Dear Siblings in Christ,

Have you heard, or said, "People just don't care anymore?" Does it seem like we're missing the same level of engagement, interest, commitment or enthusiasm for community events and organizations? Familial gatherings? Festivals? Faith?

Society has been changing since the widespread use of technology began. Older generations don't understand those who text each other in the same room. Younger folks can't understand waiting on hold to speak to someone when you can go online and do it yourself. The same was true when people got TVs and started staying home instead of visiting.

We've been given permission through our daily habits and devices to keep to ourselves, to disengage, to remain in our own little world, to close in on ourselves. (That's sin, by the way.) It's today's "normal" for much of our work, both personal and professional. And there's nothing wrong with it. Until there is.

All this isolation leads to a loneliness we're so used to we don't know how to detect it or recognize it properly when we do notice something amiss. I recently attended a webinar hosted by RightNow Media where Pastor Ben Stuart, author of Rest & War: Rhythms of a Well-Fought Life spoke about the apathy we see in the world today and its causes.

As a culture, he says, having become accustomed to fast information via TV, the web on our computers, and computers in the palms of our hands, we're addicted to perpetual novelty. Most of us are constantly scrolling for something new, something fascinating, a jolt of feeling good from a meme, a short video, a picture of a puppy. This quick fix doesn't allow time for deep thought, connection, meditation... attachment. "We are in awe of nothing," he says. Therefore, we don't join together in worship, in service, in prayer. People who don't care about something together, passionately, lack community.

The result is an epidemic of loneliness, a frightening increase of depression and anxiety in our children, and a lack of true purpose in our lives. We, as a culture, have become less and less happy since the invention of the television; and it just keeps getting worse. Without realizing it, multiple generations are going around searching for one another, and looking in the wrong places.

What's this lonely looking look like? A shrug and a turn away. Being ghosted. Eyes cast down. Nasty comments on social media. The word "hate" flung around every day. Angry drivers. Empty tables. Empty theaters. Empty pews. Empty hearts. It looks like not caring, when inside deeply we each do care. We've just unlearned over time how to connect, how to stand together.

This Isaiah verse is a powerful reminder of God's connection with us. That's EXTREMELY important today, extremely. The community we share in is life-giving and the world NEEDS it.

Each of us is called to this task even beyond the programmatic outreach at Trinity. We're called to develop relationship, even when it's not easy, to encourage those we'd hide ourselves from, to use technology wisely to **make connections** and not to avoid them. That's why becoming a hybrid church is important for us—so that we can connect to the lonely where they're looking.

Only the Church offers this connection in our world. We're the only ones peddling love in a world concerned with power, prestige and cash. And love is the only thing that can treat loneliness. Love is the only thing that can create connection. We are connected to the Lord and his mission. We serve a hurting world. This gives us community, a cause, and a compelling and passionate reason to be together.

Who do you know that might be lonely? Who do you know who doesn't know life any other way? How can you change that for them? Try an invitation to church, maybe not even for worship, but a concrete action that empowers them to engage. That's curative; and God has put the power in our hands.



COMING THIS FALL - BIBLICAL STORYTELLING

Want to become more familiar with the Bible? Interested in learning more about the passages we read in worship? Love serving as a Reader (lector) in church and wish you could expand on those readings? Here's a great chance! Biblical Storytelling is a method of proclaiming Scripture that involves becoming familiar with a passage and then telling the story to others. There's a general goal of 75% accuracy in repeating the words of the passage and 95% accuracy in sharing the content or message of the passage. **YOU can do this!** This is particularly a great way to share the stories of Scripture if you're not comfortable reading out loud - you get to tell the story in your own words.

Here are some tips on how to become a Biblical Storyteller:

- *Pick a passage of Scripture that you'd like to share (The list of fall options can be found on the table in the upstairs lobby/narthex.)
- *Know your passage well enough to tell it, not read it. Study its context. Set the scene by describing it and introducing the characters.
- *Pace yourself. Don't rush through the story, tell it at a natural pace with your normal voice. Speak clearly so you can be heard.
- *Use props and other visuals if they'll help.
- *Figure out how you'll enlist the help of others if it's appropriate.
- *Practice, practice, practice. Practice alone, in front of the mirror, and in front of people.



If you'd like to be a Biblical Storyteller this fall during worship, September 11 - November 20, check out the list of lectionary passages on the sign-up sheet on the table in the upstairs lobby/narthex. See

Pastor Susan with any questions or to learn more. The Storyteller will serve to tell the story during the worship time and will act in the place of the Lector for that particular passage. If no Storyteller signs up, then the Lector's job remains the same as always. Give it a try!





