thankful to God for letting me go on this adventure. I believe this trip changed my perspective on life and even on myself. I love to serve others but I never realized how much of a blessing it is. It is so rewarding! When you see a smile from a child that lives in an abusive home, it makes you want to smile a little more. When you hear the words "you're my best friend," from a little boy that you've only been with for three days, makes you want to be a little more thankful. And when a principal who has zero dollars in her budget to help her school but still buys the supplies, paint, mulch, plants (with her own money), it just makes you want to give a little more to the world. It doesn't matter if you're a kid or an adult, serving, listening, even hanging out with someone can not only change their life but also yours. 
