

About seventeen years after the death of Christ, Paul preached the gospel to some Gentiles and Jews in Corinth and a church was born. Corinth was a commercial hub, which meant that it was far more diverse ethnically, religiously, politically, and culturally than most towns in the ancient world. What do you get when you have that much diversity? Conflict! Paul's church in Corinth had conflict. Conflict is not necessarily bad – it's all in how you handle it. 1 Corinthians is about practical theology. It is less systematic than, say Romans, but far more pragmatic.

We live in the most diverse country in the history of the world. What do we get from it? Conflict! Conflict is not necessarily bad. It can refine us into better people, or it can devolve into squabbles and even hatred. We can use some of the practical theology from 1 Corinthians.

# From the Archives - - - 4 (Sanctuary)

1963 Capital Campaign "Toward Christian Maturity and Service" a new Sanctuary building An unusual concave roof is being constructed atop the new Orangewood Presbyterian Church building at 7321 N. Tenth St. Tempe architect T. S. Montgomery designed the church that is being built by the E. J. Wasielewski Construction Company.

The circular building with a diameter of 116 feet will have a chapel, administrative offices, and a sanctuary seating 150. The cost is approximately \$250,000. The building is scheduled for completion in August 1964.

Twenty-four concave wood arches each 73 feet long help form the roof of the new Orangewood Presbyterian Church building. The arches are made of glue-laminated Douglas fir each weighing 3,300 pounds. The arches rest at the eaves on concrete columns and beams and sweep up to a point that will be topped by a steeple. Timber Structures Inc. of Phoenix is providing the arches that will be exposed inside the building.

A total of 142,000 board feet of lumber will be used in the roof. The roof will be completed with 2 by 4's side by side. The walls of the structure between the concrete columns are of slump block. In designing the roof with its imaginative use or wood, Montgomery said part of his choosing the concave shape was to blend it with the mountains to the east of the structure.

The pulpit is at the true center of the new building to signify that God is at the center of our lives.

# **Mission Notes**

- Honduras Trip: Great working with the 2 other churches. Having the 3 youth along was a highlight and is a motivation to perhaps do a summer trip.
- Backpacks: 35 elementary, 45 middle and 20 high-school backpacks distributed at OPC in the second and OAF Service. They were gratefully received.
- Grace Lutheran Pancake Breakfast 8/21 breakfast had 4 youth and 8 adult OPC volunteers next breakfast 10/16.
- Rocky Point Christina Suarez asked if 10 or so from OPC could join a group going to Rocky Point Nov. 3-6 to try out One Mission's home building program. One Mission cost is about \$310 per participant including food and tools.

Oct. 2, World Communion Sunday will have the Peace Making Offering - 25% goes to PCUSA, 50% goes to World Mission Advocating Justice and Peace and 25% will go to Strong Hearts Native Helpline, which provides culturally appropriate support for Native Americans experiencing domestic violence.

  - ♦ Grace Lutheran (Breakfast) \$350
  - ♦ OAF Family Support \$1,250

  - Phoenix Rescue and AZ Faith Network to split all money collected in the water ministry
  - Honduras Building Project (a collective between 3 churches) \$2,000
  - Presbyterian Disaster Assistance \$1,000
  - Nourish Phoenix \$ 475
  - Review and approval of estimated 2022-2023 mission budget.

#### ESL Classes (English as a second language)

The first ten-week session of ESL classes culminated with the presentation of certificates of completion at the OAF worship service on September 18. Congregation members clapped and cheered as each certificate was awarded. We were pleased that Glen and Peggy Gray, the instructors from the Arizona Language Institute, were able to join in for the presentations.

The money remaining from the Presbytery grant that funded the classes will be used for a second session for these same students beginning in mid to late October. Orangewood will pursue additional grant funding so that classes can be offered in 2023.

Between the two sessions, Orangewood folks are conducting weekly study halls so the students can review and practice topics that were introduced previously. We thank Becky Cederquist, Barbara Digges, Carol Khazai, and Phebe Packer for leading the study halls. The Presbyterian Women of Orangewood are hosting a morning of discovery on Saturday, October 15 at 10:30 am in Page Hall. We will be focusing on "Who Are We?" by exploring what it means to be a part of the inclusive, caring Presbyterian denomination. The morning will start with sweet rolls and then move through the connectional Presbyterian denomination, our membership in Orangewood, PC (USA) membership and finally "Who We Are!" as we make plans for our meetings, our tours and our focus for the next nine months. # **Three Congregations Set Out on Fellowship Road**

Three congregations share the campus at 7321 North 10<sup>th</sup> Street:

the original Orangewood Presbyterian Church congregation (OPC); the Orangewood African Fellowship (OAF);

and the Nile Community Church of Arizona (NCCA).

Some members of the OAF and NCCA are also members of the original Orangewood Presbyterian Church. Both the OAF and the NCCA are within the care of OPC - the OAF as a related congregation and the NCCA as a new worshipping community of the Presbytery of Grand Canyon.



Orangewood Presbyterian Church was founded in 1953. The first church service, called an "Organizing Service", was held on December 13, 1953, at the Richard Simis School. Leonard L. Patterson was the pastor. Since then Orangewood has grown and then decreased in size again. OPC's members are from all over the United States and some were born in Canada, Europe, and Central America.

The Orangewood African Fellowship was established under the auspices of Orangewood Presbyterian Church in 2015, and has grown to over 200 members. Some members of the OAF are also members of Orangewood Presbyterian Church. Members of the African Fellowship are refugees from Burundi, DR Congo, Rwanda, Tanzania, and Uganda. Many of them spent years in refugee camps before coming to the United States. New members arrive on an ongoing basis. Most members live in West Phoenix as part of a larger refugee community.

The Nile Community Church of Arizona was established as a new worshipping community of the Presbytery of Grand Canyon in 2021 and now is home to more than 65 congregants. Orangewood Presbyterian Church serves in a "mentor" role as the church gets established. Most members of the Nile Community Church of Arizona are members of the Nuer Tribe in South Sudan. Some arrived in Arizona after spending years in refugee camps in Ethiopia and then going to Minnesota as refugees. Christians of the Nuer Tribe in the United States remain connected with each other through the Nuer Christian Mission Network of North America, a non-profit that holds two large reunions a year.

It is fitting that the final hymn on the first service at Orangewood Presbyterian Church was "The Church's One Foundation" as the campus now includes three very different congregations, but all with the founding principle of Jesus Christ at the center.

# **Honduras Update**

The group of three churches that took part in the August trip have formed an informal partnership to do projects together in the future. The group has held two organizational meetings so far and are working together on a new project in San Juan Planes, a small community in the municipality of Trinidad. The church from South Dakota will lead a work team there in January and Orangewood members can join this team. The trip is scheduled for January 7-15, 2023. Orangewood is investigating a possible trip to work on a new project in Dolce Nombre in the summer of 2023.