Mission in Motion has been busy with Heavenly Hamburgers. Every Wednesday, other than Food Pantry Wednesdays, 120 hamburger meals are given out to community members. Thank you to all the volunteers who faithfully serve these meals each week. Thank you to Kay and Jack Hinkle for getting chips donated, a good price on the burgers, and a gift certificate to Weis for rolls. This is a wonderful meal ministry!

The José Project is not over. José, Yadira, and Cristian are getting used to living independently. José is working full time and Cristian and Yadira are doing well in school. They are a wonderful sibling family and love their new home. However, they are still teenagers and continue to need some support. The court has given José guardianship of Cristian but the state will not provide any financial assistance to José because he is not 21. Therefore, finances are tight for food as José begins to take over paying bills. The fund that has been collected from many churches and community members is helping with household bills for now, but that help only goes so far. If you are interested in giving this sibling family additional support for their food budget, please consider purchasing a gift card from Giant, Walmart, or a fast food restaurant. You can sign up on the sheet in the narthex or just buy a gift card and give it to Dona Lerew to deliver to the siblings. If you are interested in providing a

home cooked meal for them, please see Anita Madsen or Dona Lerew for suggested meals. Dona will deliver anything you may provide. Thank you for any continued help you can give to assist this family in learning to lead productive, independent lives.

Please watch your email updates and/or weekly bulletin for information about our joint efforts with the Hanover United Refugee Resettlement team; things are changing rather quickly in this ministry, day to day or even hour to hour. As of this printing, a woman from the Congo has been temporarily settled in the house next to Zwingli UCC in East Berlin with her family arriving within the next week. Agenda

- 1. Review July Financial Results-Financial results were reviewed for July. While July giving for current did meet budget, our deficit continued to grow since July and August are high expense months. Our operating deficit on a year-to-date basis at July 31 was \$13,517. Non-budgeted miscellaneous current income year to date is \$5,821 which nets to an operating deficit of \$7,696. We should also note that an insurance payment of \$1,900 was issued by mistake that would become due in December.
- 2. Endowment Fund Endowment fund like most investments, suffered a market value decrease of \$51,500 January1 June 30. In addition, we withdrew \$12K to fund the Endowment Holding Account as approved by Council. The current value of the Endowment Fund on June 30 was \$273,194
- 3. 2023 Budget Discussion Work will begin on the proposed 2023 Budget in next couple weeks. First, the Finance Committee recognizes that everyone has done a good job with managing the finances for their committees. After a lengthy discussion about our current operating deficit, impact of inflation, giving patterns and all other factors, it was recommended by the committee that budget guidance for 2023 is that our overall budget in total should not increase in 2023. This is not to say if there is a specific need, that a valid budget increase would not be considered but the request must be fully supported with costs and plan. In fact, all 2023 budget requests should be supported with the specifics of the requested budget. This recommendation will be discussed at the upcoming August 11 Council meeting. Timetable for the 2023 budget will be provided to Council Reps for presentation to the Committee Chairpersons.
- 4. Mid-Year Financial Review Charlie agreed to do this review. Bob will forward the info provided by Sue to Charlie.
- 5. Giving Analysis As discussed in June, Jen was asked to prepare a summary report of giving 2021 vs. 2022. A preliminary report was provided in June and an updated summary provided as of July 31. Bob took that summary information and evaluated the results for Current and Benevolence. The good news is that giving for Current is now slightly ahead of 2021. The bad news is we are not currently meeting our required budgeted income requirements and not meeting expenses result-

ing in a reduction of cash to fund our operation. What is noticed is that the congregation has reacted to the letter issued in January and many have increased their giving and/or re-allocated their giving.

The analysis was broken down into 3 segments: Increases (46 giving units), decreases (27 giving units), and no change (19 giving units). There is somewhat of a disparity in the numbers provided in 2021 which requires some additional review but do feel this analysis does provide an adequate snapshot of the current patterns.

6. New IRS mileage reimbursement rate – Effective July 1 the reimbursement rate has been increased to \$.62.5/mile.

Finance will be meeting several times in the coming weeks as we begin work on the 2023 budget, and we will set a date(s) that works for the majority of our members.

Bob reported that the next meeting will be held September 20.

Mission in Motion-Heavenly Hamburgers will replace Holy Hotdogs dur-

José, Yadira, and Christian continue to receive support from various Trinity members concerning trailer upkeep, financial planning, cooking, and just dealing with life. She reported that she will contact other churches as well to help with this.

The Hanover United Refugee Resettlement group is expecting a refugee family to arrive and live at the Zwingli parsonage at any time. Thank you to all who helped clean the home and gather necessary items for living in the home. Watch weekly announcements and emails for more information about the family as we learn them. Babysitting may be need as they settle in and as the parents are meeting with different services that are helping them.
