Leftovers

What if Jesus just used what we bring? What can He accomplish with what we bring to the table? I have really been thinking on this of late. What if all I have to offer is the equivalent of the boy who brought five loaves of bread and two small fish that we read about in John 6?

John 6:1-13 ESV

After this Jesus went away to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, which is the Sea of Tiberias. And a large crowd was following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing on the sick. Jesus went up on the mountain, and there he sat down with his disciples. Now the Passover, the feast of the Jews, was at hand. Lifting up his eyes, then, and seeing that a large crowd was coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread, so that these people may eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he would do. Philip answered him, "Two hundred denarii worth of bread would not be enough for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish, but what are they for so many?" Jesus said, "Have the people sit down." Now there was much grass in the place. So, the men sat down, about five thousand in number. Jesus then took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated. So also, the fish, as much as they wanted. And when they had eaten their fill, he told his disciples, "Gather up the leftover fragments, that nothing may be lost." So, they gathered them up and filled twelve baskets with fragments from the five barley loaves left by those who had eaten.

Jesus took that amount of food and fed over 5000 people. The truth is the number is closer to 20,000 because they did not count women and children in their records of that day. Now it would be easy to look past that story and miss a key component. There was food left over - 12 baskets full to be exact. What a miracle that was! So again, I ask, what if Jesus took what little amount we bring and did something? What would that look like?

Over the years here at CPCC, God has taken the little and done a lot. Some great ministry has taken place over the years. Lives have changed and ministries started, all because someone brought their little. We are at a place in our church where God is

asking for your little. Can you imagine how much more CPCC could do if everyone brought a little? It would be overwhelming. It would be amazing. The church functions best when God's people all contribute. I know too many of us who think we have little to offer, but again I say look at John 6. Spiritual Warfare

On Wednesday and Thursday nights we have been going over being in God's army. We have spent time going over spiritual warfare and the armor of God. As I was thinking and praying about what I should write, this was what I felt I needed to share.

We all, like it or not, are engaged in a war. I need to make it very clear that spiritual warfare is not a game. It isn't something to compromise with or play with. It's not a joke and it's definitely not something to ignore all together.

My first question, when it comes to spiritual warfare, is what does it take to have a war? It takes two opposing sides. Why are there two opposing sides? What happened? Let's look at Revelation 12:7-9, Satan the devil rebelled against God, along with a third of the angels, and they were cast out of heaven and onto the earth.

What is spiritual warfare? There is a war between good and evil, light and dark, and the two sides are fighting over you. One side wants nothing but life, restoration, freedom, and a relationship with you. The other wants nothing but death, destruction and, finally, separation from God for you.

Who or what wages war against us? Ephesians 6:12 tells us we wrestle against not the flesh but rather principalities, the powers, the rulers of the darkness, the spiritual host of wickedness in the heavenly places. We wage war against the darkness. More evidently it wages war against us. This is not a war you get to opt out of. You can refuse to fight back, but Satan refuses to let up.

Why should we care? Let's look at 1 Peter 5:8, Satan our enemy seeks to devour you, to kill you. He wants to separate us from God. He wants to distract us. Satan isn't stupid, he is very good at what he does. He knows he can't beat God so he goes after God's children, that's us. The devil wants nothing but destruction for you. The war over your soul is not something to take lightly.

So the darkness is Satan, the devil, our enemy, along with his demons, or fallen angels. They torment us. I am convinced that you cannot be possessed by a demon if you are saved. However, you can be harassed by a demon and you can be tempted by a demon. What else is there? There are people who claim to worship Satan in this world. They live here in Topeka. There are witches and warlocks. Look around you, look at the evil of this present day! Lies all around us. Ouija boards, tarot cards, and all kinds of evil games and movies and people around us. Greetings from the elders!

Thank you to everyone who pitched in and helped make Back to Church Sunday (on September 18th) a success! While the service in the park did not go off the way we planned, it was a joy to see the congregation pull together and make a great morning of worship out of a situation most would have considered a negative. We know that God can use any situation we find ourselves in for His glory, and He sure did in this case.

In other news, we are excited to share with you that we won the bid for the lot across the street at 1600 SW Clay during a county tax auction last month (we are now waiting for the deed to be transferred). We were able to use some funds that had been specifically set aside and were outside the budget. While we do not have specific plans for the space, it was an opportunity to have access to some additional space near our church building that we can use for the Kingdom of God.

The elders are seeking to know our “flock” better and give the necessary attention to our “herds”, as the wisdom of Solomon recorded in Proverbs urges. We know that we have not always been as involved and in-tune with our congregation as we should be. Soon, each elder will be reaching out to the leaders of each ministry currently active at Central Park Christian Church. This outreach will be to better understand each ministry, its needs, and how we can best support our existing ministries. We are also undertaking a review to understand how the ministries align with our mission, vision, and core values. This review is **NOT** intended to be a “gotcha” review and we are **NOT** looking to reduce the ministries in the church. Additionally, we are **NOT** looking to micromanage any ministries. What we have done is establish a framework to help quickly determine whether a newly proposed ministry aligns with our mission, vision, and core values going forward. It is only right that we look at existing ministries to be consistent in our evaluation of future ministry opportunities.

