If anything but Jesus is the real reason for your self-worth, if there is anything more important to your identity than Jesus Christ, whether it's your moral goodness or your open-mindedness, or your race and your culture, you're going to have to look down your nose at the people who aren't as open-minded as you, who do not have the same race as you, who are not as moral as you.

Don't be too proud to accept what the gospel says about your unworthiness. Don't be too despondent to accept what the gospel says about how loved you are. Tim Keller

*The Heidelberg Catechism originated in Germany in 1562 under the authority of Elector Frederick III, who ruled the most important German province, the Palatinate, from his castle in Heidelberg. He commissioned the preparation of a new catechism for guiding ministers and teachers in instructing people in the Christian faith.

"Be opened." ³⁵And his ears were opened, his tongue was released, and he spoke plainly. ³⁶And Jesus charged them to tell no one. But the more he charged them, the more zealously they proclaimed it. ³⁷And they were astonished beyond measure, saying, "He has done all things well. He even makes the deaf hear and the mute speak."

First of all, he takes this man aside privately.

Secondly, he points to his ears, then he spits on his own fingers, and he touches the man's tongue.

Then he looks to heaven, he sighs to the bottom, deeply sighing, and he says, "Be opened!"

Isaiah 35:5 (ESV)

Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped;

Why is he doing this?

He's doing it for a scared man who is used to being a spectacle. That's why he takes him aside privately, so his miracle is not one more show.

Conclusions

Jesus Christ can cleanse anybody at all

It doesn't matter what you've done.

Jesus cleanses everybody differently

Jesus' sympathy is real sympathy because he always gives you what you need, always. He will sometimes be rough with you. Sometimes he'll be soft with you, but it's only because he's really sympathetic.

Jesus is a wonderful example for reaching out across cultural and racial barriers.

Until you see that Jesus Christ had to become the lowest scum of the earth so that you could become a son or daughter, until your self-righteousness is ruined and melted away and affirmed away and loved away by that, you will never really **overcome** the true self-righteousness that creates exclusiveness.

"The children eat first," referring to the children of Israel. He was saying: "My ministry has a priority. My ministry is to take care of the children of Israel, not to give the food that is meant for the children to the little dogs." That was simply another way of saying that His ministry was to the people of Israel and that the outreach to the Gentiles would come later.

Jesus says, "You're a dog."

In the Greek, the word for *dog* is rendered in the diminutive sense. This is an important detail. Although most of the dogs in Jesus' day were half-wild scavengers, small, domesticated dogs were kept as house pets, and these dogs tended to gather under the family table at mealtimes. They typically were fed the table scraps, but only after the family had eaten.³

An Accepting Response

Yes, Lord," she says, "you're right, but there's enough bread for us dogs as well." Jesus looks at her and praises her. He says, "For this answer your daughter is healed."

I am exactly what you say, so unworthy. There's no bread for me." She turns around, and she says,

"But I want you to know I know there is enough mercy on that table for me. Of course, I'm not fit to sit at the table. I don't even ask for that, but there is enough mercy for me. I know you have a heart that's big enough. I want it."

With these two things together, you have Christianity.

That's Christianity. Jesus says you're not fit for the table. It's not until she says, "I'm a dog under the table," that she is fit to be a child at the table. It is not till she admits she's a dog under the table that she is admitted as a child to the table, because that's what he does. This is the gospel. If you say, "I see," Jesus says you're blind. If you say, "I'm blind, Lord," he says, "Finally, you see." If you say, "I'm all right," he says you're condemned. If you say, "I'm condemned," he says, "All right, I took your condemnation for you." Mark 7:31-37 (ESV)

Then he returned from the region of Tyre and went through Sidon to the Sea of Galilee, in the region of the Decapolis. ³²And they brought to him a man who was deaf and had a speech impediment, and they begged him to lay his hand on him. ³³And taking him aside from the crowd privately, he put his fingers into his ears, and after spitting touched his tongue. ³⁴And looking up to heaven, he sighed and said to him, "Ephphatha," that is,

Message

The Sympathetic Christ Mark 7:24–37

Introduction

Mark now turns to examples of faith, as the Syrophoenician woman is one of the "little people" in Mark, characters who appear only once but carry the theme of what a true disciple should be. As such, she gives a lesson to the disciples of the humility and Christ-centeredness that must characterize a true follower of Jesus. The healing of the deaf mute then continues this emphasis.

Jesus went outside the borders of Israel to seek a place where He could rest from the pressing multitudes and from the debates that He had been going through. It is not clear why Jesus chose this particular region as a place of retreat; perhaps it simply seemed to be the place where He would have the lowest profile.

Crumbs

A Desperate Plea Mark 7:24–26 (ESV)

And from there he arose and went away to the region of Tyre and Sidon. And he entered a house and did not want anyone to know, yet he could not be hidden. ²⁵But immediately a woman whose little daughter had an unclean spirit heard of him and came and fell down at his feet. ²⁶Now the woman was a Gentile, a Syrophoenician by birth. And she begged him to cast the demon out of her daughter.

Mark says the woman came to Jesus and "fell at His feet." This posture indicates two things. First, she was paying homage to Jesus, showing profound respect to Him even though she knew Him only by reputation. But not only was this a sign of homage, it was a sign of abject pleading. She fell to the ground in front of Jesus because, from her perspective, her last hope for the redemption of her little girl, who was possessed by a demon, was a touch from the man in front of her.²

A Strange Reaction Mark 7:27–30 (ESV)

And he said to her, "Let the children be fed first, for it is not right to take the children's bread and throw it to the dogs." ²⁸But she answered him, "Yes, Lord; yet even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs." ²⁹And he said to her, "For this statement you may go your way; the demon has left your daughter." ³⁰And she went home and found the child lying in bed and the demon gone.
