#### A Note from the Pastor April 2022

As I sit here writing I realized the lamb is missing! No, not the biblical Lamb, He is never missing. The lamb is missing. Have you seen the lamb? I've been told all my life that March comes in like a lion and goes out like a lamb. THAT LAMB is missing. It's cold, its windy, its raining, its storming! We had a fire in the wood stove for the last weekend in March. It seems like the lion is still here. Somebody needs to find the lamb!! I am tired of the cold and snow.

Speaking of lambs, this is the month when we celebrate "the Lamb of God that takes away the sin of the world!" (John 1:29). April 3 is the 5th Sunday of Lent. The following Sunday ushers in Holy Week starting with Palm Sunday, Maundy (Commandment) Thursday, Good Friday, and culminating with Resurrection Day also called Easter. What a week of emotions. A great celebration happened with the arrival of Jesus. There was joy, dancing, shouting, waving of palm branches. Seemed like the start of a good week.

Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday Jesus taught in the Temple. People crowded around to hear His words, to be fascinated by his parables, or to watch Him tangle with the pompous Pharisees and Priests. Joy from the people abounded, hatred from His opponents, and a sense of urgency from Jesus to get them all to understand what was about to happen.

Thursday, as every good Jew does still to this day, Jesus celebrated Passover with his disciples and others. The lamb was slain and cooked. The bread and wine were passed around during the ceremony. After the feast Jesus instituted what we call Communion. He washed the disciple's feet. He watched as Judas left to go get the ones who would drag him away. He and the disciples sang praise hymns as they left the house and headed for the garden.

As Thursday became Friday, Jesus was in the garden. I can't imagine being under so much stress and strain that blood oozes from your forehead like sweat. All the while seeking comfort from friends that could not stay awake to provide that comfort. Followed by witnessing Judas, the one who had earlier sat beside Him, now betraying Him with a kiss. As the night wore on Jesus was tormented, tortured, mocked, and degraded in every way as He went back and forth between the Jewish Priestly Leaders, Herod, and Pilate.

The daylight of Friday would find Him rejected by the very people He came to save. He was scourged and sent to be nailed to the cross. There is no doubt that Jesus felt every strike of the hammer as the nails tore through His skin, muscle, and into the wood beams of the cross. We've heard about the cross every year and it has become so familiar that we forget the pain and agony of those who were crucified. Writer from

the Roman times and historians today agree that crucifixion is probably the most painful and agonizing death sentence anyone could ever experience. After suffering for hours Jesus commended His Spirit to the Father and exhaled His last breath.

Later Friday, just before the sun set, Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus removed the dead limp body of Jesus from the cross and placed it in Joseph's new, unused tomb. The large stone was placed over the door. It was sealed by the Priests and guarded by the Romans.

At dark on Friday the Sabbath began. The day of rest and worship. I can't imagine there was much rest for those close to Jesus. What a sad day of worship it must have been for them also. Some of you have been there. Not in Jerusalem. Where those people were mentally, spiritually, and emotionally. Great joy in the family. Couldn't get much better. Then out of nowhere, tragedy strikes. An accident, murder, maybe even a suicide. All of a sudden, the happiness is replaced by grief, wonder, broken hearts and broken lives. That's where we find those who held Jesus so dear in their lives.

Then on Sunday morning with the sun coming over the horizon and the birds greeting the day in song the ground shook and the stone rolled away from the tomb door. The risen Christ came out of the tomb victorious over death never to die again. The women found an empty tomb. Peter and John found an empty tomb. Still today there is no body in the tomb!! Mary, who returned to the tomb, found Jesus in her grief. She wrapped her arms around Him and did not want to let go. He sent her back to the followers gathered together in secret, hiding in the fear they maybe would be next. Later that day, Jesus Himself appeared to them in that closed up hiding place.

The worst day of their lives now paled in comparison to the greatest day of their lives, and the greatest day in history. Jesus was, is, and will always be alive. We celebrate the resurrection every week. (We worship on Sunday not the Saturday/Sabbath because Jesus was resurrected on Sunday. For centuries Sunday was called "Resurrection Day" or "The Lord's Day. Every Sunday is a commemoration of the resurrection.) Even though every Sunday celebrates the Risen Christ, I can hardly wait for Easter Sunday. I love the feel in the air. The extra joy in everyone's hearts. The specialness of the services that day. And I'm looking forward to seeing the back of everyone who is in the sanctuary for Sunrise Service. Hopefully, the morning sun will be shining through the beautiful stainedglass window as we turn and gaze at Jesus singing our closing hymn!

To know the joy of Easter morning, we need to know what Jesus did to get to that glory!

Love you all and thrilled to celebrate this Easter with you!!