Each elder has been assigned a group of ministries over which he will oversee. Again, this is **NOT** intended to be a micromanaging endeavor. We want to create open flows of communication between each ministry leader and the elders. We believe maintaining a primary point of contact on the eldership for every ministry provides consistency. As always, the congregation and ministry teams are more than welcome to attend elder meetings and provide feedback. If you are a ministry leader and have not yet heard from the elder assigned to your ministry, you will soon. We appreciate each and every person involved in the ministries of CPCC and we look forward to seeing God move in this congregation in even more mighty ways than He has in the past.

October at Doorstep

The work has begun on our new HVAC system! Thank you to everyone who donated!

The staff and volunteers have begun working on our annual Doorstep Christmas Adoption Project. We will adopt 260 households with 800+ individuals from the Christmas Bureau again this year.

What we really need right now are school supplies and full-sized hygiene items to make the health kits. We need to have all of these items assembled and ready to hand out by Thanksgiving. This will allow us to focus on other aspects of the distribution process. We are collecting the following items:

School Supplies ~ Backpacks, spiral notebooks, folders, notebook paper (150-200 sheets), pens, pencils, crayons 24 ct., 12-inch rulers, scissors, erasers, highlighters, markers, pencil sharpeners, and glue sticks. Last year we provided school supplies for the second half of the year for 273 children.

Hygiene Items for the Health Kits ~ We have lots of towels! We need full-sized items only please. We will make 260 kits to provide for 800+ individuals... We need shampoo, conditioner (2+1 ok), bar soap, toothpaste, toothbrushes, combs, brushes, and deodorant.

The Urban Ministry Institute of Topeka

Listen, my beloved brothers, has not God chosen those who are poor in the world to be rich in faith and heirs of the kingdom, which he has promised to those who love him?

Greetings, CPCC Friends and Family!

Thanks so much for this opportunity to update you on The Urban Ministry Institute of Topeka (TUMI Topeka) happenings. We have many new faces at CPCC. Whether this is an introduction or you are long-time friends, THANK YOU for your work in equipping leaders for the urban church. Here are some bullet points to save you reading time, with a personal note at the end.

- We have around 90 students enrolled in the community, Topeka Correctional Facility and SNCO Adult Detention Center! These students are either taking our discipleship course (Fight the Good Fight of Faith) or are enrolled in our seminary program, Capstone. We'd be honored to have you visit, and to enroll if you are interested! Just give me a call.
- As part of our fall programming, we've launched TUMI's new, shortened version of Capstone, called "Cornerstone," like our newsletter! We are piloting this with select students in the community and also in the women's prison, and will be offering it to community churches in 2023. This will be an opportunity for many to be part of focused cohorts in theology and leadership who do not want to take the four-year program but do want a broad, concentrated study of God and His story.
- Our fall fundraiser and friend-raiser, The Women Who've Changed the Heart of the City Topeka Event, will be held November 17th at the Sunflower Ballroom at 6pm. We have such a great group of Honorees, including Debra Sabb, Tricia Sublette and Dr. Alicia Thompson from Wichita. Our Honorary Co-Chairs are Debra Tubbs and Pamela Johnson-Betts. Registrations are open and you will be hearing more. Also...visit www.tumitopeka.org/events. We will keep that page updated!
- Our alumni are serving strong, and our student body are training AND serving! Our fall update letter will be mailed to our entire mail list soon, including stories and more details than I can fit in a letter. If you are not on our mailing list, or your address has changed, just email me or text me and I'll get you taken care of. maryflin@tumitopeka.org or 785-431-6000.
- Along with a strong team, including CPCC members and others, we are building on the work of our and other neighborhood churches with worship services in the County Jail Annex. Many of those we serve are Central Park neighbors. They are, in many ways, the hope of our neighborhoods through the Gospel. We will be offering training to be part of our worship and teaching teams in the next few months if you are interested.

There is so much more, but this page is just for quick updates, a THANK YOU, and a request that you will continue to cover the work we began 11 years ago with prayer as we seek to train leaders to impact their neighborhoods with the victorious gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ. On a personal note, urban missions can get lonely as I am often unable to "merely fellowship" with my own church family due to the time and energy required for bi-vocational missions. I can't tell you how grateful I am for the love you show through texts, hugs and, simply because you remember me and our work in your prayers and thoughts. I sure love you all. Isn't God so good to His people!

Mexico: *Family Rejected for Witness*

A family in southern Mexico is facing persecution from their community after recently placing their faith in Christ. Christians in some parts of the country are harassed and shunned by those who follow a syncretistic blend of pagan practices and Roman Catholicism.

Flavio first heard the gospel while he was looking for work in a nearby city. After placing his faith in Christ and receiving a Bible, he returned home and used his Bible to share the gospel with his family, all of whom soon came to know the Lord. As Flavio continued to proclaim the gospel in his hometown, however, some in the community opposed his family. Several of Flavio's family members suffer from a degenerative disease that causes paralysis, and some community members blamed the family's illness on their faith in Christ. In addition, people stopped buying goods from the small store the family operates, causing them financial difficulties.

Despite opposition, Flavio and his family continue to bear witness to the hope they have in Christ. Though they are the only Christians in their village, they continue to study God's Word together and proclaim the Good News of Christ.
